



Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	735,888

Highlights

- On 04 May 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 220,124. AFAD reported that during the period of 01-04 May 2014, a total of 1,230 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 960 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- According to the official numbers reported by the local authorities, the total number of non-camp Syrians registered and enumerated in 10 provinces in the southeast as well as Mersin and 10 provinces in Marmara region of Turkey excluding Istanbul, reached almost 516,000 as of 30 April 2014. This is an approx. 47% increase since end of 2013. Reportedly 53% of this total are registered and/or issued ikamet (temporary residence permit).
- Among the 10 provinces in the southeast, Gaziantep province is hosting about 26% of the total the number of registered and enumerated Syrians including about 34,000 Syrians in 4 camps, while Sanliurfa province hosts 24% of the total including more than 72,000 persons in 4 camps. Hatay province with about 15,000 persons in 5 camps, hosts 19% of the total registered and enumerated Syrians as of end of April 2014.
- The camp officials in Yayladagi-Tekel in Hatay informed that last Friday there was a fire in the camp due to misusage of electricity and reportedly 14 tents were burned, but there have been no casualties. Camp officials informed UNHCR that all the burned tents were replaced and core supplies were provided to the residents. UNHCR will visit the camp and offer support items needed.
- In Kilis a registered International NGO (International Patients Help Fund) supported by its sister NGOs from Kuwait and through private donors, opened a clinic to provide medical support to non-camp Syrians. The NGO is in close contact with the local authorities and informed there are about 8 Syrian doctors, 3 nurses under the supervision of a Turkish doctor employed providing primary health care. In addition, the same NGO opened a soup kitchen in Kilis, providing hot meals to about 150 vulnerable families in Kilis. The NGO informed that they have identified the families through a vulnerability assessment involving house visits.
