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1. DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL PROFILE

NB: Figures and values in the profile only represent the population surveyed in household survey, not the total Afghanistan population, unless stated otherwise.

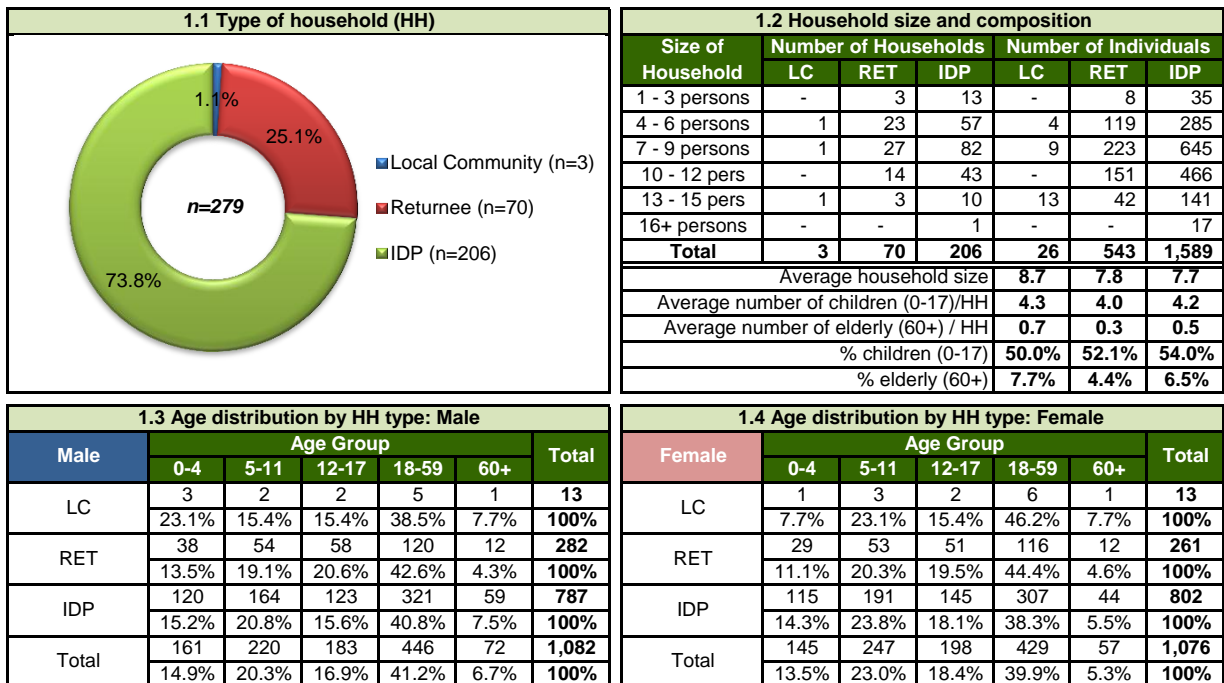
Summary

The Sashpol returnee settlement is located approximately 13 km east of Bamyan City, along the main Bamyan-Kabul Road.

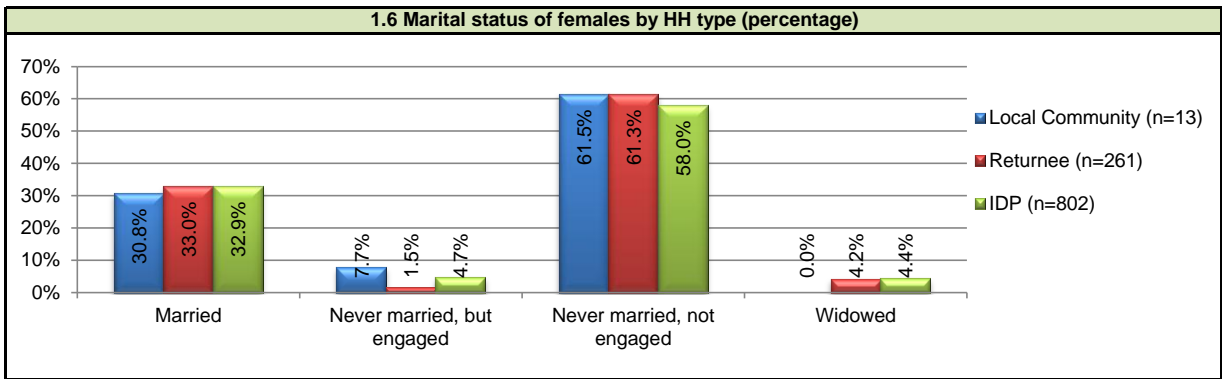
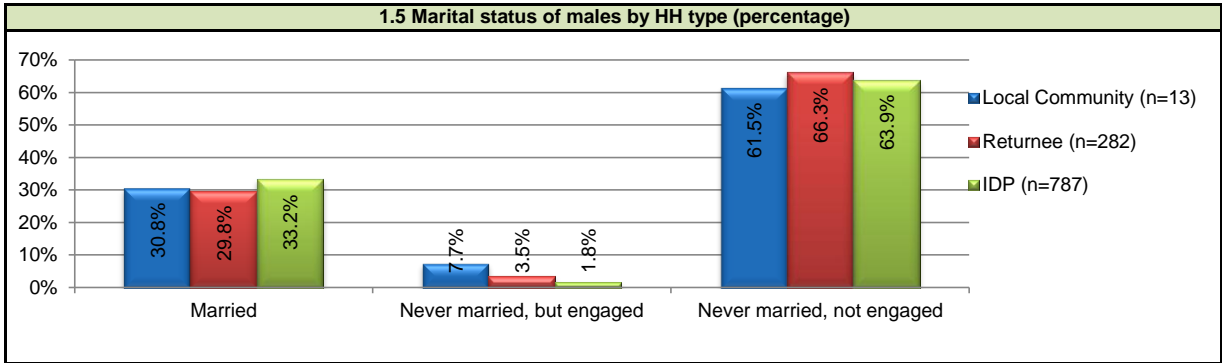
Of the 279 households surveyed in Sashpol, 206 (73.8%) were IDP households, 70 (25.1%) were returnee households and three (1.1%) were local community households. The households encompass a combined total of 2,158 individuals with a gender ratio of 1:1.

The average household size was revealed by the survey to be 8.7 persons among local community households, 7.8 persons among returnee households and 7.7 persons among IDP households. Children (0-17 years) account for approximately half the average household size across all three groups with a gender ratio of 1:1.

The elderly (aged 60+) were found to constitute 7.7% of local community households, 6.5% of IDP households and 4.4% of returnee households. Approximately 2.6% of the population reported to be widowed with over four times as many widows (n=46) as widowers (n=10).



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2. MIGRATION PROFILE

Summary

Among the households surveyed, the year 1384 (2005/06) witnessed the largest number of arrivals in the HRA with 40 IDP households and 32 returnee households choosing to settle in Sashpol. Since then, on average, four returnee households per year have chosen to settle in the area. Following the arrival of a further 30 IDP households in 1385 (2006/07), an average of 12 IDP households per year have chosen to settle in the area in subsequent years.

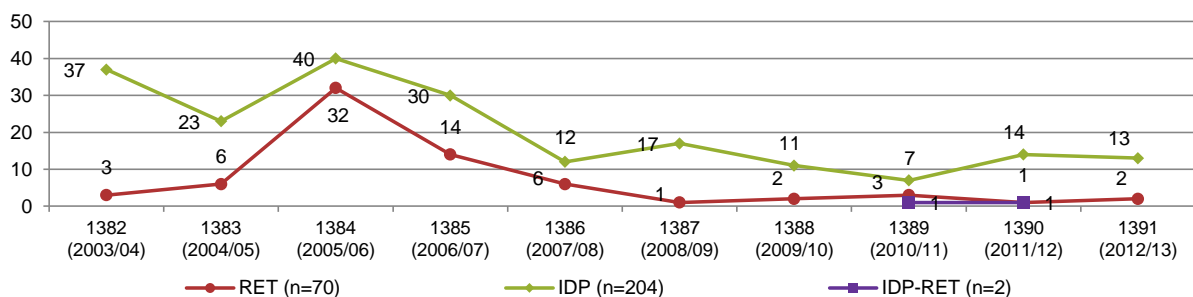
Of returnee and IDP households that have settled in Sashpol in the last two years, all stated that they did so voluntarily. Of these, all returnee households and 92.9% of IDP households stated that they intend to remain in the area.

All returnee households had sought asylum in either Pakistan (70.8%) or Iran (29.2%) with over 80.0% stating that they did so due to harassment/discrimination and for safety reasons due to conflict. More than half also cited economic reasons and over one-third cited family reasons.

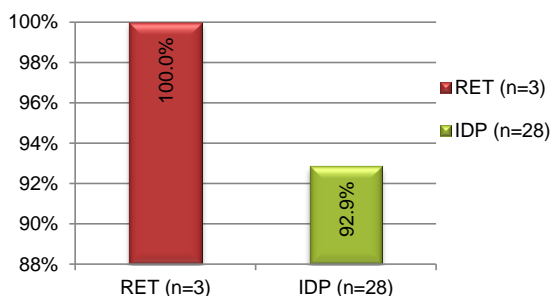
Among IDP households, over 70.0% cited harassment/discrimination and safety concerns due to conflict as the main reasons for having fled their districts of origin. Over one-third also cited family reasons and economic reasons as having influenced their decision to move.

Reasons for returning to Afghanistan varied depending upon year of return. Households that returned during the period 1382-1387 (2003/04 - 2008/09) typically cited economic reasons as the main motivation for return. For those households in Sashpol that returned to Afghanistan over the past five years, improved safety and legal difficulties in the country of asylum were cited as the main pull factors.

