Sector	Updates	Key Concerns
CCCM Agency – RSG, UNHCR, LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> CMC hold monthly meeting on 6th April and participated by 30 (14 Women) participants and discussed on camp level issues - NFI, health, livelihood, shelter and water supply. IDPs returned 840 white cards to the government on 13th April. Inter-agency meeting was held on 21st April and participated by 37 (17 Women) representatives from CMC, YDG, CDG, WDG and LWF and discussed on inadequate health services, water supply and shelter status. LWF did not receive any complaints from the camp through complaint box during this month. LWF provided visibility kits to 39 (18 Female) (1 T-shirt, 1 bag) to CMC members and Incentive workers on 6th April. CMC reported that 17 IDPs (3 families) from Ohn Taw Gyi camps (South and North) moved to ANY camp first week of April. They are currently staying in the tents that made by themselves. LWF conducted a training to build capacity of CMC members and incentive workers on effective communication, leadership, CCCM roles and responsibilities, and CRM on 30th April. There were 30 CMC members (15 Women) and 9 Incentive workers (3 Women) participants. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> LWF informed to CMC about headcount survey was collected to get accurate population and families in the camp.

The families of collapsed shelters are living in temporary shelters constructed by them. LWF will repair those shelters before or during rainy season. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> About 250 families are using kitchen rooms and makeshifts as shelter. CMC and IDPs requested to renovate all damaged rooms and collapsed shelters before rainy season. CMC also requested information from Govt. about the status IDP relocation.
WASH Agency - SI	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> There are 200 latrines in the camp, but significant numbers of latrines are damaged especially pipe, wall, and cup. Preparation and beginning of the water deliveries by boat and distribution, with a limit of 5 litre/day/agreed on 16th March. The water is supplying 2 times (8 am – 12 pm and 2 pm to 5 pm) per day (5 days per week). According to CMC 5 litters per day is not enough for different purpose. It is just enough for drinking water. SI is constructing 700 ft. long brick drainage; it has now finished 300 ft. Regular daily Health Promotion activities through HH visit and health promotion sessions. Latrine cleaning is ongoing as per requirement. Waste management campaigns are conducted twice a week. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Lack of water source is hindering for adequate water supply in the area. CMC and IDPs requested to distribute drinking water daily during the hot season. Also IDP women are request to provide water bucket to store water.
Protection and Community Service Agency - LWF, DRC, SCI	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> LWF facilitated social groups meetings. Social groups requested to support livelihood activities – livestock rearing, tailoring, home gardening etc. Tailoring training that provided by SCI for 25 women was completed at the end of April.
