

SITE UPDATES

Bentiu

National CCCM Cluster

Completing a cornerstone activity of 2017, the Cluster brought together 18 partners from Healthlink, Internews, Danish Refugee Council (DRC), ACTED, UNHCR and IOM with Cluster experts for a CCCM Training of Trainers, which piloted new global CCCM training materials and focused on building skills and strategies to more fully engage displaced persons and local partners in CCCM.

Decongestion: With each PoC and Collective Center resident having an average living space of only 5 m² and 1-4 square meters respectively which is far below Sphere standards of 30m², CCCM continues to advocate for long term solutions. In the intermediate term, CCCM has begun site rehabilitation and internal relocation to relieve congestion, communicating with community leaders to share relocation plans and pilot relocation exercises.

Community Watch: To strengthen community based protection, camp management engaged UNPOL, who carried out a 3-day training for 200 Community Watch Group members on community dispute resolution, participation, and Gender Based Violence (GBV).

Collective Site Elections: In coordination with church leadership at Cathedral, CCCM initiated the election process for block leaders, youth, women's, and Chiefs' committees.

A Cultural Center Library is under construction to provide camp residents and youth with access to reading materials and space for cultural events.

The latest PoC Population Count indicated 114,537 IDPs living in the camp, down from 117,267 at the beginning of the month, the majority leaving to cultivate land. Nearly 5,000 individuals are living in communal shelters and in service areas due to over-congestion of the site.

A Collective Center Head Count in Bentiu/Rubkona town identified 2,079 individuals. Relocation may be due to return home for cultivation.

Aburoc IDP site 10,298

Camp management is fully operational and has initiated a mapping of camp site, service locations, and flood-risk areas. Rapid headcount estimates population at 10,298.

Bor PoC Bor PoC 2.380

In coordination with camp residents and other stakeholders including UNMISS, camp management led a population fixing exercise to support WFP registration, finding 2,380 camp residents. New arrivals from Northern Jonglei have slowed and clearing of a contingency area for construction of communal shelters is underway.

Cholera Response Coordination: An outbreak of eight cholera cases was reported during the current period. In response, camp management in coordination with WASH and Health Cluster is undertaking response and contingency planning.

Solar Lighting: Camp Management has completed installation of 35 additional solar lights within Blocks and near latrines and water points to improve safe access at night. At request of women's leadership, Camp Management is constructing "reading spaces" in POC3 for youth to study during evenings under the new solar lights.

An assessment of community perceptions of leadership structures and information sources in the camps was conducted in May to inform CCCM activities planning.
