



NIGERIA: DISPLACEMENT AND CONFLICT SITUATION AS OF NOV 2015

Nigeria faces immense humanitarian and protection challenges due to the ongoing insurgency in the North East. The conflict has caused grave human rights violations, impacting particularly on the most vulnerable civilians. As of October 2015, there are **2,233,506** persons internally displaced in the North East and North Central regions, with **95%** of the displacements originating from Borno, Adamawa and Yobe States as a result of the insurgency. The number of internally displaced has risen from 1.2 million in February 2015 to 2.15 million in August 2015 as the conflict has endured and as the data tracking team has had greater geographical coverage in new areas freed by the counter-insurgency. It is likely, however, that the actual displacement figures could be much higher, especially as 27 Local Government Areas in the most affected States are currently in insecure and inaccessible areas. 92 percent of internally displaced persons live among host communities while only 8 percent are located in official camps run by the Government and other camp like sites. Conditions in informal and formal IDP sites remain problematic, with lack of sufficient services, poor coordination, family separation, restrictions on freedom of movement and continued insecurity. The resources of host communities that opened their doors to over 2 million IDPs are being exhausted, with tensions within some communities.




DISPLACEMENT (BY TYPE) IOM-DTM VI
