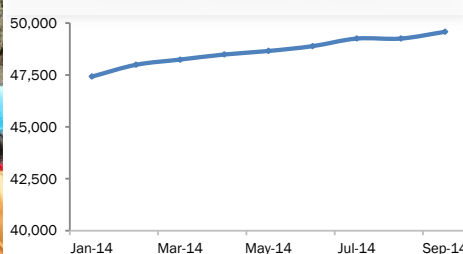

### Highlights

- The security situation in Bunj remained relatively calm but delicate with the capacity for rapid deterioration. UNHCR and Partners continued to monitor the security situation closely and to engage all relevant actors to safe-guard the security of humanitarian staff and refugee community while providing
- Refugee leaders across all camps raised concern over increasing break-ins and thefts from WFP warehouses as well as the delayed distribution of solar radios, solar lanterns, sanitary kits and sandals. They also requested the fumigation of mosquito breeding stagnant water and homes, continued therapeutic feeding for malnourished children and lactating mothers as well as the vaccination of their livestock.
- During the continuous registration of new born babies in Doro, UNHCR noticed a significant number of child mothers. Eight (08) cases of early and/or forced marriage of girls between the ages 16 and 17 approached the registration team to separate their ration cards from their parents for merging with their husbands.
- During the month of September, two food distributions were executed in the four camps (15 day ration each). As in the past, camp community leadership were invited for pre-distributions meetings wherein the types of food and modalities of the exercise were explained. Leadership and refugee communities remained supportive during the distributions.

## Doro Monthly Updates

Protection

- The general security situation in Doro was relatively calm though with reported continuous break-ins and attempted theft of food items from WFP Rub halls in Doro.
- Mobilization and possible recruitment by SPLA-N in the camp and onward movements to the border observed. The exercise reportedly targeted combatants but agencies reported some of their refugee staff were affected but have since been released.

- Construction and replacements of latrines continued with 239 family shared latrines replaced and 52 household latrines constructed. 239 latrines decommissioned and 150 bathing units constructed in Doro.
- One automatic chlorine dosing unit installed to boost the consistency of FRC at the last consumption points while 57 tap leakages repaired, 03 water points fenced, 02 hand pump repaired and one tank base constructed for a 45,000 litre capacity storage tank.
- Hygiene team continued with the dissemination of key hygiene promotion messages reaching 47,770 individuals during house to house visits, open sessions and Jerri-can cleaning campaigns. 7,183 water containers were cleaned during the Jerri-can cleaning campaign to enhance the promotion of safe water chain. Their hygiene promotion messages revolved around faecal oral contamination routes and prevention of water related diseases including malaria.
- 18,234 hand washing facilities visited of which 97% were found functional.
- 1,952 people participated in the environmental cleaning-up campaigns.
- WASH Volunteers have been trained to fully respond when the need arises.
- In conclusion, WASH activities continued well with minimum required standard maintained in all components.

- According to September joint SP and MSF-B MUAC screening results, the proxy malnutrition rates of under 5 show substantial improvement (proxy GAM = 9 % and proxy SAM = 0.8 %) and rates are within UNHCR standards (GAM < 10% while SAM should be < 2%).
- Pregnant and Lactating Women (PLW) rates are still high. A Specific assessment and actions will be carried out in the first quarter of 2015.
- Health and nutrition treatment activities were being managed with lower staff numbers due to the security concerns. All the four health facilities including 1 PHCC and 3 health posts are operating in Doro camp. But IYCF mother support activities were still put on hold by SP because of staff shortage.
- The new admissions in SAM (14 in OTP and 14 in TSFP). General Food Distribution (GFD) food distribution was completed through 2 cycles of 15 day - ration each and the daily energy requirements (2,100 Kcal) were met as full ration was distributed. Nutrition products stock were enough to run SAM and MAM activities.
- In a bid to prevent an outbreak of cholera and minimize the impact, camp level cholera preparedness and response activities have been initiated in Doro camp. In addition, MSF-B plans to establish a 20 bed Cholera Treatment Unit (CTU) in the main clinic. In addition to the CTU, the Health Posts will serve as oral rehydration points for the management of mild cases.
- The community outreach health services have also fully resumed through community volunteers. To this effect, the health profile of the refugee population and surrounding host communities remain stable with under-five and crude mortalities remaining well below the threshold.
