

This report is produced by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) on its humanitarian response for the crisis in Syria. The summary covers events and activities until 26 September. For activities implemented in Syria, please consult the full situation report.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- ➔ To address the needs of vulnerable migrants and host communities caught up in the conflict in Syria and neighboring countries, IOM has released its revised appeal amounting to USD 20.7 million.
- ➔ **Jordan:** On 20 September, IOM's primary health care services in King Abdullah Park (KAP) were handed over to the Ministry of Health. IOM medical team is planning to begin TB screening and awareness-raising activities in Za'atri camp in October.
- ➔ **Lebanon:** On 24 September, the inauguration of the Social Development Centre took place in North Lebanon marking the rehabilitation and equipping of the Center by IOM, UNHCR, the Danish Refugee Council (DRC), UNICEF and Save the Children, to provide psychosocial support to Syrian refugees and Lebanese returnees.

## SITUATION OVERVIEW

**JORDAN** UNHCR reports **53,299** registered Syrian refugees in Jordan. Currently **31,942** Syrian refugees reside in Za'atari camp near Mafraq, Jordan. The weather is becoming noticeably colder, especially during the early morning hours.

The movement of Syrian refugees crossing the border into Jordan has further decreased from **3,052** arrivals last week, to **1,780** arriving this week due to the fluctuation of the security conditions.

**LEBANON** Over **65,000** displaced Syrians are receiving protection and assistance through the Lebanese Government, the UN and NGO partners. To date, **54,456** are registered with UNHCR. Over **400** Syrians arrived in the north of Lebanon (**82** families) this week from Homs and Damascus. Most entered Lebanon legally through the official Masnaa crossing point. These families settled in the North mainly due to family ties in the region. Many families reported facing difficulties in Syria while trying to cross the borders into Lebanon.

As a result of the policy decision of the Ministry of Education, all Syrian refugee children are permitted to access public schools, and the registration period has also been extended to facilitate their enrollment. The Ministry also offered to assist schools that face capacity difficulties in accommodating Syrian students.

**IRAQ** The Al-Qaim border crossing point opened on 18 September after having been closed since 13 August. The total number of Syrian refugees in Iraq stands at **29,441**. **3,933** Syrian refugees entered Iraq in the past week.

Over **35,267** Iraqis have returned to Iraq since 18 July. Most Iraqi returnees have indicated that they are heading to Baghdad, Diyala, or Anbar.

**TURKEY** The Prime Minister's Disaster and Emergency Management Directorate (AFAD) announced on Monday 24 September that the number of Syrian refugees in Turkey has reached **87,774**. In a written statement, AFAD stated that Syrians in Turkey had been welcomed and placed in a number of refugee camps located in Altınözü, Yayladağı, Reyhanlı, Apaydın and Karbeyaz districts of the southern province of Hatay, and in the southern provinces of Şanlıurfa (in the Ceylanpinar district), Gaziantep (in the İslahiye district) and Kilis.

AFAD highlighted that Syrian citizens who have taken shelter in Turkey have been provided with lodging, food, health services, security, social activities, education, religious services, translation services and communications. The directorate added that a total of **127,053** Syrians have entered Turkey since the outbreak of the 18-month-long conflict and that **39,279** have voluntarily returned to Syria.

## COUNTRY OPERATIONS

### 1. Jordan Operations

#### Transport assistance

To date, IOM has provided transportation assistance for a total of **33,628 Syrian** refugees from the Ramtha Police Directorate, Jaber Border (Mafraq), and transit sites to Za'atari Camp. From 19 to 25 September, IOM assisted **1,780** Syrian refugees.

#### Health assistance

As a first responder agency, IOM provides all assisted individuals with fitness - to - travel health checks. From 19 to 25 September, IOM staff identified **35** individuals with injuries and serious medical conditions requiring immediate referral to a hospital or treatment upon arriving to Za'atri camp.

Since 28 June, 11,593 Syrians (40% females, 40% children under 15 years of age) had received health care and referral services through IOM's Primary Health Clinic at King Abdullah Park (KAP). This assistance was handed over to the Jordanian Ministry of Health on 20 September 2012.

To date, IOM has provided tuberculosis (TB) screenings to a total number of **16,116** Syrians and reached **20,792** Syrians through awareness-raising activities in Jordan, since March 2012. IOM's medical team confirmed **nine** TB cases at Za'atari camp. Beginning in October, the IOM medical team is planning to begin TB screening and awareness-raising activities in Za'atri camp.

### 2. Lebanon Operations

#### Distribution of Non-food Items (NFIs)

The arrival of the winter season is becoming an increasing concern for a large proportion of Syrian refugees and Lebanese returnees in this particular crisis context. In response, last week IOM launched a round of NFIs distribution in the North and the Bekaa (Baalbeck and surrounding areas), consisting of winterization items (winter blankets) and household shelter support items (sealing unfinished buildings/precarious huts and metallic containers).

During the reporting period, IOM distributed winterization/shelter sealing items to **2,761** individuals (**476** families) in Baalbeck, Fekha and Labwe, in the Bekaa Governorate, and **3,912** individuals (**621** families) in Wadi Khaled and Akkar, in north Lebanon.

## Psychosocial Support

On 24 September, the inauguration of the rehabilitated Social Development Center took place, to be used by IOM, UNHCR, the Danish Refugee Council (DRC), UNICEF and Save the Children to provide psychosocial support to Syrian refugees and Lebanese returnees.

IOM rehabilitated the Center with a handicapped entrance and sanitary infrastructure for children with special needs/disabilities in 2011. Indoor and outdoor equipment was purchased and installed to facilitate a range of specialized psychosocial activities for children with special needs, including problem solving and creative thinking activities, fine and gross motor activities and cognitive play. Activities implemented by IOM also include the provision of technical training and on-job coaching for Ministry of Social Affairs (MOSA) community outreach workers to ensure the sustainability/lifespan of the initiative, beyond the project's implementation timeframe. It is anticipated that at least 100 children will benefit from the initiative on monthly basis.

## 3. Turkey Operations

### Distribution of Non-food Items (NFIs)

By the end of this week, IOM plans to begin the distribution of 15 containers (8 WC containers, 7 shower containers), which are expected to be functional within 10 days of their arrival date.
