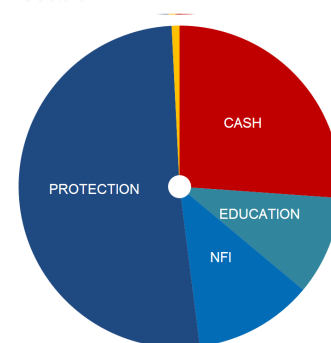

Mission

The Danish Refugee Council (DRC) is a humanitarian, non-governmental, non-profit organisation founded in 1956 that works in more than 30 countries throughout the world. DRC fulfills its mandate by providing direct assistance to conflict-affected populations – refugees, internally displaced people (IDPs) and host communities in the conflict areas of the world; and by advocating on behalf of conflict-affected populations internationally, and in Denmark, on the basis of humanitarian principles and the Human Rights Declaration.

In Jordan, DRC provides assistance in the shelter, cash, non-food item, education, and protection sectors to both Syrians and Jordanians. To ensure a more holistic response, DRC has also developed a comprehensive referral system to link vulnerable individuals with access to quality assistance for multi-sector needs, including health, education, and legal aid.



According to figures from the RRP6 Mid-Year Update, in 2014, DRC has appealed for a revised total of **USD 6,341,525**

SHELTER SECTOR

Objective 1: Adequate shelter provided for vulnerable Syrian refugee women, girls, boys and men, and targeted members of the host community in urban/rural settings outside of camps.

Objective 1: Ensure that the needs of extremely vulnerable Syrians as well as Jordanians affected by the refugee crisis are covered across Jordan

NON-FOOD ITEMS (NFIS) SECTOR

Objective 1: Ensure that the basic household needs of women, girls, boys and men are met

EDUCATION SECTOR

Objective 1: Children and youth have sustained access to appropriate education opportunities

Objective 2: Children and youth benefit from a learning environment that promotes quality education, protection and well-being.

Output 2.3 Children receive essential learning materials including basic stationary and other education supplies **USD 115,000**

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PROTECTION SECTOR

Objective 1: Refugees fleeing Syria are able to access the territory, to seek asylum and their rights are respected

Output 1.5 Quality of multi-sectoral response services for girls and boys and their families is strengthened and improved in accordance with AGD principles **USD 1,341,000**

Objective 2: Community empowerment, engagement, outreach and self-reliance is strengthened and expanded, and WGBM are engaged in the planning, implementation & evaluation of services

Output 2.1 Community-based Protection mechanisms, Outreach and Community Mobilization strengthened **USD 111,000**

Output 2.2 Peaceful Coexistence with local communities, including through community-support projects (such as QIPS and CIPS) is promoted **USD 50,000**

Output 2.4 Community empowerment and self reliance opportunities for refugee and host communities are promoted as part of comprehensive protection interventions **USD 124,000**

Output 2.5 Psychosocial support services are available and accessible to vulnerable refugee and host community members **USD 435,000**

Objective 4: Emergency child protection interventions for boys & girls are strengthened and harmonized.

Output 4.2 CP prevention activities are increased, including through the strengthening of CBCPCs and other community structures **USD 81,880**

Additional Sector Information

In addition to the above, DRC is also utilizing a Community Driven Development approach to address root problems at the municipal level, many of which existed pre-Syrian Crisis but have since been exacerbated and affect both Jordanians and Syrians. DRC is focusing on building local capacity and improving the ability of host communities to cope with the increased pressures on services and resources brought about by the influx of Syrians to Jordan.

Geographic Focus

In 2014, DRC plans to intervene in Amman, Irbid, Karak, Ma'an, Mafraq, and Tafileh governorates.
