<b>Camp coordination and Camp Management</b>  Agency - LWF	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>3 CMC leaders attended meeting organized by Township Administration Office at Hmanzi Junction and shared concerns and situation of the camp in each Wednesday of the month.</li> <li>Chief Minister, Rakhine State visited Thae Kay Pyin School with concerned government focal persons and discussed with CMC leaders.</li> <li>CMC meeting held on 11th February and participated by 36 (14 females) participants from CMC and camp based committees.</li> <li>OCHA, Gender Equality Network (GEN), conducted a focus group discussion and interviewed to CMC members and Women group and assessed gender equality in WASH activities on 25<sup>th</sup> February.</li> <li>Conducted camp level Inter-agency meeting on 25th February and participated by 30 (16 Female) representatives from MM, SCI, ACF, CDN, LWF, CMC and camp based committees and discussed on camp activities and issues.</li> <li>Supplied stationaries for CMC operation, population and activity dash boards to update camp population and activities.</li> <li>CMC collected contribution from its members and purchased a telephone set to replace the existing one which was not in good condition.</li> <li>Five (3 girls) babies born during the month. One woman IDP passed away because of diarrhoea.</li> </ul>					<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>In CMC meeting, participation from camp based committees is increasing.</li> <li>There is complexity in updating camp population due to different dynamics of the population transition.</li> <li>Household survey and white card application are in concerns of the IDPs.</li> </ul>