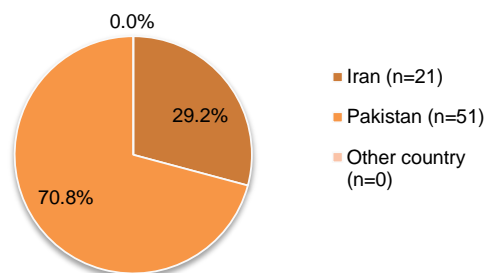
2.1 Year households settled in current location



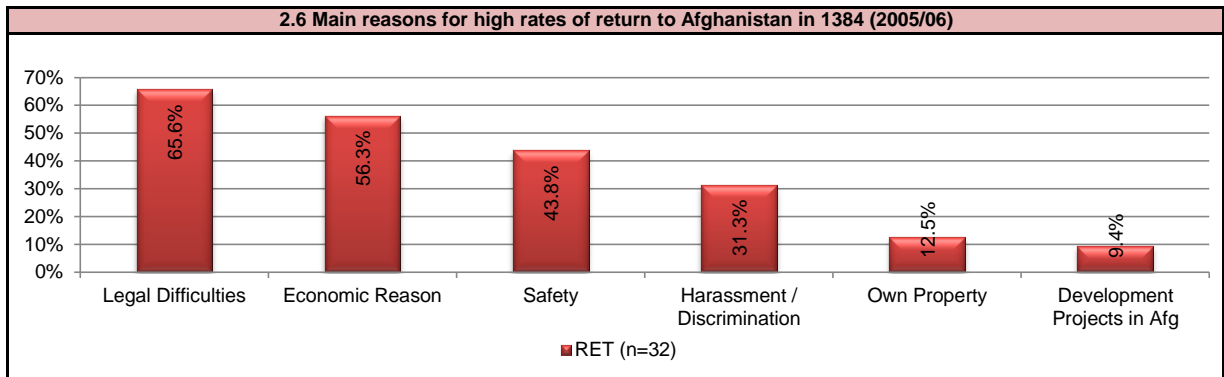
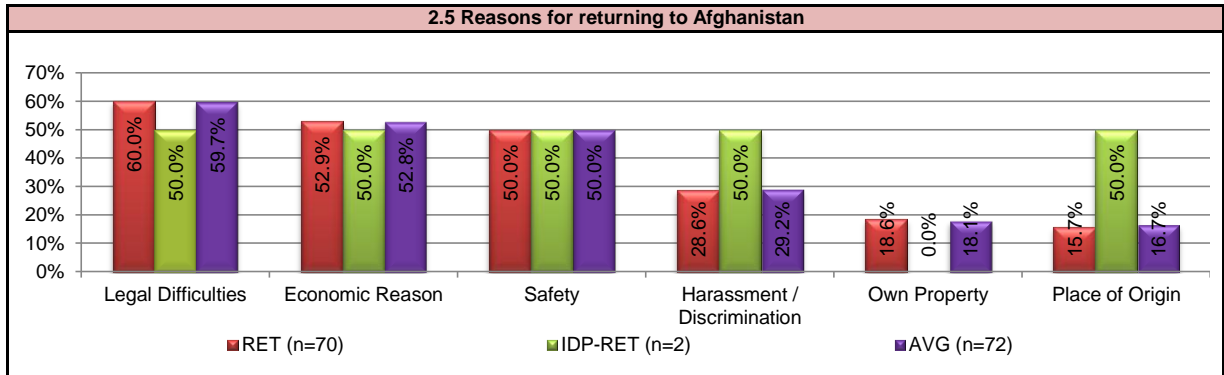
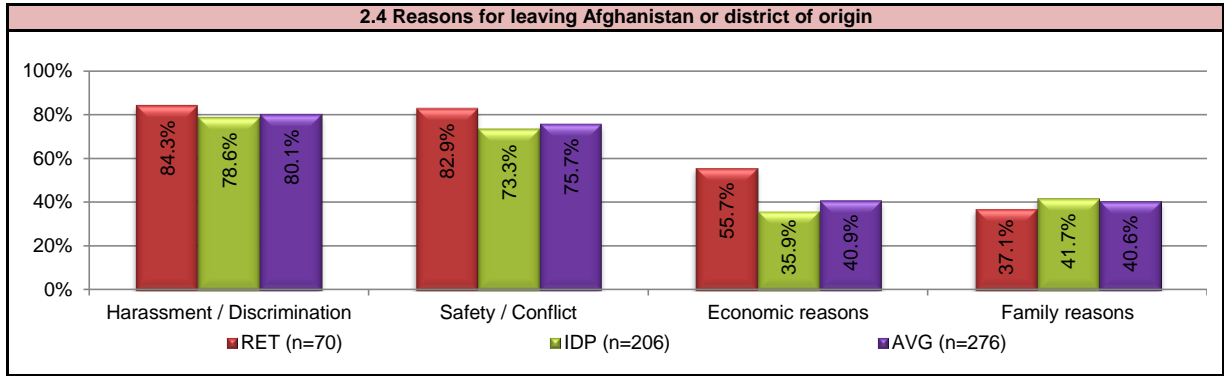
2.2 Percentage of HHs that settled in last 2 years and intend to remain



2.3 Countries of asylum from which HHs have returned



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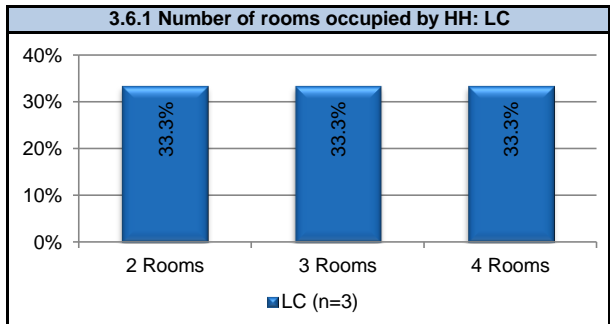
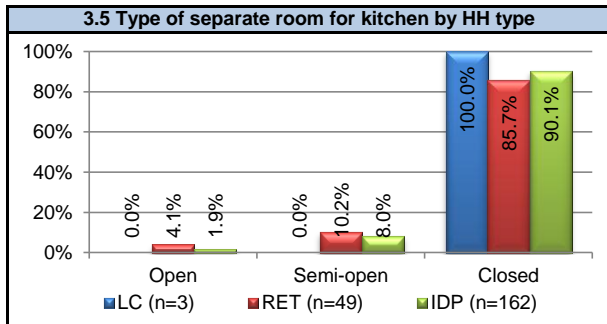
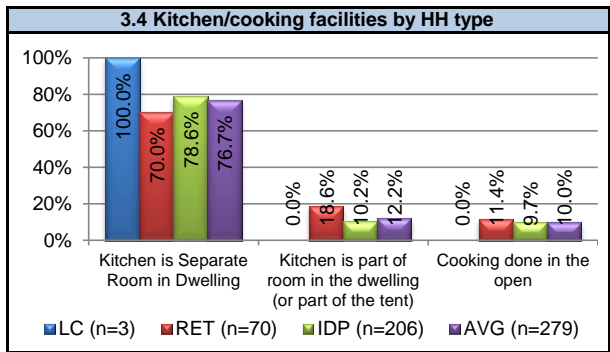
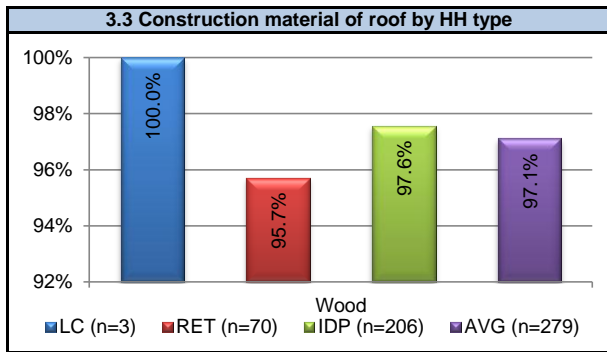
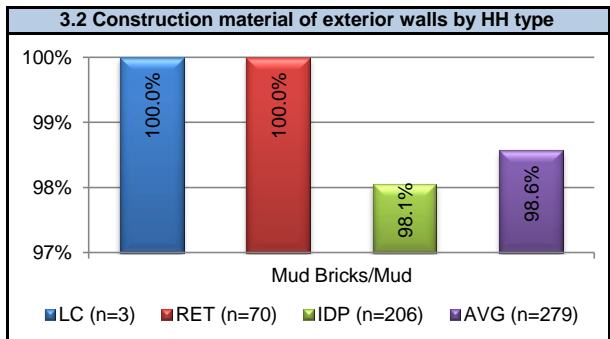
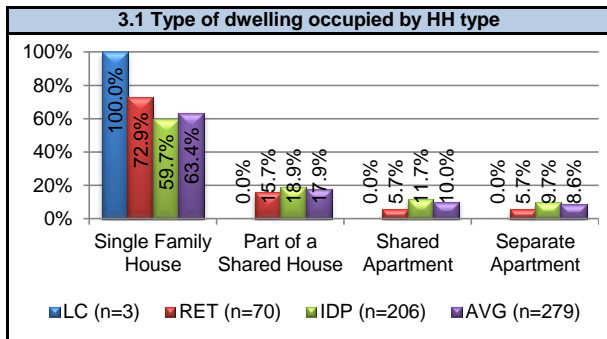
3. HOUSING STATUS PROFILE

Summary

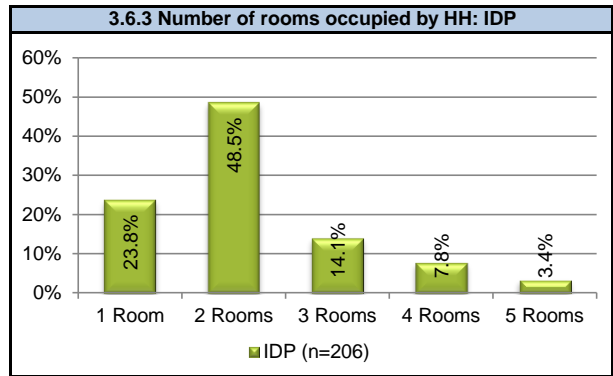
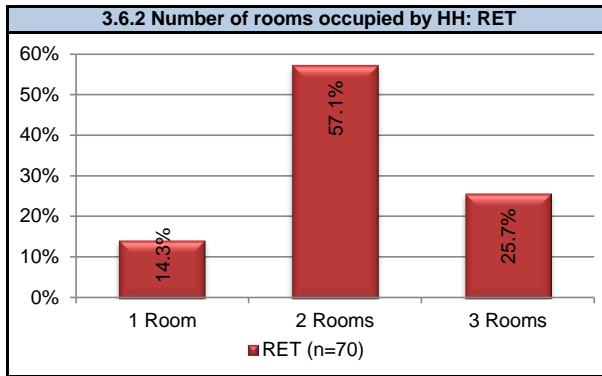
All local community households, 72.9% of returnee households and 59.7% of IDP households were living in single family homes with remaining households living in either separate apartments or in a shared house or apartment. Almost all dwellings were mud-brick or mud constructions. Similarly, almost all roofs were reported to be wood constructions.

The majority of households surveyed occupy two-room dwellings, with 57.1% of returnee households, 48.5% of IDP households and 33.3% of local community households residing in such dwellings. A further 23.8% of IDP households and 14.3% of returnee households occupy homes with only one room while 25.7% of returnee households and 14.1% of IDP households occupy three-room homes.

