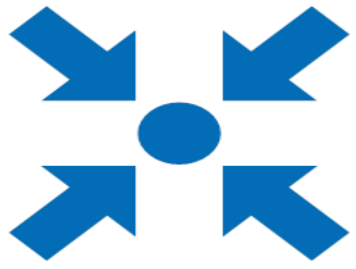


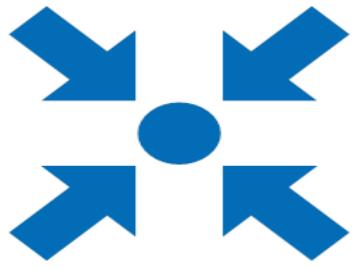

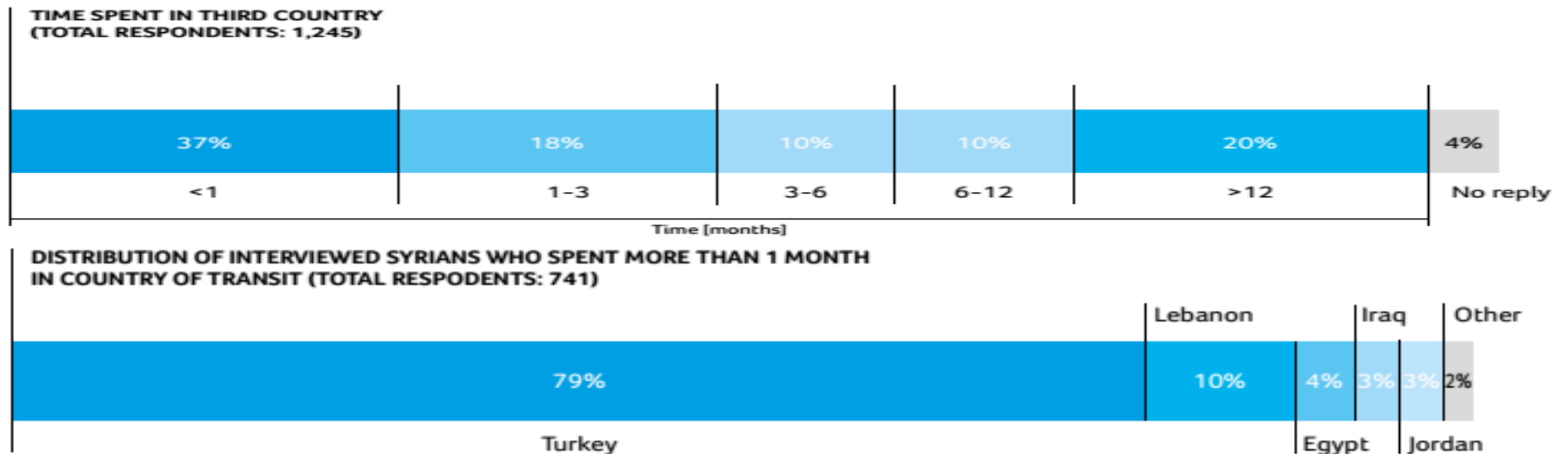
January 8 – introduction of visa requirements for Syrians to enter Turkey by air/sea

Significant increase of passenger traffic since announcement



Survey of Syrian Arrivals in Greece

- **PROFILE:** 50% single, 45% married
- **EDUCATION:** 86% secondary or university education level
- **SPECIFIC NEEDS:** 6% UASC, 5% VOT, 3% chronic disease and 3% single parents. 65% no specific need
- **FAMILY SEPARATION:** 1 in 5 separated from family members and do not know their current location
- **YEAR OF DEPARTURE FROM SYRIA:** 63% left Syria in 2015.
- **ARRIVAL IN GREECE:** 85% reached Greece on their first attempted crossing.

