




New arrivals, by sex and COO




Reasons for Flight




New Arrivals Breakdown, By Age Cohort


**Notes:** A total of 7,711 new arrivals have been registered since the start of 2012; with 580 arriving from Burundi, 398 from Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), 4 from Eritrea, 430 from Ethiopia, 1 from Iran, 1 from Ivory Coast, 42 from Rwanda, 395 from Somalia, 4,641 from South Sudan, 1,150 from Sudan, 1 from Tanzania and 68 from Uganda.

287 individuals were registered during the nineteenth week of 2012 [7th-9th May 2012]; 7 from Burundi, 9 from Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), 3 from Rwanda, 19 from Ethiopia, 21 from Somalia, 186 from South Sudan, 40 from Sudan and 2 from Uganda. As at 9th May 2012, the overall population in Kakuma Refugee Camp stood at **94,844**.

The average family size registered during the reporting period stood at **3.4** individuals. Family size 1 households represented 40.0% of all newly registered households.

As at 9th May 2012, the total South Sudanese 'returnee' figure stands at **143** individuals; mainly from Jonglei, Equatoria and Bahr el Ghazal States.

NB: This report reflects registration trends. In addition to new arrivals reported here, the overall population in Kakuma also increases through new births, in-situ registration (of persons who arrived in a previous period but reported for registration later), family reunification, and various other data adjustments. Analysis and projections are based on actual persons registered in the UNHCR registration database (proGres)