Survey findings reveal that all local community households, 78.6% of IDP households and 70.0% of returnee households have a kitchen located in a separate room within the home. A further 18.6% of returnee households and 10.2% of IDP households stated that their kitchen takes up part of one of their rooms, while 11.4% of returnee households and 9.7% of IDP households cook in the open.



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4. WATER, ELECTRICITY, FUEL AND SANITATION

Summary

Water: Of the three local community households surveyed, one household has direct access to an open well on site and the remaining two households source their drinking water from hand pumps located, on average, less than a three-minute walk from their homes.

Among returnee households, 74.3% access drinking water from an open body of water located an average of 18 minutes away on foot. Among IDP households, 48.1% source drinking water from an open body of water located approximately 15 minutes away on foot. A further 29.1% of IDP households and 17.1% of returnee households access their drinking water from a piped source located a few minutes' walk from their homes. Open wells and hand pumps are accessible to only a small number of IDP and returnee households surveyed.

Electricity: Of the 279 households surveyed, a total of 251 reported to have had access to an electricity supply in the 30 days prior to being surveyed. Of the 184 IDP households that had access to electricity, 41.3% were supplied by a community generator (hydro) and a further 35.3% had access to solar power. For returnee households, solar power represents the principal source of electricity with 84.4% of households having accessed electricity from this source during the past 30 days. Of the three local community households surveyed, two households accessed electricity via a community generator (hydro) and one household had access to a privately-owned generator.

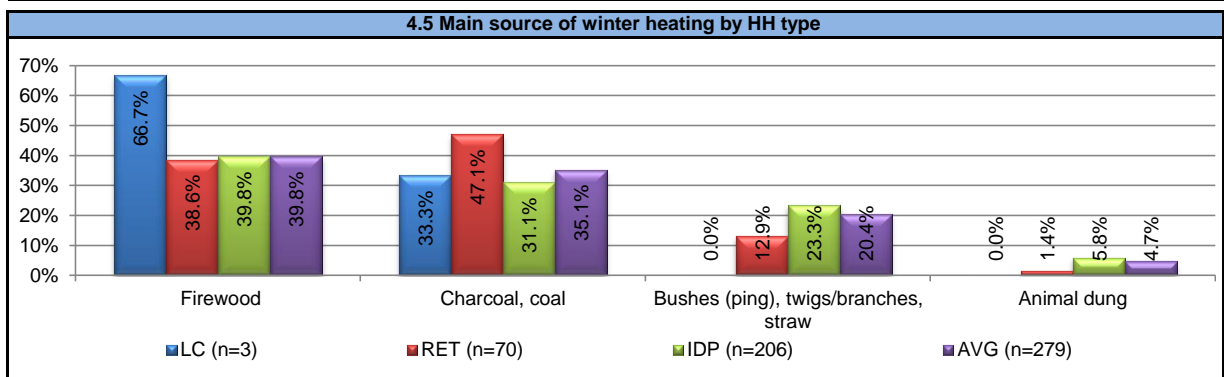
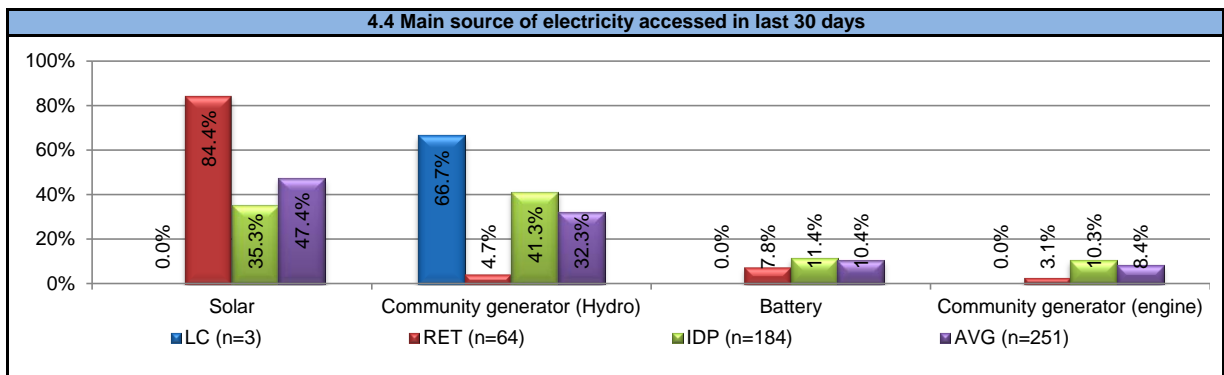
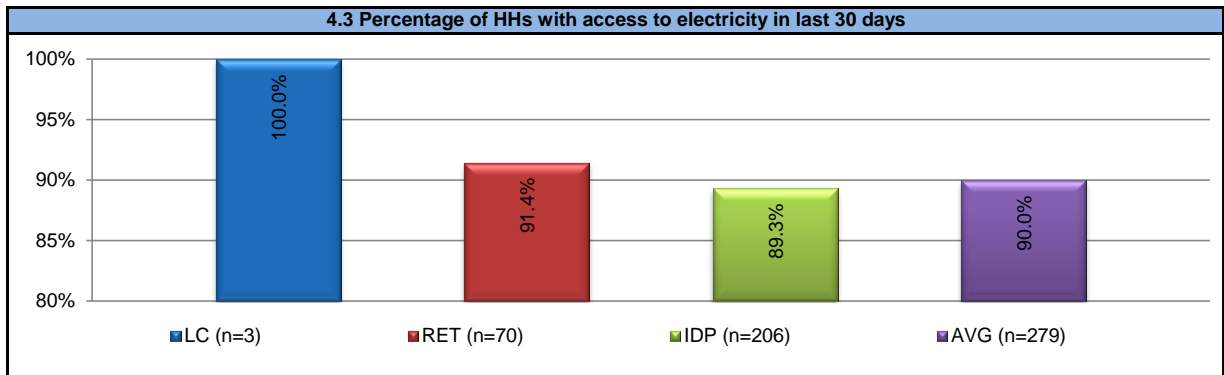
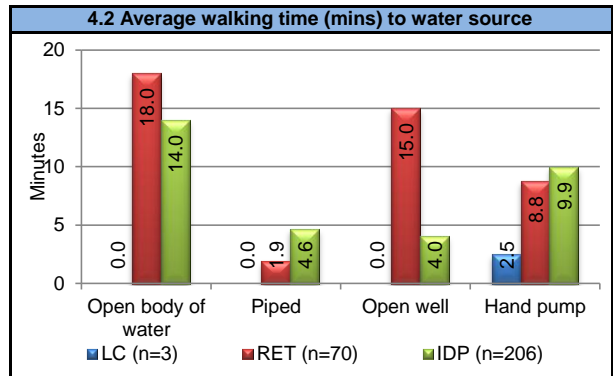
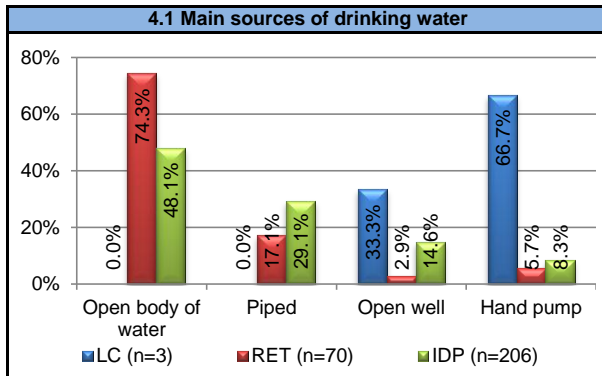
Fuel: During the winter months, the main sources of heating for both returnee and IDP households are coal/charcoal and firewood. Coal/charcoal represents the main source of heating for 47.1% of returnee households and 31.1% of IDP households. A further 39.8% of IDP households and 38.6% of returnee households rely on firewood for their heating. Bushes, twigs, branches and straw heat the homes of 23.3% of IDP households and 12.9% of returnee households during the winter months.

Firewood was revealed to have been the primary source of cooking fuel in the 30 days prior to the survey being conducted for all three local community households and over half of all returnee and IDP households. During the same period, bushes, twigs and branches provided cooking fuel for 34.5% of IDP households and 25.7% of returnee households. A relatively small number of both of these household types identified gas, animal dung or coal/charcoal as their main source of cooking fuel.

