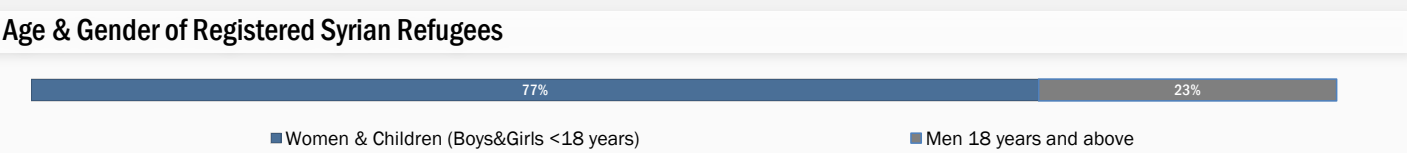
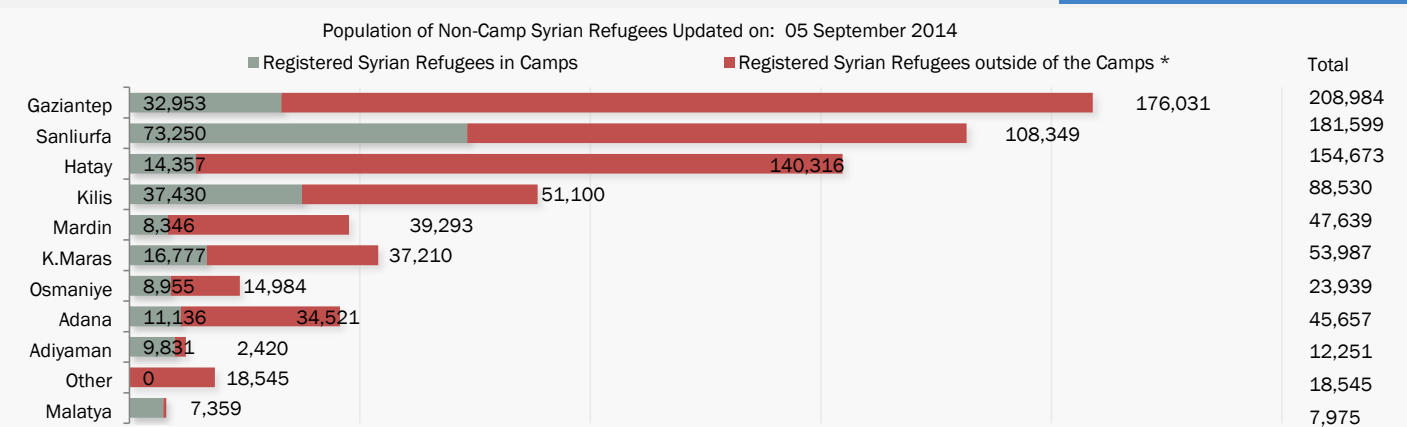
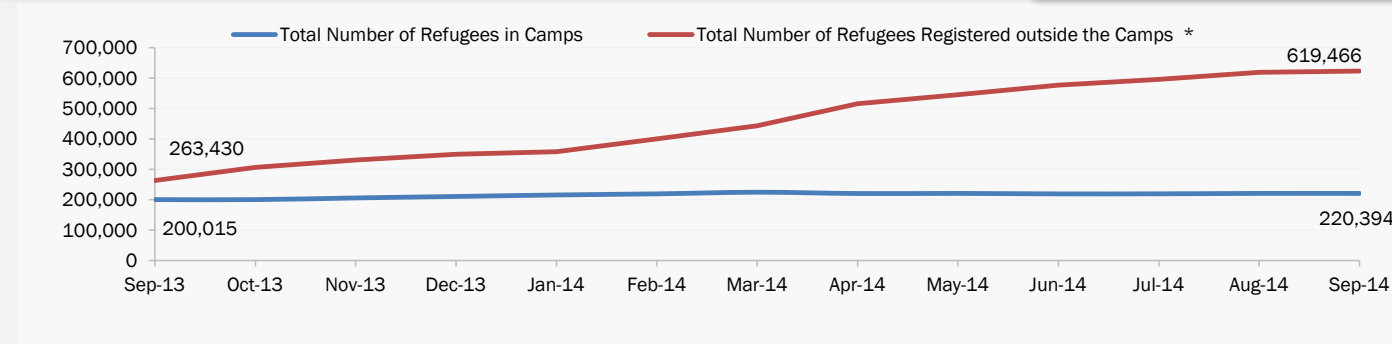

Highlights

- On 07 September, AFAD, the Disaster and Emergency Management Agency of Turkey's Government, announced that the total number of Syrians registered and assisted in the 22 camps located in 10 provinces was 220,394. AFAD reported that from 04 to 07 September, a total of 1,188 Syrians were admitted and registered in the camps and 1,545 Syrians have voluntarily returned to Syria.
- According to the official numbers provided by the local authorities, the number of non-camp Syrians registered and enumerated in the 10 provinces in the southeast reached over 623,000 persons as of 05 Sept. 2014. This is about 78% increase when compared to the end of 2013. Of this total number, 65% were registered by police and issued their individual foreigners ID card, about 5% with ikamet (temporary residence permit) and the rest are either enumerated by local authorities before police started to register non-camp Syrians or registered by AFAD in Gaziantep, Mardin and Urfa. Those who were enumerated and/or registered by AFAD/local authorities are being re-registered by police.
- It is reported in the media that due to intensified fights between ISIS and the opposition groups (PYD and FSA) several hundreds Syrians fled Aleppo and Azaz and crossed to Turkey via through Elbeyli town of Kilis province. Reportedly the population of Elbeyli is almost tripled to 5-6,000. According to media reports quoting the mayor, new-arivals are stopping over in Elbeyli town for a few hours to a day until their relatives arrive and then they proceed to other provinces. UNHCR Field team will follow up with the local officials in Kilis and Elbeyli town.
- In Kilis Oncupinar camp officials informed that they have identified about 10 families among the non-camp Syrians who are living in destitute conditions and AFAD social workers conducted a vulnerability assessment. Officials informed that these families will be admitted to Oncupinar and Elbeyli camps depending on the availability of space in both camps. Reportedly nine families will be accommodated in Elbeyli camp while one family will be settled in Oncupinar camp.
