



Planning and Preparation: On 25 January, UNHCR and IOM launched the regional Refugee and Migrant Response Plan (RMRP), requiring 550,539,647 USD, to respond to the crisis in Europe, Eastern Mediterranean and Western Balkan route. The RMRP, covering the period of January to December 2016, is the outcome of an inter-agency planning process coordinated by UNHCR, IOM with government representatives and 67 partner agencies.

Arrivals and Departures: Arrivals to the Greek shores continue amidst cold temperatures and strong winds and many boats in distress continued to be aided by the Hellenic Coast Guard and Frontex.

Situation at Borders: In Serbia, at Sid train station, 90 people were not permitted to board trains

to Croatia for possessing false documents, no documents at all, or for being of other nationalities than Afghan, Iraqi or Syrian. In Croatia, 12 people were readmitted from Slovenia as they intended to apply for asylum in countries other than Germany and Austria. Similarly, in Slovenia, 49 people were returned by Austrian authorities.

Condition of People: In Greece, transfer of North African nationals from the islands to pre-removal detention facilities on mainland took place yet many more remain on the islands. At the Piraeus port, several hundred people remained on site protesting peacefully for a limited amount of time against the lack of transport to Eidomeni and insufficient information.

Deaths at Sea: None reported.



Critical Developments

In Slovenia, at Dobova, the reorganisation of the reception centre and the new registration system is officially operational. The new system fast tracks the registration process using a pre-screening mechanism.

On 25 January, in Ankara, at the press conference regarding the European Union (EU) - Turkey High Level Political Dialogue Meeting, the Turkish Foreign Minister stressed the need for proper EU-Turkey cooperation. The Turkish government stated it had been working 'meticulously' to implement the EU-Turkey Action Plan. The EU High Representative of the Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and Vice-President of the European Commission noted that the meeting was an opportunity to 'revitalise' strategic cooperation. The EU ensured its support to Turkey in its 'incredible' work in hosting refugees and to manage flows. The priority stated is to save lives and prevent further smuggling while managing the flow of people.

On 25 January, an EU informal meeting of Ministers of Justice and Home Affairs was held. Representatives of the EU Commission and Dutch Presidency of the Council of the EU stressed to media that cooperation, coordination and delivering

on commitments to implement EU proposals were key to managing the refugee emergency. They noted that member states invited the Commission to prepare the legal and practical basis for the continuance of temporary border measures. The European Commissioner for Migration, Home Affairs and Citizenship also called for more reception capacities in Greece and along the Balkans route.

Danish Parliament is to vote on a bill to allow the confiscation of valuables worth in excess of 1,450 USD from refugees. If the bill is passed, the Council of Europe claims it could be a violation of fundamental property rights.

Weather Headlines

- A transition to less cold conditions is now underway across the region with temperatures returning near to or slightly above average through the next few days.
- A thaw of lying snow across northern parts of the region may lead to saturated and muddy conditions under foot.
- Winds across the Aegean will ease through Wednesday.





Weather Assessment

- Temperatures are now becoming less cold across the region. Some showers are possible across southern parts of the region through the rest of Tuesday. In the north, less cold temperatures will lead to a thaw of lying snow, possibly leading to the soil becoming saturated and muddy.
- Winds will briefly increase on Tuesday night across the Aegean but decrease across all areas through Wednesday. Analysis of previous events

would suggest that these lighter winds will likely lead to a gradual increase in arrivals to the Greek Islands.

- Towards the weekend, there is a trend towards less settled conditions which increases the likelihood of rainfall and stronger winds. There is a low risk of some lower temperatures also developing across the north of the region early next week.







Comparison of monthly Mediterranean sea arrivals