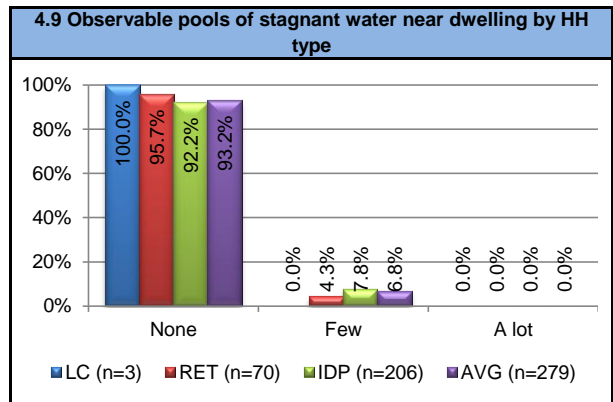
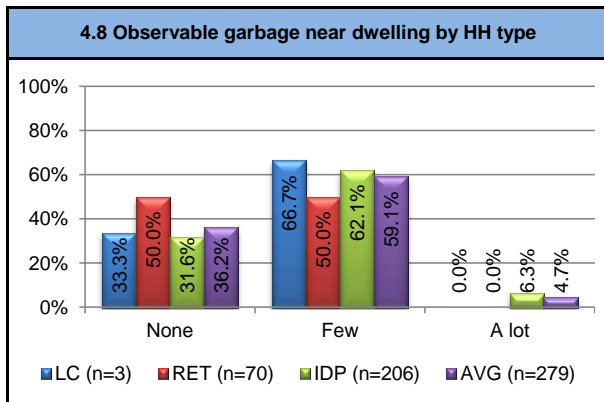
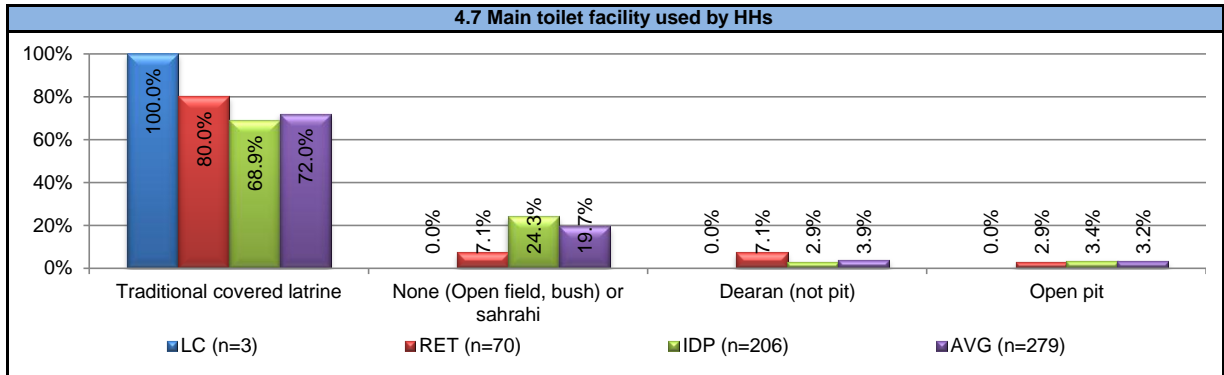
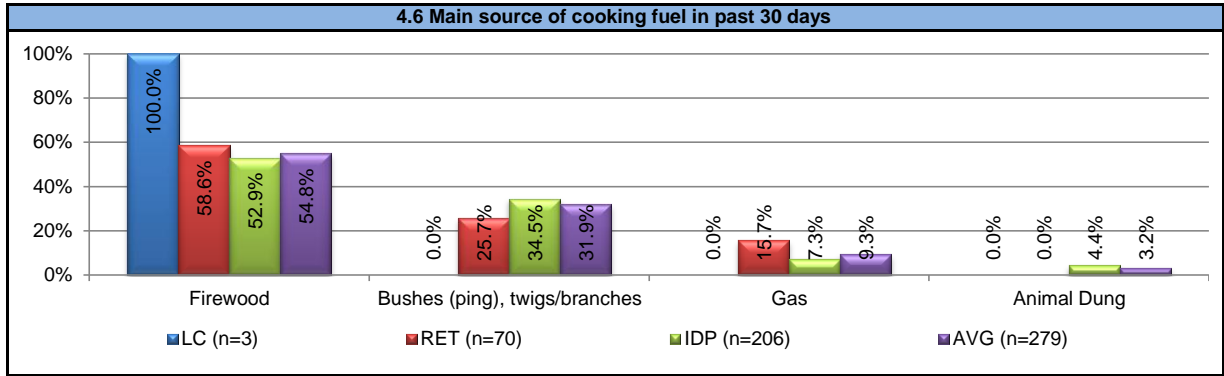
Sanitation: All three local community households, 80.0% of returnee households and 68.9% of IDP households surveyed have access to a traditional covered latrine. A small number of returnee and IDP households have access to a dearan, open pit or latrine. A further 24.3% of IDP households and 7.1% of returnee households reported having no access to toilet facilities and, consequently, utilize open fields and bushes for this purpose.

Surveyors took note of whether any garbage or pools of stagnant water were observed in close proximity to the households they interviewed. Half of all returnee households surveyed had some garbage nearby and the remaining half had no garbage in close proximity to the household. With regard to IDP households, 62.1% had some garbage nearby while 31.6% of households were observed to have no garbage near the access to their dwelling. Surveyors also noted that 6.3% of IDP households had a significant amount of garbage near their home. In response to whether any pools of stagnant water were observable nearby, 95.7% of returnee households and 92.2% of IDP households had no stagnant water in close proximity to their homes.

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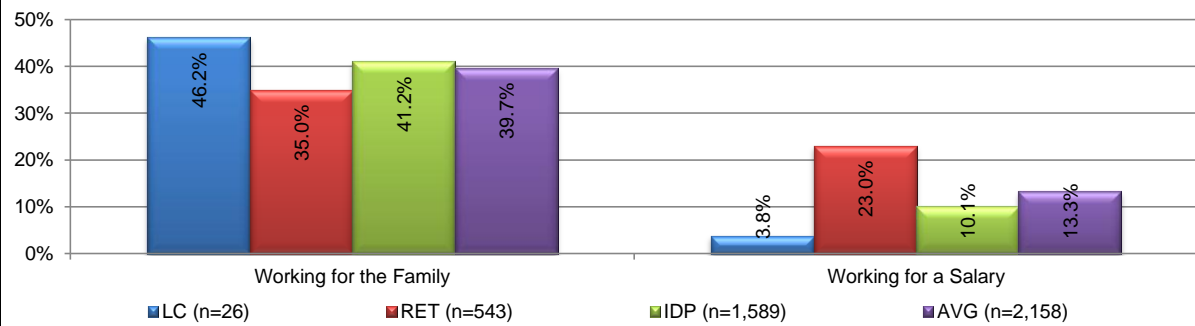
5. LABOUR & LIVELIHOODS

Summary

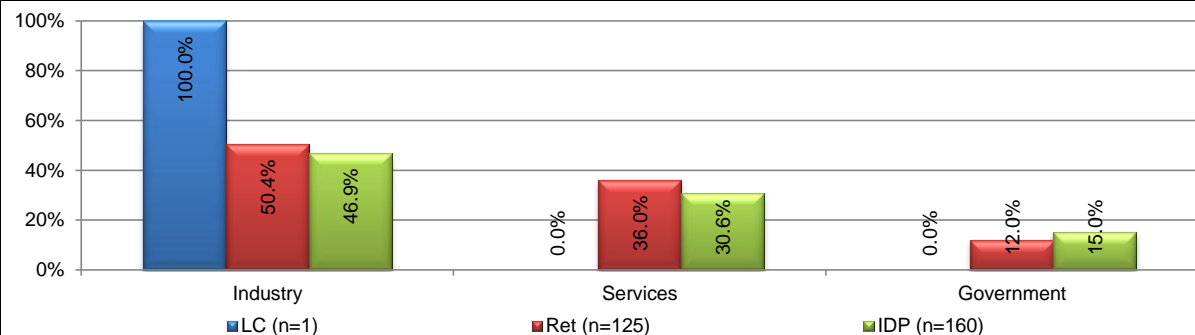
The survey found that 46.2% of local community members, 41.2% of IDPs and 35.0% of returnees are engaged in work for the family with twice as many females as males engaged in such work. At 23.0%, more returnees than any other community group reported to be working for a salary of which three-quarters are male. The vast majority of those that earn a salary in all three community groups work in industry, the service sector or government sector.

Among the returnee population, three children aged 5-11 years and 21 children aged 12-17 years were reported to be earning a salary. Among IDP residents, 17 children aged 12-17 years were reported to be working outside the family.

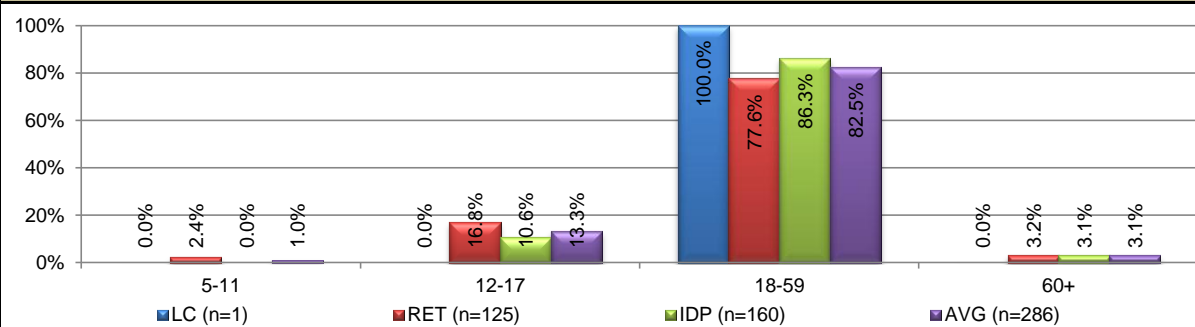
5.1 Percentage of household members working

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6. HOUSEHOLD INCOME, DEBT, ASSETS AND EXPENDITURES

Summary

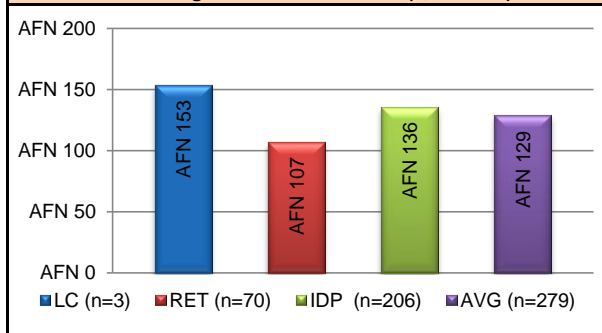
Income: Average household income in 1390 was USD 3,067 among local community households, USD 2,713 among IDP households and USD 2,131 among returnee households. Agriculture was the primary income source for 66.7% of local community households and 63.6% of IDP households, as well as for 18.6% of returnee households for whom day labour (31.4%) and wage labour (30.0%) were more significant income sources.

Average debt levels were reported to be USD 1,457 for IDP households, USD 1,206 for returnee households and USD 120 for local community households.

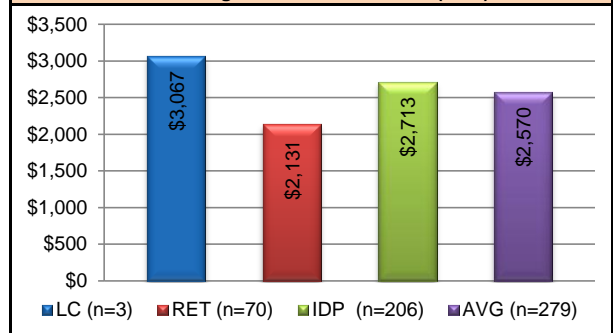
Expenditure: Average household expenditure in the month prior to being surveyed was USD 161 for returnee households, USD 154 for local community households and USD 149 for IDP households. Food supplies constituted the bulk (58.0%-65.0%) of monthly household expenditure for all three groups.

Assets: With regard to ownership of key household assets, all three local community households, 87.1% of returnee households and 80.6% of IDP households own a stove/gas balloon. A mobile telephone is also owned by all three local community households as well as by over four-fifths of returnee and IDP households. Significant proportions in all household types own a radio, television set, bicycle, and motorcycle. Only IDP (11.2%) and returnee (4.3%) households reported owning a car.

