

KEY MESSAGES

- The CAR situation remains one of the world's oldest and largest humanitarian crises. It is widely forgotten and political deadlock within the country has led to a protracted displacement crisis;
- Appreciate Governments in the neighbouring countries for keeping open access to asylum despite the security challenges and impact on host communities;
- Appreciate coordinated efforts of donors, UN agencies and NGOs to assist refugees and other persons affected by the CAR crisis in 2014;
- Encourage the international community to be more engaged and assist transitional authorities to organize free and fair elections;
- Urge donors to provide additional financial support in 2015 in order to improve the assistance to people of concern of UNHCR and others affected by the CAR crisis, such as host communities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND CHALLENGES IN 2014

Achievements:

- Access to asylum of all refugees on a *prima facie* basis and respect of the civilian character of refugee camps and sites;
- Individual pre-registration of 90% of refugees and issuance of refugee documents;
- Full medical screening for refugees at border entry points and transit centers;
- Nutritional screening for children, pregnant and lactating women upon arrival at transit centres, sites and camps;
- Provision of multi-sectoral services to refugees (food, WASH, health and shelter).

Challenges:

- Security of host countries and security of refugees who remain in the villages close to the borders;
- Transport and logistics, due to the remoteness of some sites and/or camps in host countries;
- Secondary and tertiary education remains a critical gap for refugees students;
- The strengthening of support to authorities and host communities will be a necessity to encourage local integration of refugees and peaceful cohesion.

PRIORITIES IN 2015

- Relocation of all refugees away from the borders in order to avoid cross-border attacks against refugees;
- Biometric registration as a measure to know refugee population better;
- Development of activities based on identified needs and requirements of refugee women and children;
- Promotion of a livelihood strategy and gradual dismantling of sites and/or camps to encourage refugees to become self-reliant and to integrate themselves among the host community;
- Promotion of social cohesion among refugees and peaceful coexistence with the local population through implementing community-based projects.
