



### Arrivals and Departures

4,611 people arrived on the Greek islands on 17 February which was a significant increase and represents the highest arrival rate since 9 January. UNHCR expects this trend to continue over the coming days, whilst similar weather conditions prevail

Between 1 January and 16 February, approximately 11,000 asylum applications were recorded in Austria (an average 230 per

day). During the same period approximately 100,000 people entered Austria.

In Greece, approximately 600 people arrived on the military island of Farmakonisi, which was an anomaly, with most arrivals received on other islands, such as Lesvos. The arrivals received coordinated and timely assistance from the Greek Army, Hellenic Coast Guard and UNHCR.

### Condition of People

On the Greek Islands, as four hotspot facilities became functional, registration challenges were noted with significant delays causing

people to wait for extended periods of time and thus requiring accommodation in available facilities. UNHCR and partners provided support to authorities regarding flow management, transportation, accommodation arrangements and additional equipment.



### Critical Developments

The Austrian Government announced that as of 19 February the number of refugees and migrants allowed to transit Austria will be limited to 3,200 persons per day. The number of asylum applications will be limited to 80 per day. At this time, the specifics of implementing such measures remain unclear. This will be discussed at a meeting of Police Directors on 18 February in Zagreb.

Croatian Interior Minister, Vlaho Orepic, stated the Government's intention to engage Austrian and German police forces alongside

police officers from Croatia, Slovenia, Serbia and the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia in refugee and migrant profiling exercises on the border between Greece and the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia. This joint initiative is intended to prevent possible misunderstandings during entry at countries of destination. The proposal will be discussed with all relevant counterparts next week during several high level meetings.

In Slovenia, the Government published a list of "safe countries" from which refugees will

not be allowed entry. The list includes Albania, Algeria, Bangladesh, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Montenegro, Egypt, Kosovo, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Morocco, Serbia, Tunisia and Turkey. However, people from these countries will still be able to seek asylum in Slovenia in exceptional cases, when their life is deemed to be in danger due to personal circumstances.



## Response

In Slovenia, at Sentilj, UNHCR held a meeting with the police to clarify communication to people denied entry at the Austrian border. They will be informed of criteria for rejection (which are based, to the best of UNHCR's knowledge, on information provided by the border authorities). They will also be

informed on available options. They will be re-registered, issued with new documents and transferred to Postonja Centre for Foreigners. It was confirmed that people who wish to may seek asylum in Slovenia.

- Unsettled weather is expected in Greece on Friday with rain showers and thunderstorms and periods of moderate or rough waves around the Islands.

## Average Daily Arrivals and Trends Greece



## Social Media

An emerging trend on Twitter are several stories around the World Food Program (WFP) introducing an Iris-scanning system as a more effective method of paying for food in the King Abdullah Park refugee camp in Jordan. The camp currently accommodates 1,000 people. This is linked to a [UNHCR system](#) currently in use within Jordan, who use biometric technology to make it easier for refugees to access cash.

Several Twitter accounts highlighted Greek media reports that amid fears the number of refugees and migrants arriving to Europe will increase with the onset of warmer weather, the Bulgarian government has granted more authority to border guards.

Key locations crossed by refugees




## Weather Assessment

- Seas will build to moderate on Friday around the Greek Islands, when this has occurred previously we have seen a slight reduction in arrivals on the Islands compared to when we have calm seas. Seas will decrease on Saturday but will become rough again on Sunday.
- Temperatures will return close to average for the time of year on Friday. An area of unsettled weather with strong winds and rain showers/thunderstorms will affect the Greek Islands on Friday morning making it feel colder and damper to those sleeping outside. Although Saturday is expected to be a better day overnight into Sunday there will be some rain and strong northerly winds.
- Over Serbia, Croatia and Slovenia there will also be some light showers on Friday and some moderate outbreaks of rain on Saturday morning.






Estimated daily arrivals