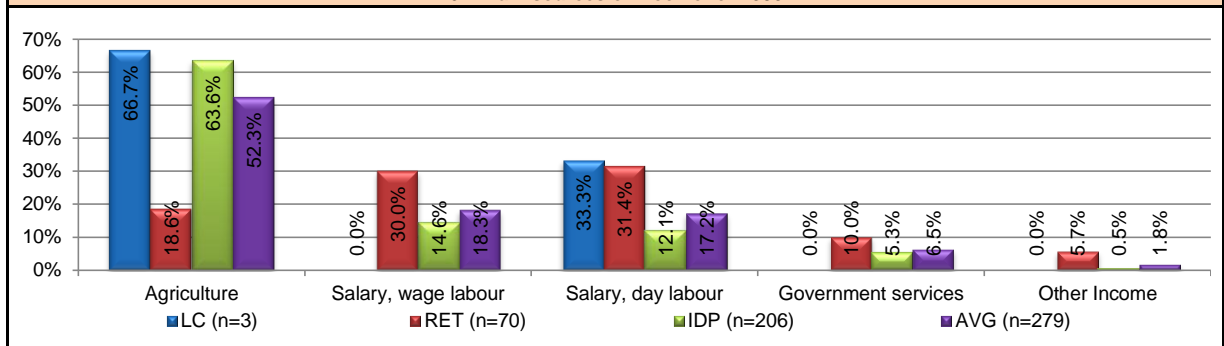
6.1 Average HH income for 1390 (1,000 AFN)



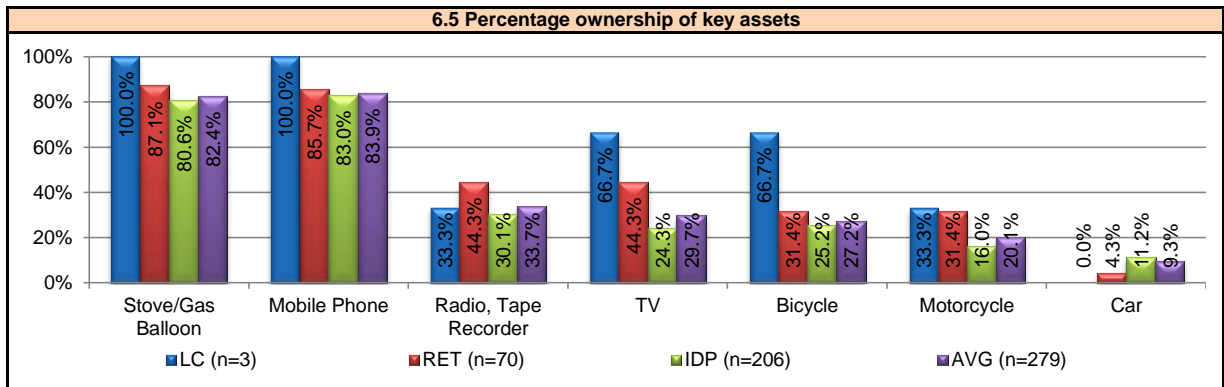
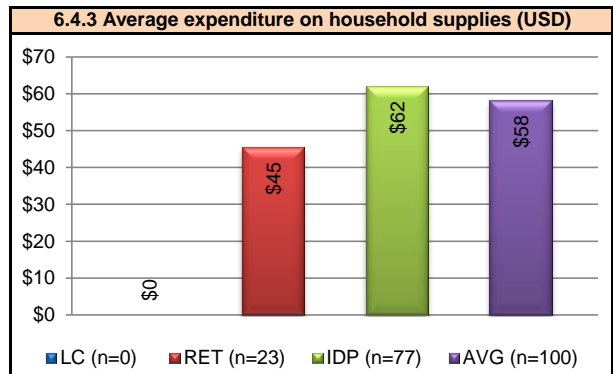
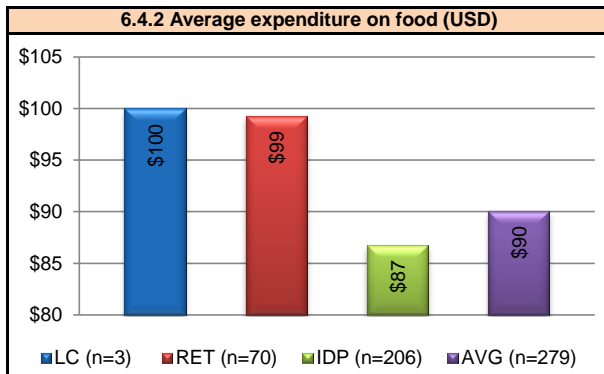
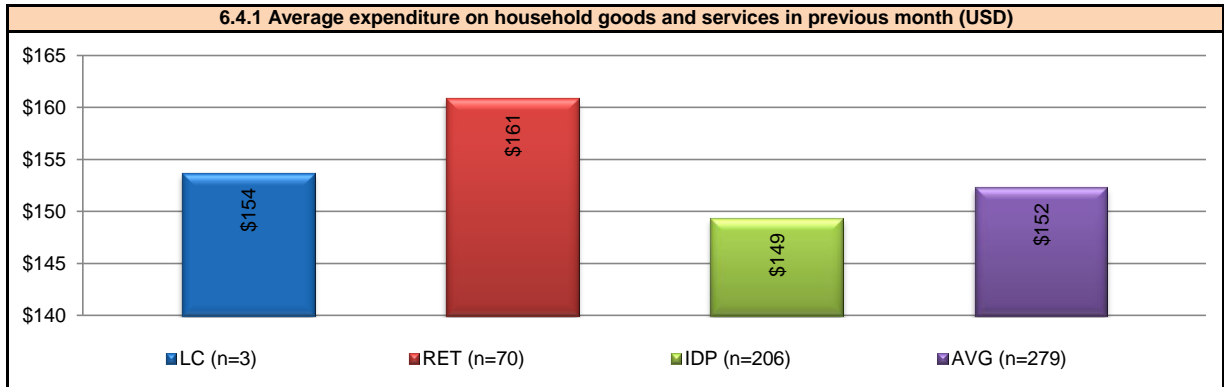
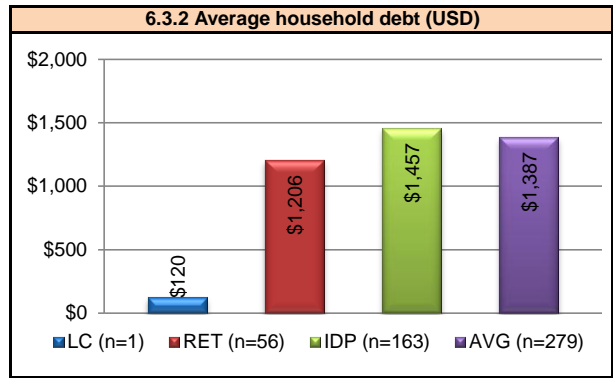
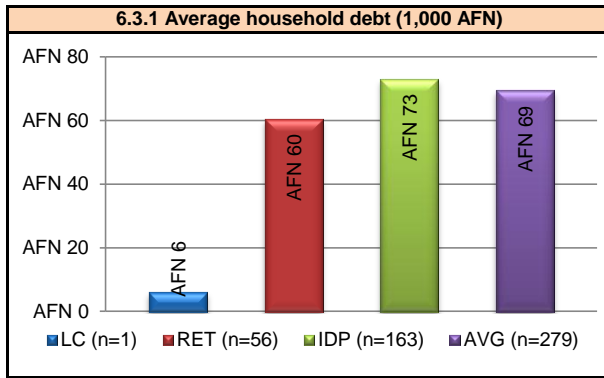
6.1 Average HH income for 1390 (USD)



6.2 Main sources of income for 1390



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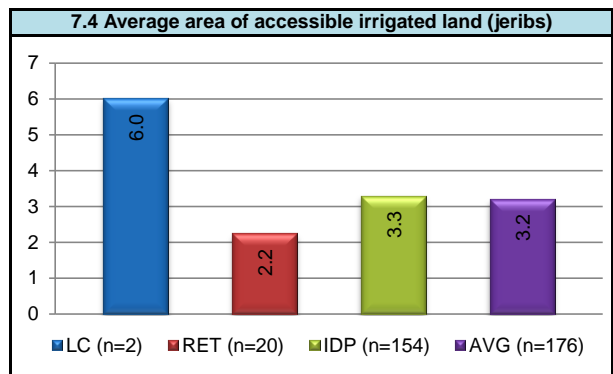
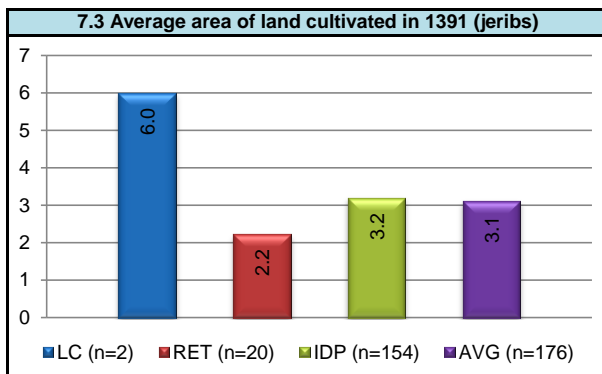
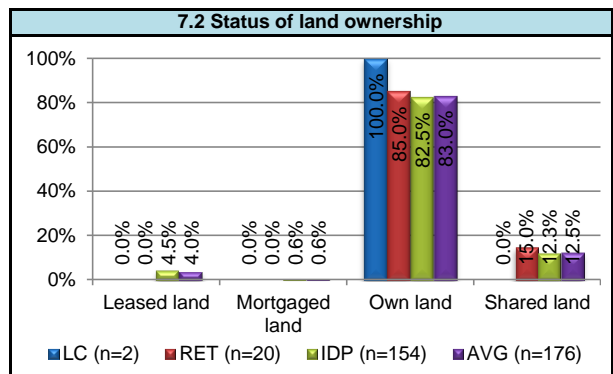
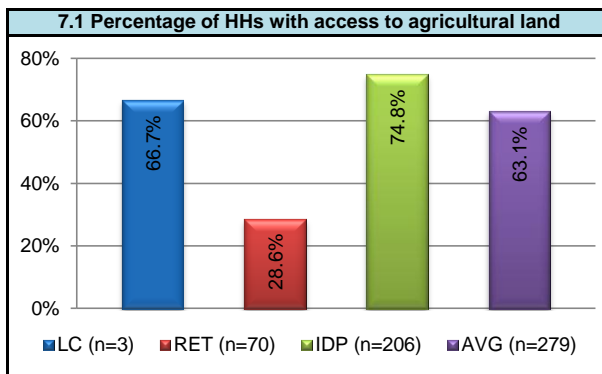

