



Arrivals and Departures: In Greece, the office of Alternate Foreign Affairs Minister, Nikos Xydakis, released statistics regarding arrivals to Greece in 2015. Out of a total of 851,319 refugees and migrants reaching the country, approximately 100,000 were rescued by the Hellenic Coast Guard, a majority of whom were Syrian and Afghan nationals. The most significant rise in numbers of arrivals was recorded in December with a 4.9% increase. Meanwhile, 805 people drowned in the Aegean Sea in 2015. In 2015, Greece relocated 82 refugees.

Situation at Borders: In Greece, another ferry strike is expected on 4 - 5 February, and part of 6 February; which may lead to further congestion on the Greek Islands.

Both sites in Eidomeni were congested, hosting up to 4,000 people, leading to some tension. The flow through the border has been restricted, and overcrowding led to delays in registration. In the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, the taxi strike continued. Whilst no agreement was reached, an interim solutions were agreed upon, with one train allowed to depart in the morning. The rest of the people were allowed to travel using taxis and buses.

Condition of People: According to Turkish media reports, 453 people were rescued, then apprehended/detained, on 2 February. The majority of apprehensions were reported in Izmir, Balikesir, and Edirne.

Deaths at Sea: None reported.



Critical Developments

On 3 February, police Directors and Border Unit Heads of the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Serbia, Croatia, Slovenia and Austria met in Skopje. They agreed to establish clear common criteria on the standardisation of registration procedures and documents; individual data collection through registration in national databases and exchange of information across borders in a timely fashion; as well as not allowing people, without travel documents or who present forged documents or false information to transit along the route.

On 3 February, the Council of the European Union stated the 28 member states agreed that the €3 billion EU refugee facility for Turkey will allow the EU to deliver additional humanitarian assistance to refugees in Turkey and their host communities.

On 3 February, in Germany, the coalition agreed on an "asylum package II" which includes an accelerated asylum procedure for people coming from countries deemed 'safe' among others. The package is yet to be voted on in Parliament (Bundestag).

The 'Supporting Syria and the Region 2016' pledging conference hosted by the United Kingdom, Germany, Norway, Kuwait, the United Nations, the

President of the European Council, Donald Tusk, and the High Representative of the European Union Vice-President of the European Commission, Federica Mogherini, is taking place in London. The EU and its Member States have pledged more than €3 billion to assist Syrian people inside Syria as well as refugees and host communities in neighbouring countries for 2016. UN High Commissioner for Refugees, Filippo Grandi, and IOM Director General, William Lacy Swing, attended the event.

On 4 and 5 February, French Interior Minister, Bernard Cazeneuve, and his German counterpart, Thomas de Maizière, are due in Athens for discussions regarding the refugee crisis. On 5 February, the two leaders are expected to meet with Greek Interior Minister, Panagiotis Kouroubilis, for focused discussions on hotspots. On the same day, Cazeneuve is expected to visit the Moria hotspot on Lesbos accompanied by Alternate Minister for Migration, Yannis Mouzalas.

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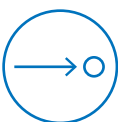

