[Presentation] Camp Restructure Project	<p>- A presentation on the "Camp Restructure Project" has been shared with the present partners.</p> <p>- In order to improve the camp infrastructure and upgrade refugee shelters, UNHCR has maintained the grid system of Zaatari on the master plan, creating blocks and streets to clarify the skeleton and land use within the camp, and facilitate communication with the community, creating a community structure.</p> <p>- Site planning unit has implemented a settlement</p>	Ghada (UNHCR), Nada (NRC) and Shahed (NRC)	40 min

	<p>restructuring plan, which includes relocation of households to ensure accessibility and preparation for the on-going infrastructure projects such as waste water, water supply, roads and electricity networks.</p> <p>- The result of the project includes the implementation of an address system for every household, and mapping their boundaries on the master plan.</p>		
Discussion Points after the Camp Restructure Project Presentation	<p>Following Shelter WG members' questions; the following points were highlighted:</p> <p>- It was stated that UNHCR is not engaging in providing concrete flooring for shelters in Zaatari camp. The main focus is on shelters upgrade, while refugees are free to fix their own shelters and maintain them in the way that suits them. Consequently, shelters from the inside varies between one household and another.</p> <p>- Although relocation was a challenging aspect at the beginning of the Restructure project, it was observed that after 4-6 months people were more stable and frequent movement cases were decreasing.</p> <p>- Energy (mainly electricity) is one of the key elements that affect people's willingness to live in any district. Therefore, one the main focuses at the time being is infrastructure establishment.</p> <p>- As there are market places in Zaatari, still some families open small business next to their shelters.</p> <p>- MoE (Ministry of Health) conducts regular checks on food and meat shops to ensure certain hygiene levels and prevent any poisoning and health issues. It was pointed out that fortunately no epic poisons or diseases have been identified in the camp, as it is part of the Syrian refugees culture to clean and sustain a certain level of cleanness</p> <p>- The decentralization of markets in Zaatari is a predicted evolvement, since it is an organic development of a free market.</p> <p>- Camp Management is oriented toward facilitating rather than limiting refugees activity.</p> <p>- The differences between the two camps (Azraq and Zaatari) have been discussed. The context is dissimilar as the location, topography, management and many other factors vary.</p>	Hovig (UNHCR)	30 min
Cash Distribution Facility	<p>It was announced that currently there is a functioning Cash Distribution facility that is functional in Zaatari Camp. Iris scan technology will be available very soon.</p> <p>It is planned to use the Cash Distribution facility in providing cash assistance, NFIs (non-food items) and support CFW (Cash for Work) activities.</p>	Hovig (UNHCR) and Richard (NRC)	10 min