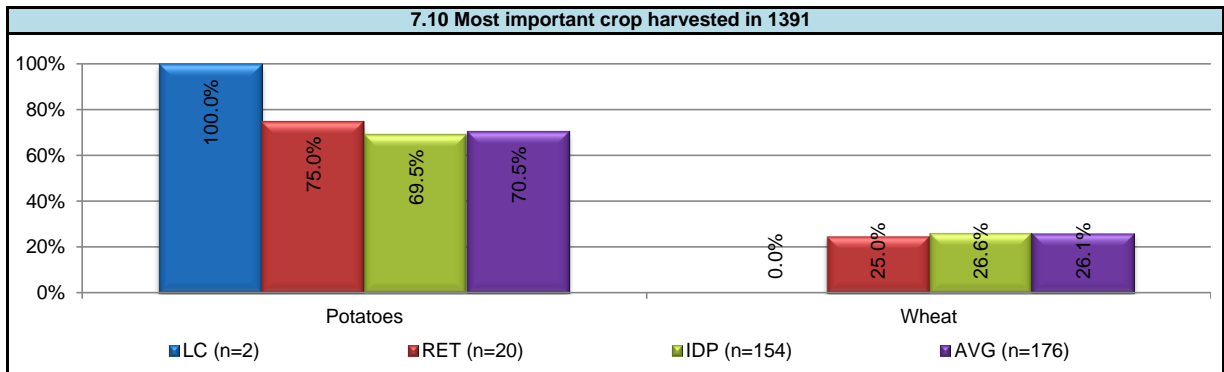
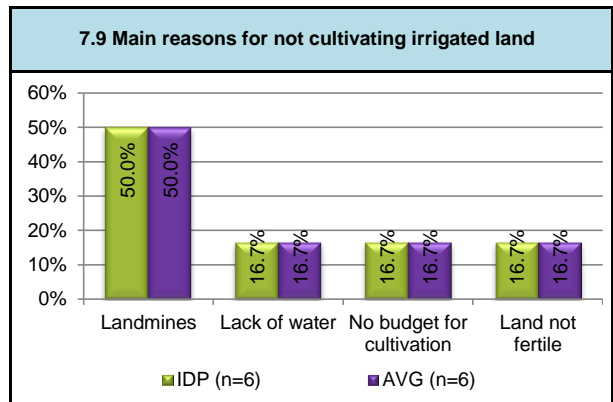
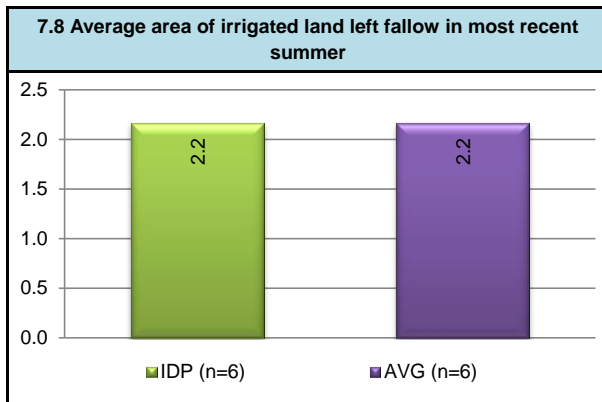
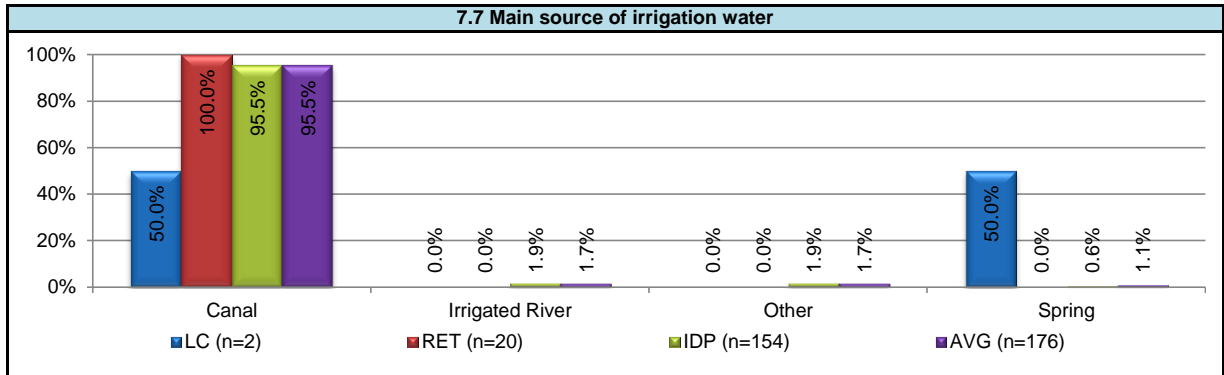
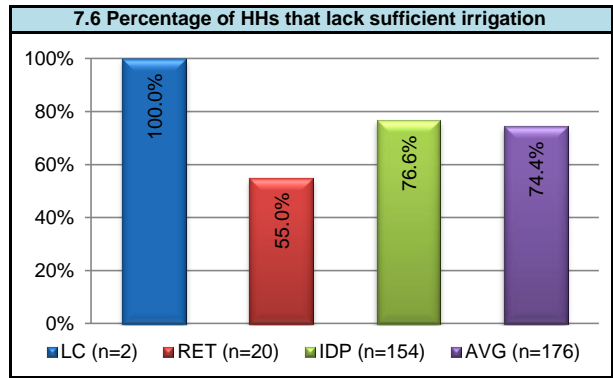
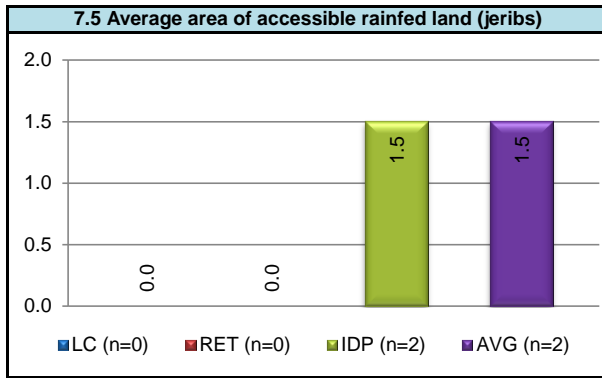
Summary

Agriculture: Of surveyed households, 74.8% of IDP households, 66.7% of local community households and 28.6% of returnee households have access to agricultural land. In 1391, on average, 6.0 jeribs of land were cultivated by local community households, 3.2 jeribs by IDP households and 2.2 jeribs by returnee households. Potato was the most important crop for the two local community households surveyed, 75.0% of returnee households and 69.5% of IDP households. Wheat was identified as the second most important crop by the majority in all household types. Two of the three local community households surveyed have access to a garden plot compared with only 27.7% of IDP households and 11.4% of returnee households. A variety of fruit and nuts constitute the bulk of what is grown in these plots by all three groups.

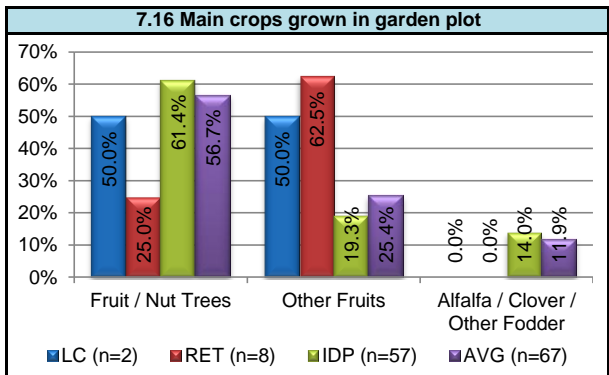
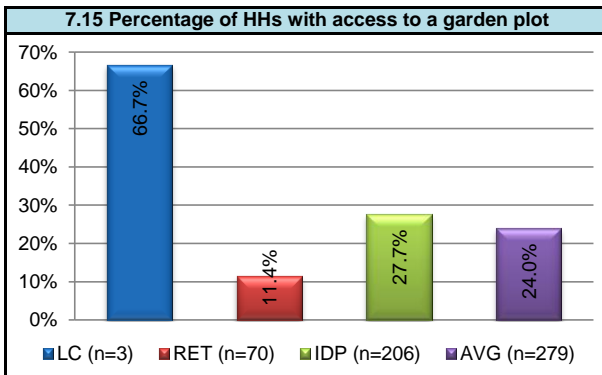
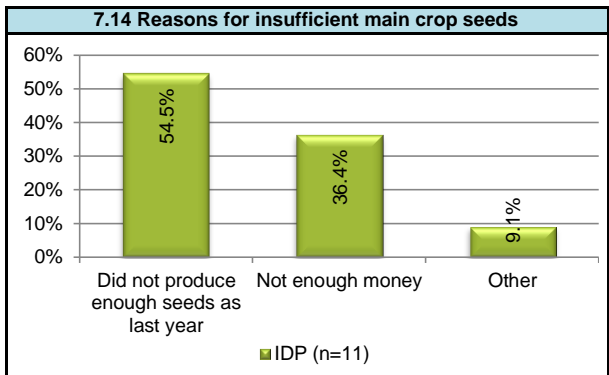
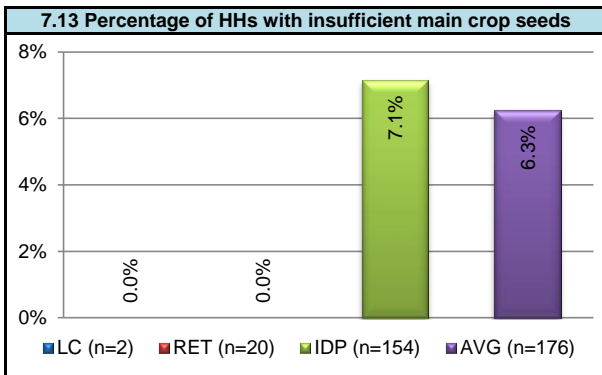
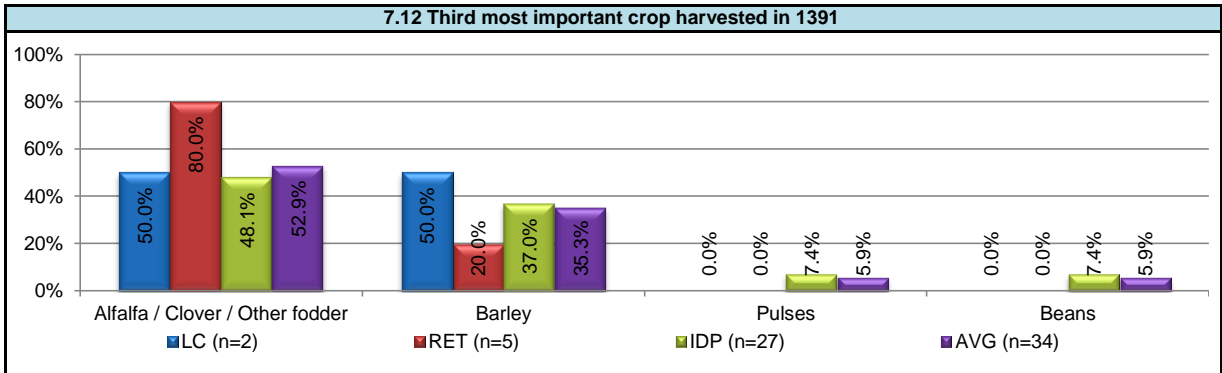
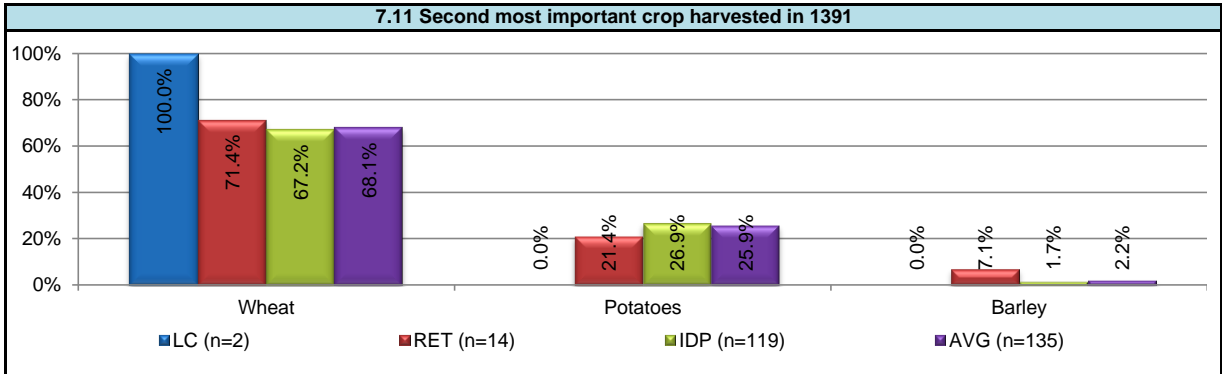
Livestock: Some form of livestock is owned by all three local community households, 80.1% of IDP households and 71.4% of returnee households. Among households that do, all local community households own cows while two-thirds own chickens, sheep, oxen, and donkeys. IDP households (86.7%) were marginally more likely to own donkeys than returnee households (84.0%), while comparable proportions in both groups own chickens, sheep, and goats. However, significantly larger proportions of IDP households own cattle, cows, and oxen than do returnee households.



