Field update	<p>Zaatari camp:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Safety Audit individual interviews ongoing in ZC; Child Protection staff are taking part in the Safety Audit that has started in the camp. Children target groups are covered with age groups from 14-17 years old. Outcome will be shared with relevant actors by end of October. Challenges have been to reach out to the families as not all were reachable through phone or were not present. The individual interviews should be finalized this week.		

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Children returning to Syria: UNHCR is undertaking return monitoring activities at the bus departure site as well as the government-run return office. Through systematized referrals to PRT, UNHCR is able to identify and introduce safeguards for protection concerns for children returning to Syria. UNHCR is in contact with the authorities to improve the identification system of UASC at the bus site and to ensure that safeguards are in place. • Child labor discussion in the camp: Child labor concerns in and outside the camp are continuously reported. PRT WG will coordinate with the CP SWG in ZC to dedicate one WG meeting to the information sharing on child labor and to prepare a response plan including investigations from ILO. UNHCR has met with ILO to address the continuous concerns regarding child labor identified in and around the camp. In the concluded market assessment by REACH, of 941 business 12.8% reported to having employed or are using children under 18 as employees. This is of concern in addressing child labor in the camp. • Education: There are still concerns raised on congestions of children in the schools. There are students on waiting list in school 1 & 2. It is also affecting children with disabilities who are on waiting list. Parents continue to raise concerns 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Action: to present to CP/GBV Zaatari for discussion and recommendations. 	
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	<p>on quality of education. UNHCR, UNICEF and Save the Children work jointly with Syrian assistance teachers in the camp.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Age Gender Diversity Mainstreaming (AGDM) is planned for November. This will be a joint undertaking with all partners. 4 themes will be covered focusing mainly on areas that are of key interest to the camp and are yet to be covered in details. • NFI: Children of most vulnerable families who cannot buy shoes are being targeted through IRD and given shoes <p>Mafraq (urban)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Violence at school: Increased number of Syrian students in schools has been reported by all the mayors throughout Mafraq governorate as being one of the main issues impacting Syrian communities and creating tensions. A protection survey was conducted with refugees residing in Al-Hamrah municipality (Mafraq gov.) where 9/10 families with children in school report different forms of harassment and violence faced by their children, especially male children, on the way to school. We are currently preparing an intervention jointly with CS and Save the Children (more info will be shared once intervention conducted). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Joint intervention with UNHCR and Save the Children 	
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Initial info sessions on the risk of early marriage have been provided by UNHCR and IMC to be carried out in October (Amani Campaign). • In September, UNHCR provide Child protection awareness raising sessions (on main risks and services available) to 120 persons (Jordanians and Syrians) through the CSC and 31 humanitarian staff. • UPP with UNHCR's support have distributed radios to 154 refugee households in Mafraq. This activity was organized to support UPP's outreach to urban refugees and promote dissemination of relevant messages through radio programmes, including on child protection issues. <p>EJC: In coordination with UAE RC and partners, IMC has started to provide mental health support to ECJ camp (e.g. psychiatric)</p>		
VAF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Vulnerability Assessment Framework is being developed to put in place a system that, using a mixture of static and dynamic indicators establishes a profile of vulnerability among Syrian refugee households, enables monitoring of changes in vulnerability over time and could help to target assistance in a more efficient and equitable manner • There is a workshop on October 19 at Intercontinental Hotel on VAF for sectors 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Two people will attend the workshop on VAF (Sector chair and one other person) • Presentation will be sent out to all attending the workshop 	Co-chairs
