



Total Number of Refugees Registered and with Registration Appointments	<b>815,088</b>




### Age & Gender of Registered Syrian Refugees



### Highlights

- On 05 August 2014, AFAD - the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Government of Turkey - announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 218,771. AFAD reported that during the period of 04-05 August 2014, a total of 167 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 330 Syrians voluntarily returned to Syria.
- UNHCR is working on two informational leaflets to provide information to Syrians regarding access to rights and services, including how and where to register with the Turkish authorities, accessing health and medical assistance, enrolling children in schools, and accessing the police and other authorities. The leaflets also provide information on the Turkish legal system, including the law and legislation concerning marriage (stressing the illegality of early marriages), and providing information for survivors and those at risk of sexual and gender-based violence on how to seek assistance and protection.
- A meeting was held with UNICEF in order to discuss the planned "Back to School" campaign, which will be launched ahead of the coming school year to raise levels of educational participation. It was planned that UNHCR, UNICEF, the Ministry of National Education (MoNE) and AFAD will jointly release information on the various ways that Syrian children can gain access to educational services in Turkey. The parties also discussed MoNE's request to UNHCR and UNICEF to assist it in profiling informal schools during the meeting.
- UNHCR delivered 20 WASH containers to Nizip camp as part of its continuous support to AFAD. In total, 308 WASH containers have been delivered, while the remaining eight are expected to be delivered in August.
- In Adana Saricam camp, the newly appointed camp manager informed UNHCR that they are planning to conduct a head count in the camp by visiting each tent. The UNHCR team suggested that during the tent visits they could also identify vulnerable families and physically disabled individuals, which will enable them to plan special programs for those groups in the camp.
- In Reyhanli town of Hatay, in addition to receiving services from the state hospitals, Syrians are also approaching a Syrian clinic for primary health care and various types of medical services, including the provision of medicine. The clinic staff informed a UNHCR team that for further treatment the Syrian clinic advises patients to go to the state hospitals.
- A UNHCR team was informed that the same NGO that is supporting the clinic also provides language classes in Turkish and Arabic for the 15 - 40 years-old age group of non-camp Syrians, as well as preparation classes for TOMER courses in Reyhanli and Kirikhan towns of Hatay. They also have schools that about 3,000 Syrian children are attending.
