Establishment of new Camp Committees by RSG	The names of the newly established camp committees in OTG north and south and BDP 1 & 2 were shared with LWF and DRC. In all the other camps, as far as <i>this</i> Cluster has understood, the Committees remain the same. LWF and DRC will train the Camp Committees in their camps while CCCM will train the Committees in Set Yoe Kya 1 & 2 upon request from Save the Children. Save the Children staff will then train the Committees in Thet Khet Pyin and Maw Ti Nyar. TOR's will also be discussed with the camp committees	CCCM to confirm with DC if Camp Committees in all camps except OTG north and south and BDP 1 & 2 remain the same. CCCM to provide

In this coordination meeting all the state government focal points for the different camps were introduced. CCCM has tried to get the names of the focal points but ‘as they keep changing’, has not managed yet to get a hold of the list.</p> <p>ICRC to pilot a project of distribution of rice husk in SYS 3 and OTG 2. Project is slightly delayed and will now start middle November. CCCM is still waiting for the signing of the contract for the feasibility study between local NGO ‘Evergreen’ and UNHCR.</p> <p>Jon (OCHA) distributed guidelines on the use of notice boards to the CM agencies. The guidelines were accepted and appreciated. Regarding Jon’s request for communications support, the CM agencies preferred a one-on-one meeting to discuss this matter.</p> <p>ACF asked CCCM to raise the issue of WaSH M&amp;E by CM agencies. After some discussion, it was agreed that Camp Management agencies would monitor WaSH service provision in camps but do not have the technical expertise to conduct full M&amp;E.</p>	<p>training for camp committees in SYK 1 &amp; 2.</p> <p>CCCM to get the list of names of the state government focal points.</p> <p>CCCM to check on the status of the contract.</p> <p>Jon (OCHA) to contact the CM agencies.</p>	
<p>Update by CM agencies</p>	<p>- <b>DRC:</b> training of Camp Committees is in process and will start around the 18 November.</p> <p>- <b>SCI:</b> reported on the incident that happened during NFI distribution in Maw Ti Nyar between different IDP groups</p>		

	<p>last week. Two people were stabbed but situation was quickly resolved by local government forces. SCI expressed their concerns about fire in the camps as there are no fire prevention measures in place.</p> <p>- <b>LWF:</b> The issue of Aung Mingalar IDPs and food distribution was raised. LWF is in the process of identifying the names on the UNHCR (protection) list so that families can receive food. LWF also reported that one of their volunteers resigned/disappeared and is wondering whether standardisation of incentives is being adhered to by all service providers? However, the volunteer might also have left the camp by boat to seek employment outside Rakhine. Additionally, LWF reported that, “allegedly”, the Camp Leader of Basara (Village Administrator) is asking IDPs to pay 500 Kyat per month to collect their WFP food rations.</p> <p>- <b>Solidarites:</b> as the WsSH agency in Nget Chaung (NC) and An Nauk Yae (ANY) (camps not covered under a CM agency), Solidarites would like to express their concerns about the following:</p> <p>Nget Chaung:</p> <p>As highlighted in several occasions, the situation in NC is acceptable for the moment, because the number of people is low (less than 1400 people). The moment the Sin Tet Maw IDPs come back (which is imminent in terms of Government plans), critical situation will arise :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* Insufficient room for everybody;</li> <li>* Presence of Min Bya and Myebon IDPs, perceived as "foreigners", and prevented from community participation;</li> <li>* Existing Camp Committee appointed by Government representative from Old Cha Eik and New Cha Eik, none from other Townships;</li> <li>* Bad condition of the pathways becoming a danger;</li> <li>* Self-organized school accessible only to IDP paying the teacher, i.e. lack of a temporary learning space/centre.</li> </ul> <p>Ah Nauk Ye:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* IDPs refuse to move to the shelters, although they have been “pushed” several times today. However the real reason why they do not move is a protection issue, not addressed today;</li> </ul>	<p>CCCM to raise the issue with WFP</p>	
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>* Not enough room for everybody - construction of 15 new shelters is planned but not yet started;</li> <li>* Existing Camp Committee appointed by Government;</li> <li>* Bad condition of the pathways becoming a danger;</li> <li>* Tense relationship with Ah Nauk Ye village</li> </ul>	CCCM to raise the different issues with the appropriate cluster/sector
