


Situation of displaced people in Diffa region in numbers



- 99,852** DISPLACED PEOPLE FROM NIGERIA REGISTERED BY THE GOVERNMENT INCLUDING (25 JANUARY 2015)
- 85,872** CHILDREN AND WOMEN DISPLACED FROM NIGERIA (25 JANUARY 2015)
- 53** SUSPECTED MEASLES CASES REGISTERED (MSP, 3 MAY 2015)
- 106** SITES WHERE DISPLACED PEOPLE HAVE BEEN REGISTERED BY THE GOVERNMENT BEFORE BOKO HARAM ATTACKS IN DIFFA REGION
- 27,405** PEOPLE DISPLACED FROM LAKE CHAD ISLANDS SINCE 6 MAY 2015 HOSTED IN 3 NEW TEMPORARY SITES IN NGUIGMI, BOSSO AND DIFFA (CCH, 14 MAY 2015)

HUMAN REOURCES: SCALING UP OF UNICEF PRESENCE IN THE FIELD

- One National Emergency Officer in Diffa since 2013, in charge of coordinating UNICEF emergency response at sub-national level.
- One Programme Assistant in charge of monitoring UNICEF emergency response at sub-national level (induction ongoing response) will be in Diffa starting 3rd week of May.
- HR support from Maradi Zonal Office and Niamey Office in Health, Nutrition, Protection, WASH, Education, Communication.
- Child Protection support from the Child Protection Rapid Response Team to coordinate the Child Protection sub Cluster.
- Support of the Swiss Development Cooperation for deployment of WASH expert in Diffa (induction ongoing, will be in Diffa starting 3rd week of May)
- Ongoing recruitment for Education, Protection, Health/Nutrition experts for Diffa team.
- Regular joint missions from UNICEF Maradi and Niamey

SUPPLIES

- 4,204 blankets, 2,081 mosquito nets, 6,094 buckets, 12,200 jerricans, 4,460 tarpaulins, 6,432 plastic mats and one (10,000 L) water bladder have been sent to Diffa region to support people recently displaced from Lake Chad Islands and hosted in Diffa, Nguigmi and Bosso. Items are being distributed by the Regional Committee for emergency response in Diffa.
- On the 14th of April, 2,545 boxes of RUTF and essential drugs were prepositioned in Diffa to cover the needs of an additional 3,822 children suffering from SAM and to complete MAM treatment for 4,400 children. UNICEF is collaborating with Save the Children.
- During the month of April, essential medicines for the treatment of diarrhea, malaria and respiratory infections were positioned in 32 health centres in Diffa region to cover the needs of 102,000 children and pregnant women, in collaboration with Save the Children and MSF.



NUTRITION

8,407

Children under 5 with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) have been treated in Diffa in 2015 (30th of April).

CHILD PROTECTION

4,860

Children benefitted from psychosocial support through a mobile team in the camps and in host communities (out a total of **9,750** children being targeted). Activities are ongoing.



HEALTH & HIV/AIDS

254,664

Children aged 9 months-14 years have been vaccinated against measles (including 26,762 displaced children) in Diffa region between end of December and 3rd of May 2015

102,037

Children under 5 and pregnant women access primary health care at health center level thanks to repositioning of medicines at health center level.



WASH

13,215

Households reached by UNICEF partners with cholera sensitization and distribution of water purification tabs (host and displaced communities) on a total of **13,575** targeted by Save the Children and IEDA.

UNICEF response

- UNICEF is supporting the installation of Sayam Forage refugee camp, hosting over 1,200 refugees, by providing squatting plates, water bladders, NFIs and recreational and ECD kits to UNHCR to ensure access to water and sanitation and support safe spaces for children as part of child protection.
- In May 2015, the government relocated 42,887 people living in Chad Islands. Among them, 15,482 have been transported to the Nigeria border by the government in coordination with the Nigerian authorities, while 27,405 have been relocated in 3 temporary sites where the government and its partners are providing assistance (including NFIs provided by UNICEF). The national refugee commission is planning to register the displaced people hosted in the 3 temporary sites before sensitizing them to move to the refugee and IDPs camps. In parallel, UNICEF continues to support displaced people and host communities outside the camps and temporary sites.
- With UNICEF, COOPI has installed psychosocial support units in the transit sites Gagamari, Chetimari, Kablewa, and the Sayam Forage refugee camp, and temporary sites Nguigmi and Kimégama. As of 15th of May, COOPI reached 4,860 children among a targeted 9,750 children. UNICEF is also working on the implementation of a Child Protection Monitoring system in Diffa in collaboration with partners.
- UNICEF organized a measles vaccination campaign which started on April 27 and ran until the May 3 to target 193,000 children 9 months to 14 years old in the two health districts (Maine Soroa and N'Guigmi) not covered by the previous measles vaccination campaign (in December/January 2015). As of early May 2015, 254,664 children have been vaccinated against measles in Diffa region through the 2 campaigns.
- UNICEF implementing partners in Diffa, IEDA Relief and Save the Children, began their programme of cholera prevention and response in October 2014 (563 cholera cases have been registered in Diffa from October 2014 to February 2015). Since mid-February, thanks to joint efforts, no cholera cases have been registered.
- To ensure access to quality primary education for displaced communities, UNICEF in collaboration with COOPI identified 10 schools that are integrating displaced children. UNICEF is strengthening their capacities by building 14 additional classrooms, training teachers, and providing additional educational supplies for teachers and children. UNICEF is planning to support an additional school in Sayam Forage where 5 additional classrooms will be built.
- CERF funding (1,995,000 USD) has been received and planned activities are being implemented. Preliminary results are not yet available.