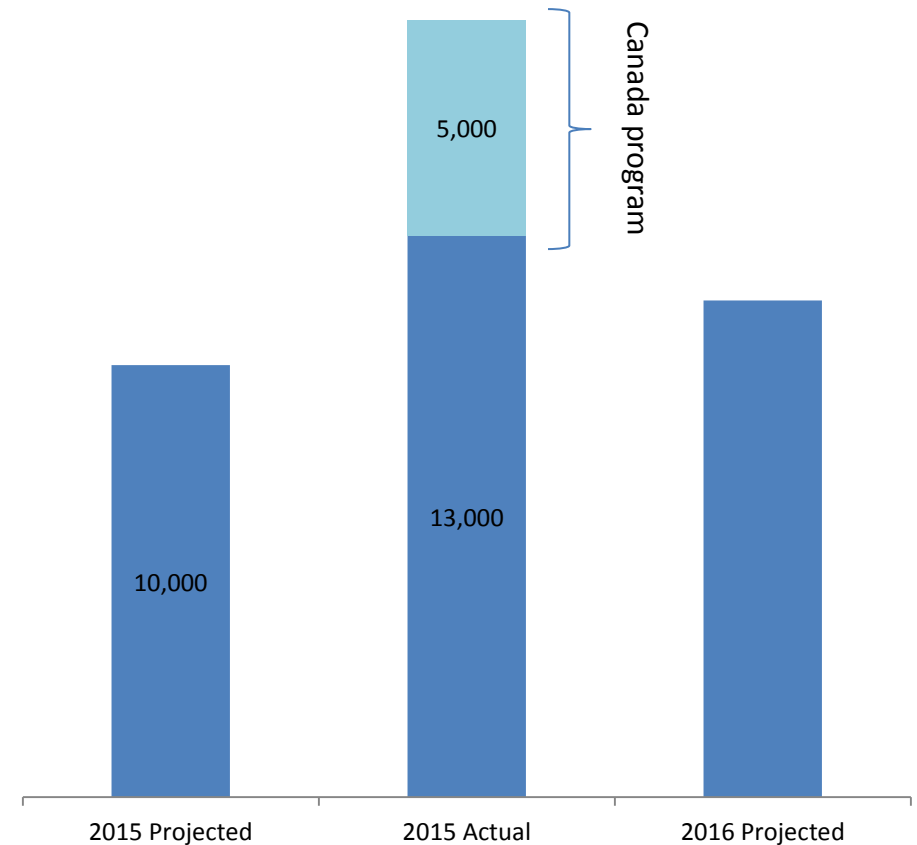


Resettlement

Total resettlement submissions in 2015 exceeded initial projections, particularly with additional Canada transfer programme.

Projected submissions in 2016 will be around the same range as 2015 (between 10,000-13,000).

Firm pledges for 2016 are not yet in place.

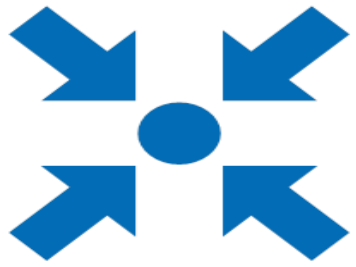

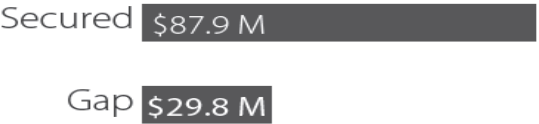

WASH activities are also included in winter plans for contingencies: floor raising kits and extinguishers to mitigate flood and fire risks, graveling of high-traffic pathways and installation of drains

2015/16 Vs. 2014/15 Winter Support Plans

- 1) Wider coverage – 75% of the most vulnerable cadastral to date+ other cold cadastral
→ wider targeting criteria
- 2) Better Funding – 78% of \$95M. By MAR 2015 Vs. 76% of \$117M. By JAN 2016
- 3) Needs based planning – 257,000 families identified to be in need vs. 180,000 total cumulative reach in 2014/15
- 4) Faster responses – Cash transfer programs*

* GCC partners and donors in kind distribution will provide extra support to families; ongoing discussions on how to align with the IA winter support plan

OBSERVATIONS: POST-STORM VLADIMIR

- 1) No casualties recorded
- 2) Material damages: few damaged tents and minor flooding in some ISs reported in the North (Akroum) → families relocated followed by plastic sheeting distribution, 6 septic tanks dislodged – site improvements is on going

PREPARDNESS

- 1) Contingency stock was put in place
- 2) Outreach to municipalities, through partner agencies, local organizations and Refugee Outreach Volunteers (ROVs) -distribution of shelter repair kits, floor raising kits, dewatering interventions

MOSA REFLECTIONS ON THE RESPONSE TO VLADIMIR

- 1) UNHCR offered assistance in Transportation of ITEMs, and some cases where referred to UNHCR for Winter Assistance.
- 2) Responding to Health Services and SDCs were opened during the Day and responding to all cases in addition to distributing medicines to the patients.
- 3) Beyond Health Team was covering all Bekaa and giving a primary health care for refugee.

WINTER SUPPORT – REFLECTIONS

MOSA REFLECTIONS ON THE RESPONSE TO VLADIMIR GAPS:

- Lack of Fuel in Many ITS.
- Lack of Direct intervention from NGOs during the Storm, the preparation were only before and after the storm.
- Lack of coordination with MoSA from all International Agencies.

MOSA REFLECTIONS ON THE RESPONSE TO VLADIMIR GAPS:

- All tents are partially Damaged and the Shelter assistance exists only for total Damaged Tents.
- Some ITS is flooding because the level of the ground and tents are at the same level.

- MoSA will distribute 1000 Blankets in Akroum/Akkar and about 500 food package.

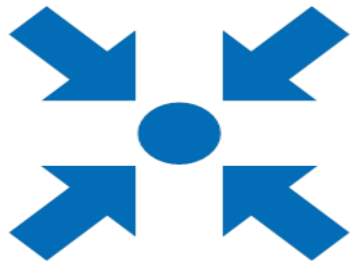