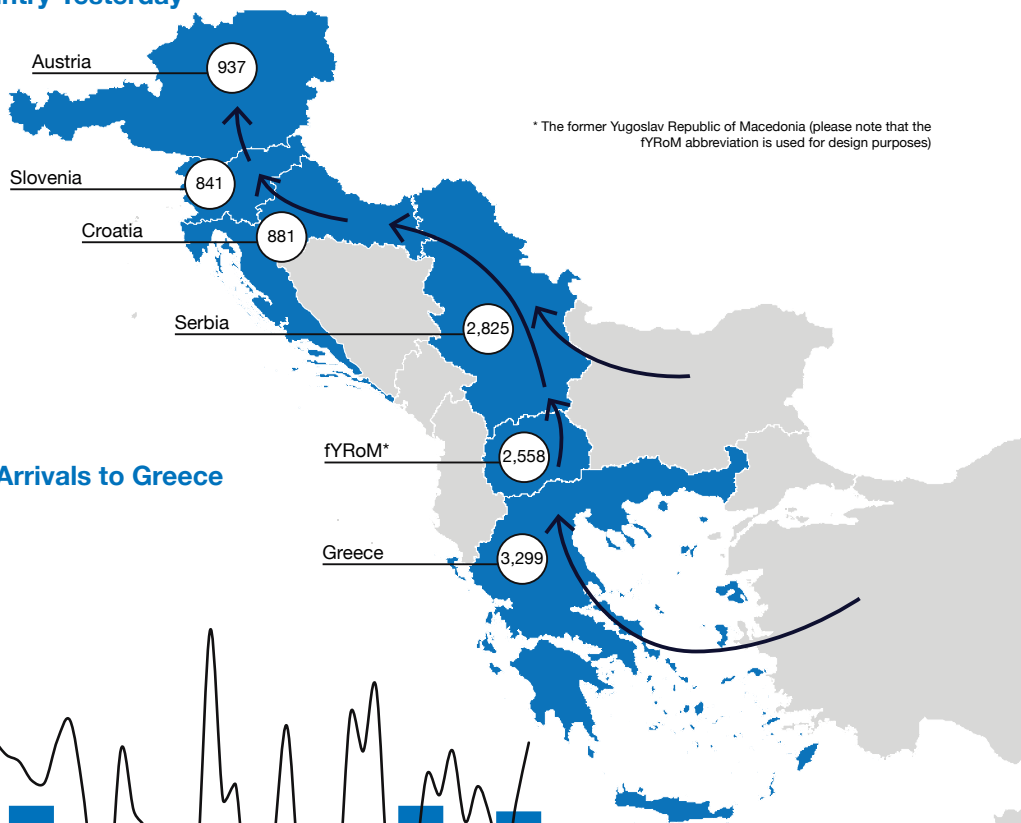

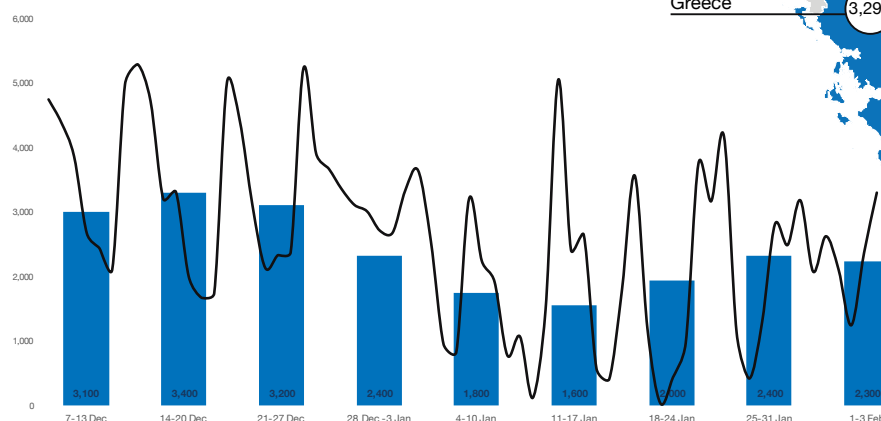

Weather Assessment

- Winds will become very strong at times through Aegean Sea until Sunday, leading to rough seas and large waves developing and presenting dangerous conditions for small boats. Analysis based on previous events suggests that this is likely to result in a significant reduction in the numbers of people arriving on the Greek Islands. Lower temperatures combined with strong northerly winds, leads to a significant wind chill later Friday and into Saturday, and prolonged exposure may lead to a risk of hypothermia for people travelling by sea.
- Heavy rain and thundery showers are likely to affect the south of Greece and the Greek Islands at times later this evening and during Friday, leading to a risk of localised flash flooding in places.



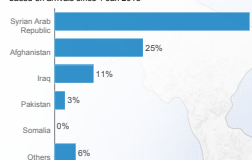
Annex 1

856,723 arrivals by sea in 2015

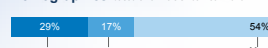
