This Indicator Report provides a monthly snapshot of the regional response to the Burundi Situation. The indicators included report on the Post 1 January 2015 Burundi caseload only. The report is prepared through collaboration with the reporting country and the Regional Support Hub, Nairobi.

The notes below provide further contextual information on various sector indicators:

### CHILD PROTECTION

The child protection team continued to monitor the children at risk identified during the month of December 2015. A total of 15 children were assessed, 6 unaccompanied minors, 4 separated children and 5 children at risk. Best Interest Assessment were conducted to identify their needs unaccompanied minors were placed under foster care, referrals and follow up made towards their wellbeing.



Conducted 01 joint child protection dialogue meeting with the Isingoro district probation officer to identify and respond to child protection concerns in the New Burundian village. A total of 17 people (8 male and 7 female) participated during the dialogue.

### SEXUAL AND GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

In December 2015, ARC had field presence in 04 villages of Mugenyi C, Ruhoko A, Misiera A and Kabahinda C which promoted prevention of and response to incidences of gender based violence. Discussions on Power imbalances were held with a total of 135 Burundians (71 Male, 64 Females), Burundians who participated in the awareness raising sessions and focus group discussions agreed that men have more power than women.



Three (03) cases of Gender Based Violence were reported and supported. These were all female Burundians. Two of these incidences of rape happened in the country of origin and one incidence of physical assault by the husband happened in the country of asylum.

### WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

278 House holds were reached in the new Burundian villages were reached in December, with key hygiene behavior change messages of proper latrine use, food hygiene, waste management. treated logs and Slabs were distributed to them for construction of latrines.



Walking distance to nearest water collection points has been reduced to minimum of 20 meters on average through establishment of emergency water tanks. i.e water tanks were installed in Mugenyi and Kyeibale C villages, also water access indicator stands at 17.30 L/D/P during the month of December 2015.

All UNICEF Funded water pipeline extension works have been completed 100%, also water systems upgrade under UNHCR is at 99% completion. Water production will increase from 300m<sup>3</sup> to 600m<sup>3</sup> for Misiera water plant and from 400m<sup>3</sup> to 700m<sup>3</sup> base camp water plant with per capita increase from 17 L/D/P to 22 L/D/P for Burundian individuals, upon Commissioning.



### HEALTH

Malaria is the leading causes of morbidity with 28% followed by respiratory track infection at 20%, watery diarrhoea at 7%, skin infection at 4% and eye conditions at 3%.



### NUTRITION

The admission criteria for both SFP and TFP is WFH or MUAC. The total number of children between 6-59 months screened is 790. Total SAM enrolled were 2 and MAM 17. Default rate is at 12% and non response at 9%. Most of these defaulters are untraceable and not within the settlements. All the non responses are from SFP as they do share or sell the rations. No death has occurred in both TFP and SFP. The GAM rate is at 2.4% and SAM rate at 0.3%.



### EDUCATION

#### Pre-primary: 3 - 5 years

There are 6 Community ECDs supported by WTU/UNHCR and 4 in the existing Primary schools of Kashojwa, Nyarugugu, Nakivale and Kabazana. The attendance of Burundian Children is 1,608 in ECDs by end of the Year against the estimated 2,000 children between 3-5 years of age, representing 80%. UNICEF through the District Local government is constructing 6 ECDs in Nakivale

#### Primary: 6 - 13 years

The attendance of Burundian children in the Primary school by end of the year was at 1,633 representing 81% of the estimated population of school going age. There is a challenge of inadequate Latrine especially in Nakivale P/S where the ratio stands at 1:114 for Boys and 1:106 for Girls on average. There is limited access to schools due to the distance mainly affecting children in the Villages of Misiera A and Kabahinda

#### Secondary: 14- 17 years

There is only one secondary school in the settlement, with 155 Burundian Students and English Language is established. The attendance is at 70% but there is need for boarding facilities at the secondary school to address to issue of absenteeism. There is still very limited access to secondary Education.

Note: The schools are currently for holidays as per the 2015 Calendar Year and will reopen in February
