LWF facilitated the Inter agency meeting on December 22 participated by CMC, SI, Police Check Post and LWF. Family data are under a verification process. LWF conducted a CMC training on their roles and responsibility. LWF mobilized 6 incentive workers after orientation, accomplished performance review and distributed incentive. So, woman use latrines to take a bath.