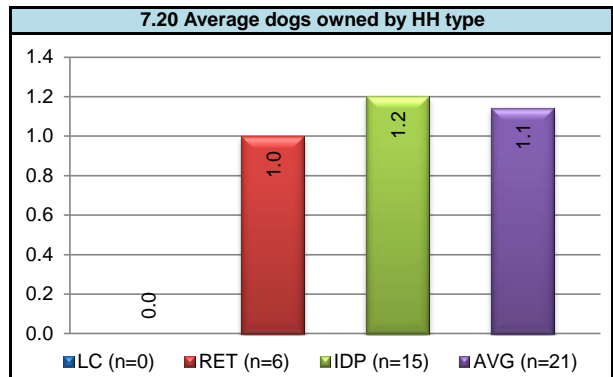
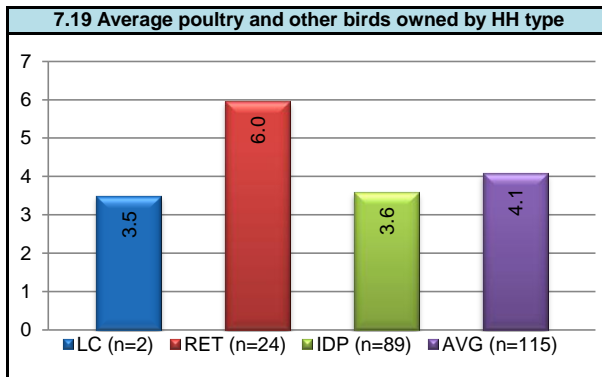
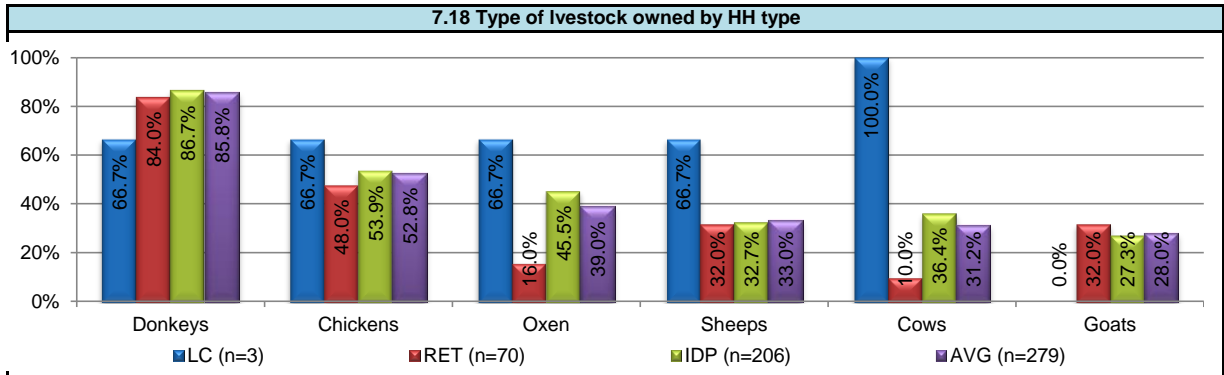
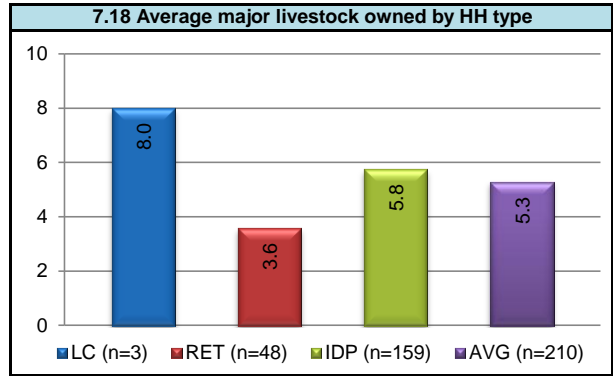
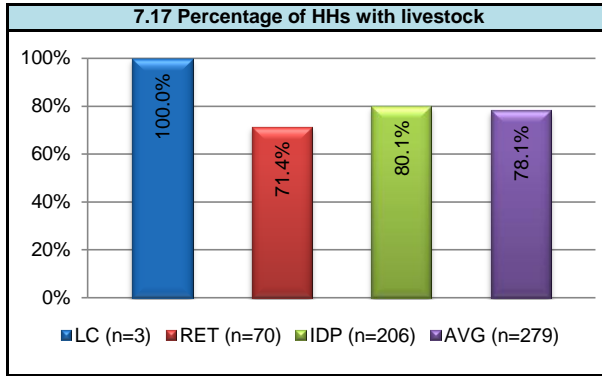

8. ACCESS TO SERVICES PROFILE

Summary

Householders in all three community groups stated that the Provincial Centre is too far to walk to. In the last three months, the main reasons for travelling to the Provincial Centre for IDP and returnee households were to either purchase goods and services or to visit a hospital. The main reasons for local community households were to purchase goods and services or to visit a government office. Moreover, all local community households, over two-thirds (71.4%) of returnee households and almost half (48.5%) of IDP households stated that the nearest police station is 15-60 minutes away on foot.

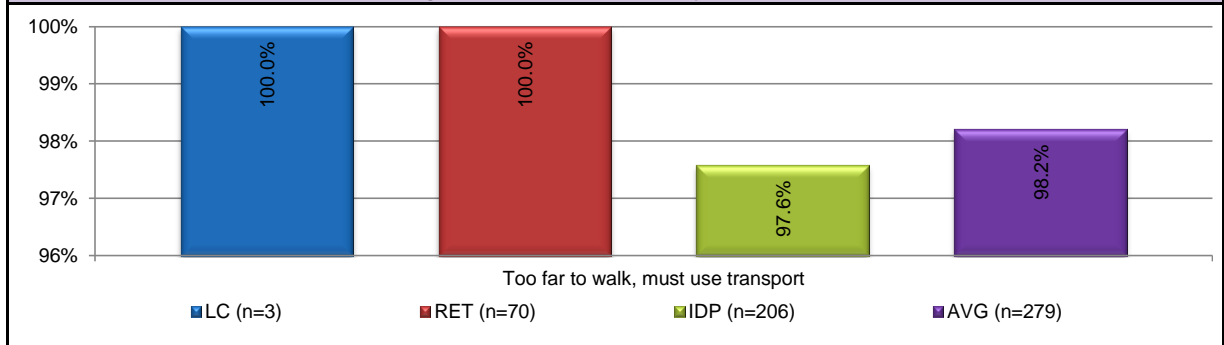
Two-thirds (66.7%) of local community households and 51.0% IDP households stated that the nearest public health centre is located 15-60 minutes away, while for two-thirds (67.1%) of returnee households it is located less than 15 minutes away. For the vast majority in all three community groups, the nearest private health clinic is either too far to walk to or its location is unknown. The nearest hospital is too far to walk to for all three household types.

Two-thirds (66.7%) of local community households stated that their place of employment is too far to walk and that they must utilize public transport. Over half of returnee (51.4%) and IDP (58.0%) households stated that their place of employment is located less than 15 minutes away.

