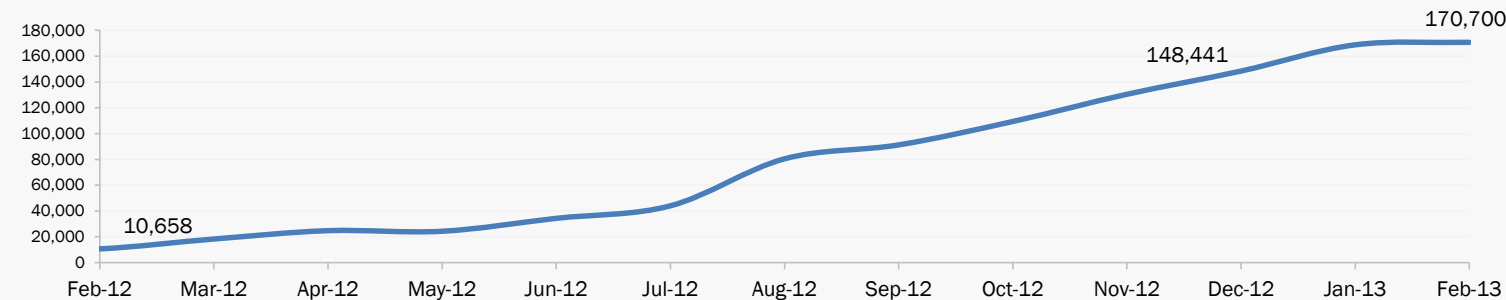


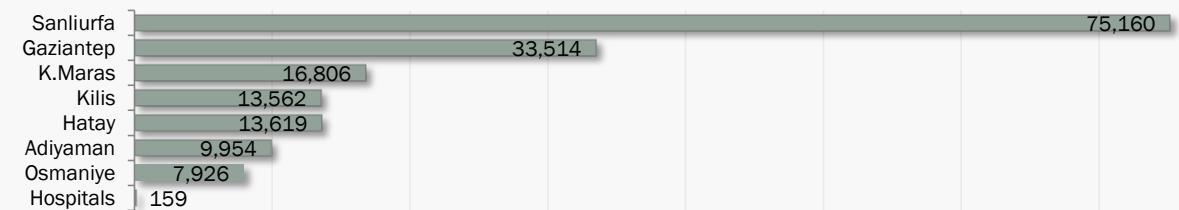

## Population Trends

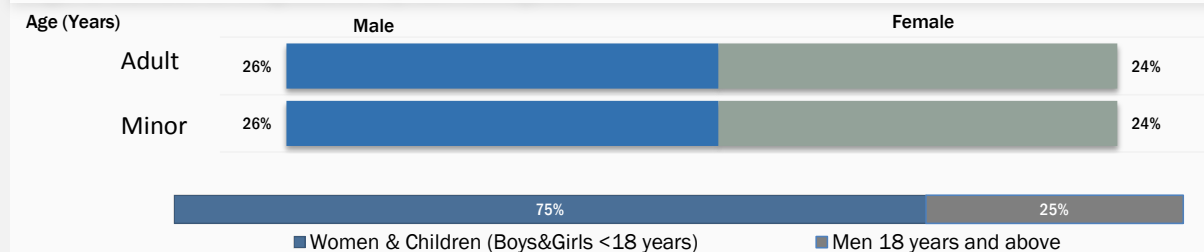


## Number of Syrians by Province

The number of Syrians living in the Urban Area are not included

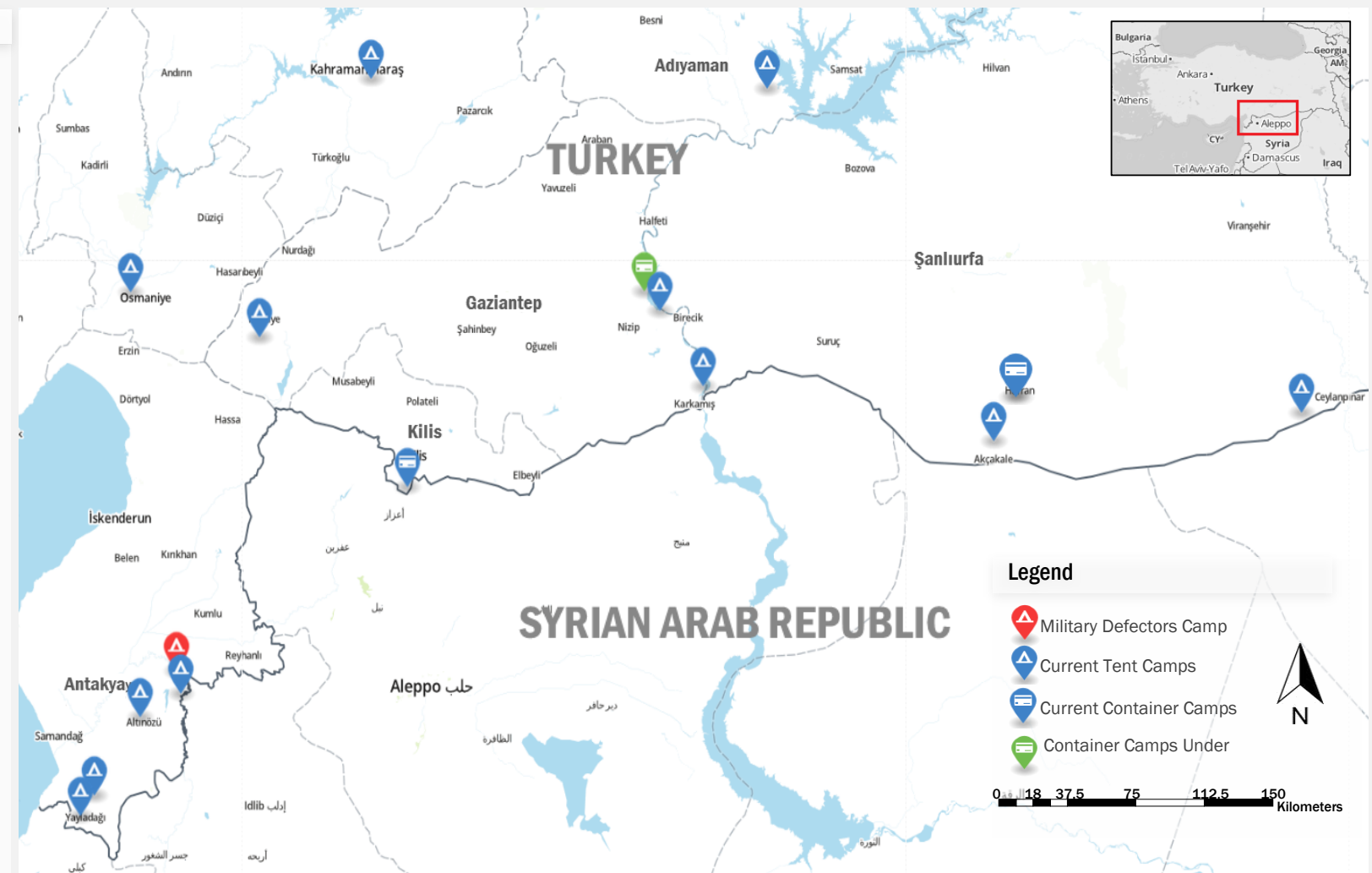


## Age & Gender of Registered Syrian Refugees



## Highlights

- On 04 Feb 2013, AFAD reports that the total number of Syrians registered in 15 camp in 7 provinces including hospitalized Syrians (159 persons) is 170,700 persons.
- According to AFAD, during the 24 hrs of 03-04 Feb 2013, 283 new arrivals were registered while 226 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria. During January 2013, 19,693 Syrians have been admitted from border points, registered and accommodated in camps. A total of 5,387 Syrians returned voluntarily during January.
- Shortage of space in the existing operational camps continues to be a major challenge for the local authorities. UNHCR Field Teams in the camps were informed by the authorities that several thousands of Syrians are provided assistance and accommodated in 11 different public buildings in Nizip town while some 20,000 are registered in Ceylanpinar and Akcakale camps but live outside in the urban areas or villages with their relatives.
- According to the local authorities some 100 K Syrians are living in urban areas in various cities. UNHCR Field Team was informed by the local authorities that a center was opened in Gaziantep where the Syrians living in urban Gaziantep province can approach for assistance and advice. Local officials using this centre to coordinate assistance distribution to the most vulnerable as well as registering/enumerating non-camp Syrians living in urban areas.
- By mid Jan. 2013, the container site in Harran Sanliurfa province was opened before it was fully completed. As of 04 Feb 2013, the occupancy rate is at 50% of the camp's capacity (planned capacity is 10,000 people).
- UNHCR Field Teams continue to visit camps regularly and observe voluntary repatriation interviews. UNHCR staff also provided technical advice and guidance to the local authorities in the camps in the areas of registration and other protection related issues.
- While the priority will be given to the container sites, hot meal distribution in the tented camps will also be gradually switched to cards system in the coming months. WFP will provide food cards and UNHCR will provide the kitchen/cooking sets which includes the hot plate for cooking, a mini fridge
