- PROTECTION: Regular activities ongoing; no updates.
- NUTRITION: Regular activities ongoing; no updates.
- CHILD PROTECTION: Regular activities ongoing; no updates.

18 - Sin Tet Maw Village (estimated 3,700 residents)

19 - Ah Htet Ywar Village

- PROTECTION: Completed delivery of solar equipment for all households, as part of Community Protection Assistance.

20 - Baw Da Li Village (estimated 900 residents)

21 - Ah Nauk Ywe IDP Camp (estimated 3,900 residents)

Issue

- PROTECTION: Unresolved problems related to IDPs demands to change all current camp-based INGO staff, rotate all jobs among individuals selected by the Camp Committee, and share salaries with the poorest families. IDPs do not allow any SI WASH activities, threatening mass disturbances and murder of unspecified individuals. INGOs met with IDP representatives, including once with the Township Administrator, but IDPs insisted on their ultimatum and rejected any alternatives or compromise.
- CAMP MANAGEMENT / SHELTER: No update re: shortage of shelter as approx. 223 IDPs arrived from Sittwe camps and currently staying with friends and family.
 - Many of shelters reportedly with damaged floors and roofs, making it very difficult to stay inside at night during the heavy rains.
 - IDPs report that the walkways are dangerous for children as too muddy and slippery during the rainy season. IDPs would prefer all walkways to be of the same design as the ones in front of latrines.
- WASH: All WASH activities by SI are suspended due to obstruction by the IDP Camp Management Committee. See more details under PROTECTION above.

HEALTH: MoH mobile clinic, accompanied by the police, came once. IDPs reported insufficient medicine and lack of trust towards Govt medical workers.

- Increase in diarrhoea cases reported: according to some report , over 300, of whom around 200 reportedly children <5 years old. SI moved the water distribution closer to the camp in May.
- MRCS reportedly visited to check and deliver ORS
- FOOD: New arrivals who are not on WFP food list, request to be added. Other IDPs have to share their food rations with those not receiving food. June ration was distributed on 5th June and July ration was distributed 8th July
- EDUCATION: UNICEF already distributed school kits in Ak Nauk Ye, and we will provide Essential learning packages (backpack and stationary) to children attending the TLSs. UNICEF is currently in discussion with LWF to handover education activities in Ah Nauk Ye. LWF will be the responsible to build/repair TLSs, select and train new teachers.

Status

- Problem raised with PoC and Security Minister. Joint visit by Govt, UN and INGOs planned for early July.

- SI: Number of diarrhoea cases cannot be confirmed as diarrhoea cases follow up stopped since Hygiene Promotion Activities stopped end of May due to the situation – but indeed increase of cases reported – no accurate data available though
-SCI Food is looking into this.

- NON-FOOD ITEM: ICRC delivered cooking fuel and stoves for all households.
- NUTRITION: SCI Nutrition camp-based staff prevented from fully carrying out their activities as a result of demands from the Camp Committee (see PROTECTION above).
- CHILD PROTECTION: IDPs report that the walkways are dangerous for children as too slippery during the rainy season.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ CAMP MANAGEMENT/ PROTECTION: Following the events in Ah Nauk Ywe camp, Camp Administrator, IDP Camp Management Committee and "labour leaders" met and decided that all camp-based INGO staff will have to give 1/3 of their salaries to be redistributed among the IDPs with no income. . 13 leaders who are selected by IDPs called all volunteers and gave a force to sign in a paper for agreement, so some volunteers had to sign in front of them. ➤ SHELTER: IDPs reported damage of an unspecified number of shelters. ➤ WASH: Regular activities ongoing. Latrine pits need desludging. ECHO visited on 11.06.2014, gave mostly positive feedback on the progress compared to previous visit. ➤ HEALTH: MoH mobile clinic came once; many IDPs reportedly did not have an opportunity to receive assistance due to the clinic's limited hours. ➤ Increase in diarrhoea cases reported: total over 300, of whom around 200 reportedly children <5 years old. SCI moved the water distribution closer to the camp. MRCS visited to check and deliver ORS. DEATHS: One elderly person died reportedly of severe diarrhoea. ➤ FOOD: June ration distributed 7th and 8th June ➤ CHILD PROTECTION: SCI is following closely the reported increase in diarrhoea, which mostly affected children <5. NUTRITION: SCI Nutrition delivered 500 ORS for distribution when needed, in response to the increased reports of diarrhoea cases. ➤ EDUCATION: No updates. ➤ NON-FOOD ITEM: Cooking fuel sticks for the second month planned to be delivered by Friday 11 July 	<p>-Response pending the outcome of Govt visit to ANY camp, planned for end-June.</p> <p>-DRC and SCI WASH are taking necessary measures. WASH Cluster is following up.</p>
