NEEDS

- Increased registration capacity, including the establishment of new registration centres and biometrics.
- Establishment of decentralized shelter facilities for SGBV survivors, children at risk or vulnerable Syrians in need of shelter for other protection reasons.
- Increased establishment of community centres & safe spaces benefitting host and refugee communities.

OBJECTIVES

The Inter-Agency Protection Strategy in Jordan is centred on (i) ensuring access to basic rights, including asylum and timely access to registration and documentation as a prerequisite for proper protection delivery; (ii) expanding community outreach and development of community-based protection mechanisms; (iii) mitigating and reducing the risks and consequences of SGBV; (iv) ensuring that emergency child protection interventions are strengthened and harmonized; (v) responding to the needs of Syrians and vulnerable host community populations through provision of social, psycho-social and economic support; and (vi) exploring third country resettlement options as a protection response to cases with special needs of vulnerabilities.

ACTION/OUTPUTS

- 1 Syrians are able to access the territory, to seek asylum and be protected from refoulement.
- 2 Syrian protection needs are addressed through targeted protection interventions (including Child Protection and SGBV), community mobilization and capacity building.
- 3 Respond to the needs of Syrians and vulnerable host community populations with an emphasis on women and children through provision of social, psychosocial and economic support.
- 4 Refugees, host communities and organizations involved in the refugee response are provided with adequate information and take part in awareness-raising activities.
- 5 Third country resettlement options are explored as a protection response to cases with special needs or vulnerabilities.

KEY AUGUST DEVELOPMENTS

- New Women's Safe Spaces opened in EJC and Jordan Valley, each with the capacity to host 100 women/day.
- Following the opening of the Registration Centre in Khaldi in July, the waiting period for registration in Amman was reduced to 1 day (as of 31 August), significantly reduced from a 3 week waiting period in April 2013.
- Information dissemination & community outreach strengthened through the organization of weekly Town Hall meetings in August.

485,819 total active Syrian refugees registered as of 1



2,660 UAC/SC and children at risk received multi-sectoral services (1,593 girls and 1,067 boys)



1,512 SGBV survivors supported or referred - 1,434 females (942 women and 492 girls) and 78 males (29 men and 49 boys)



6,342 individuals with specific needs received special support (3,032 females and 3,310 males)



95,558 individuals benefited from psychosocial support - 57,247 females (7,452 women and 49,795 girls) and 38,311 males (1,965 men and 36,346 boys)



86 child and youth friendly spaces and 24 women safe spaces operational



6,157 Government officials, civil society and humanitarian workers trained on refugee protection, Child Protection and SGBV


