CCCM Agency – RSG, UNHCR, LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none">Regular CMC meeting was held on 12th August and participated by 30 (5 women) representatives from CMC, social groups and camp based committees and discussed on camp level issues - NFI, health, livelihood, shelter and WASH, Education and Food.Inter-agency meeting was held on 26th August and participated by 30 (12 Women) representatives from CMC, YDG, CDG, WDG, DRC and LWF.1 CRM set was damaged by the cyclone and no compliant letter in August through box.One old man died of illness on 26/8/2015 that lived at long house 23 and room no 5.Conducted protection mainstreaming training on 18-19 August by UNHCR and attended by 20 (3 female) participants.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">LWF completed regular repair and maintenance of 500 rooms under regular program.CMC and IDPs requested to repair 11 collapsed shelters and 10 leaning shelters which are delayed to be repaired. LWF is planning to repair the shelters damaged by cyclone.

Food and Nutrition Agency – SCI and ACF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • SCI distributed only Rice and Blended food (for U5 years old Children) for 1,011 families with 4,032 population on 31st August. • In this month, food ration distribution was late. As IDPs cannot buy or borrow food ration from the host community, it is very difficult for them when there is late distribution. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CMC requested to distribute food for additional 143 families transferring from Nget Chaung and Ohn Taw Gyi South as they are not receiving ration since beginning. • CMC and IDPs requested to provide fully package of food ration at beginning of the month.
Health Agency – MHAA, MSF, MOH	<p>MHAA is providing health services as below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Monday and Friday (2 days/week) - 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. • Some IDPs suffered from sickness (illness) and body pain. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CMC & WDG requested to provide midwife training. • IDPs requested to increase health care service time/days.
NFIs Agency: UNHCR, ICRC	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ICRC distributed cooking fuel/charcoal 2 bags per family on 31st August. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CMC/WDG requested to provide touch light or solar light.
Shelter and camp infrastructure Agency – RSG, UNHCR, LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 97 long houses and 776 rooms have been repaired in the camp by LWF. • 11 shelters and over 550 rooms are damaged by the cyclone. 10 shelters are leaning by the cyclone (Shelters numbers are 54, 79, 60, 83, 94, 46, 50, 39, 18 and 72). The families who live in collapsed shelters are staying in makeshifts, modular house and small hut (made from collapsed shelter materials). • LWF is planning to renovate partially damaged 533 rooms by the cyclone. Now Shelters repair process is on-going and 500 rooms have been repaired in the first phase. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • About 378 families are using kitchen rooms, makeshifts and modular house as shelters for long time. Shelters were inadequate for IDPs in the camps since beginning. • CMC and IDPs requested to renovate all damaged rooms, collapsed, leaning shelters and CMC block. • LWF discussed with CMC on repairing remaining 33 rooms as soon as possible. • LWF has plans to support internal road and walkway.
WASH Agency - SI	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Among 200 latrines in the camp, most of the latrines need repair due to lack or poor condition of materials such as pipe or wall or cup. • SI is planning on distribution family cards during 8th-11th September for water distribution monitoring survey in the camp. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CMC request to WASH agency to clean water logged condition under shelter because dirty water makes bad smell and unhygienic surroundings. • IDPs request to renovate latrines.
Protection and Community Service Agency –DRC, SCI, LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • LWF provided books, journals to the community library to improve IDPs' general knowledge and to get basic information every Monday of the month. • LWF organized social group meetings (WDG, YDG). • LWF announced trainer and trainees for tailoring or dress making training. • LWF did livelihood need assessment this month. • SCI is supporting 2 Child friendly Centres in the camp. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CMC and Social groups requested to support livelihood activities–livestock rearing, tailoring, gardening etc. • Disabled people requested to support their basic needs, supportive devices and livelihood activity. • DRC will provide clothes, torch light for emergency. • DRC will support livestock to IDPs for livelihood.
Fire safety and DRR Agency - LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • LWF mobilized fire volunteers for monitoring fire safety points. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fire safety volunteers requested to provide refresher training and DRR training. LWF has plan to do refresher (3-days training next month) for fire volunteers.