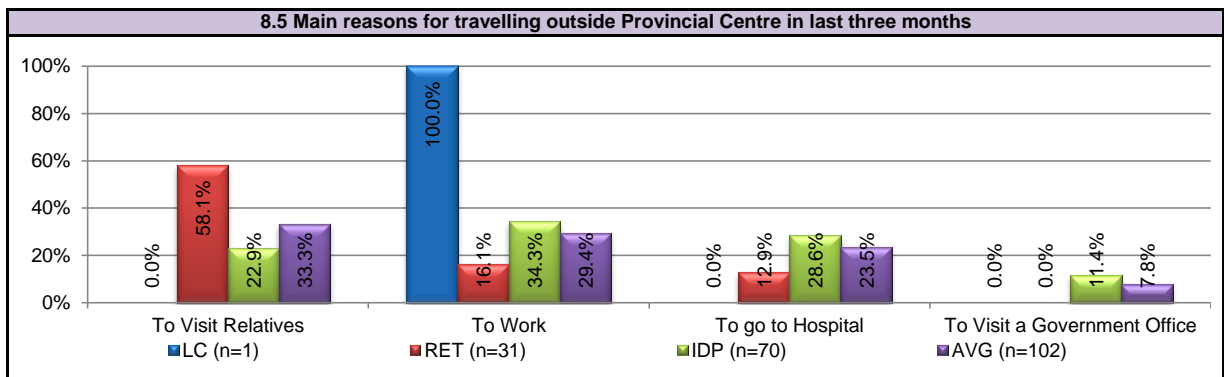
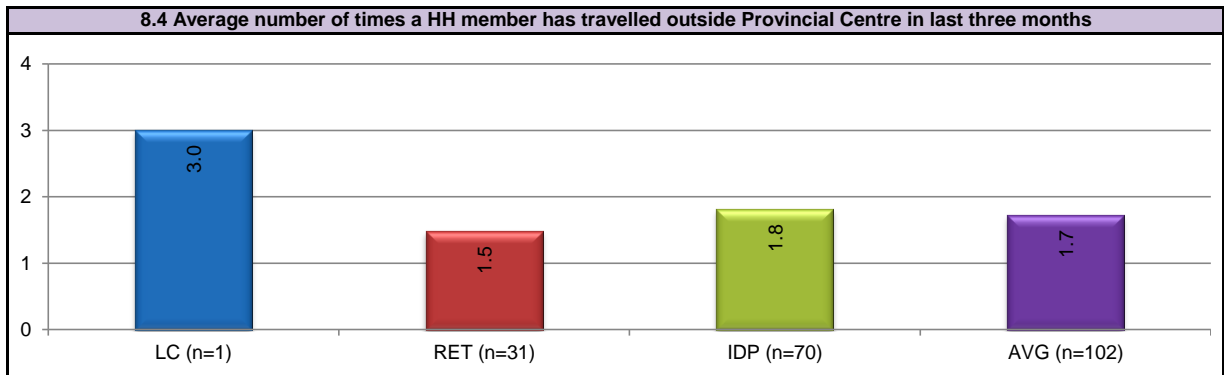
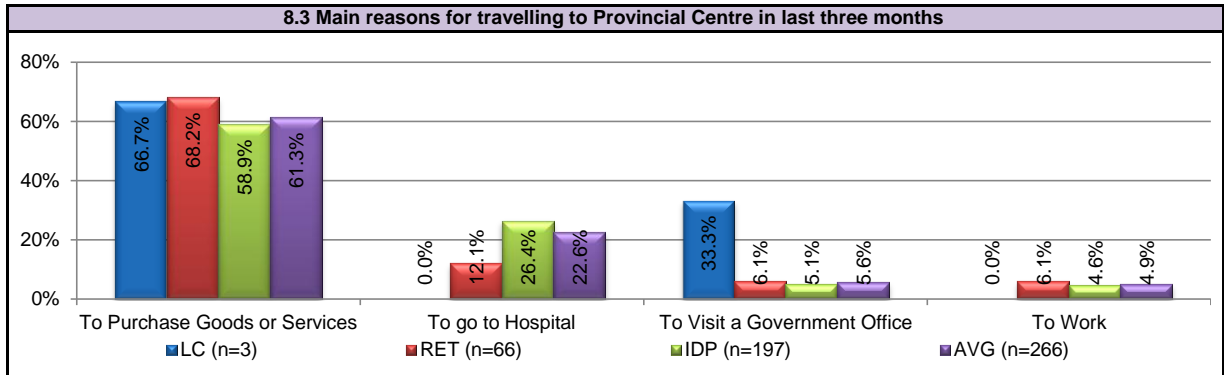
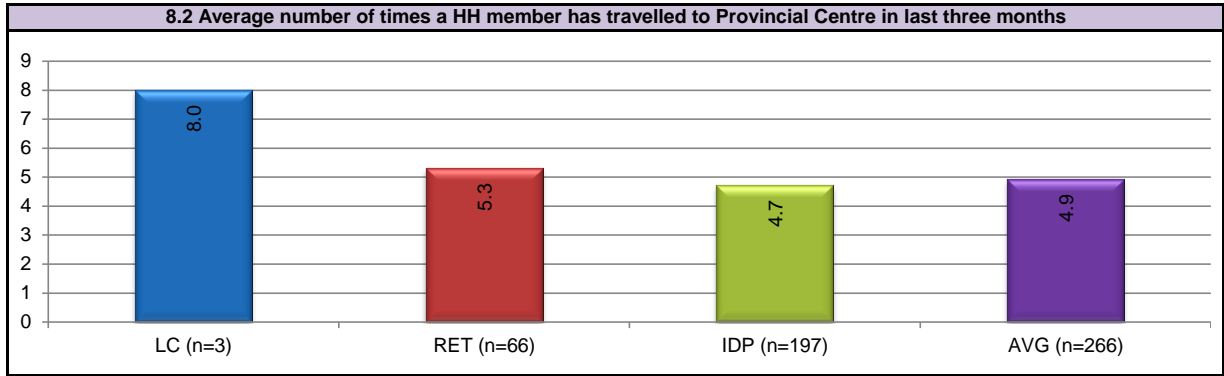
For 78.6% of returnee households, 66.7% of local community households and 56.8% of IDP households, transport can be accessed less than 15 minutes away on foot. For the vast majority of the remainder, access to transport is 15-60 minutes away.

For local community households, the nearest primary, secondary and high schools for both boys and girls are located 15-60 minutes away on foot. Among returnee households, in the region of 70.0% stated that the nearest boys' primary school and high schools for boys and girls are located less than 15 minutes away, and 77.1% stated that the nearest boys' secondary school and primary and secondary schools for girls are also located less than 15 minutes away. Among IDP households, most stated that all school types are located 15-60 minutes away.

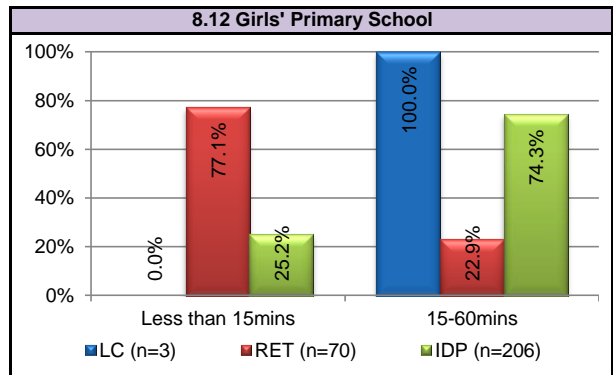
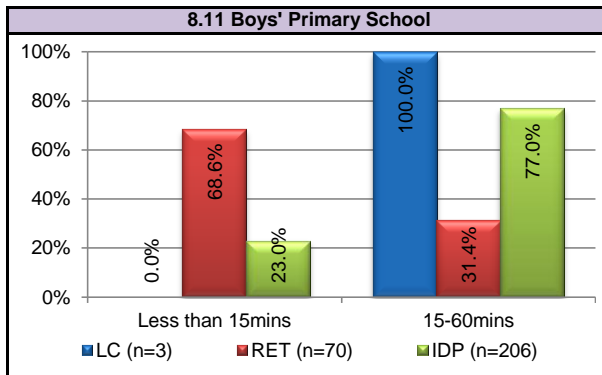
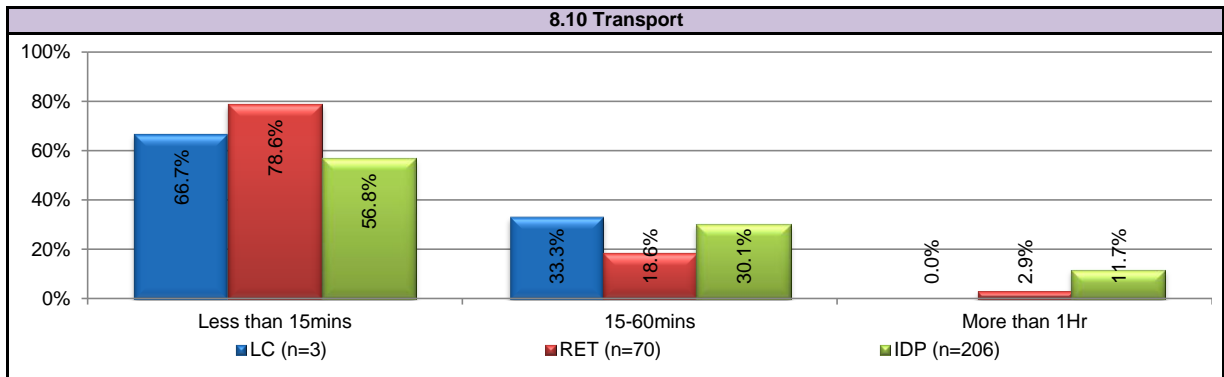
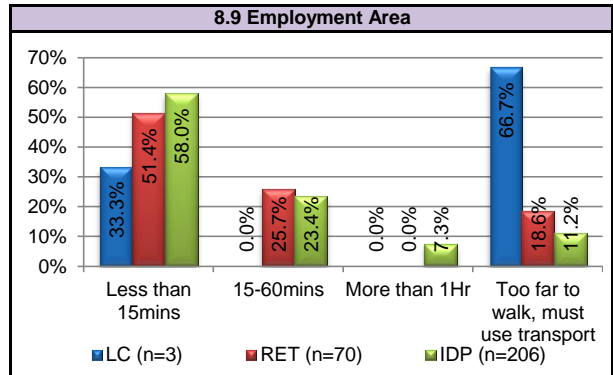
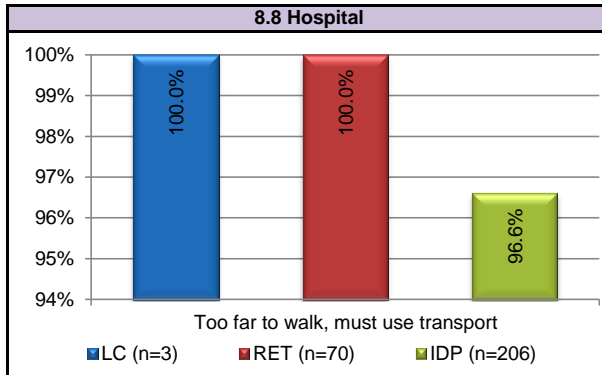
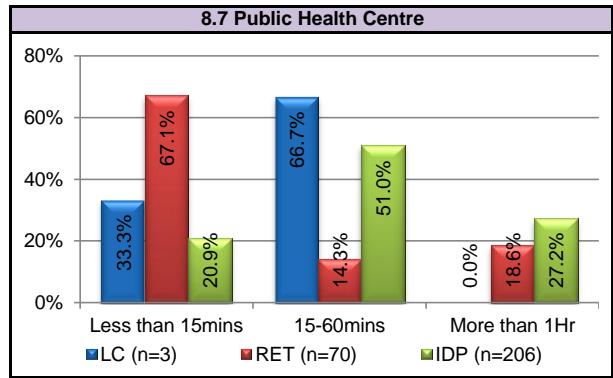
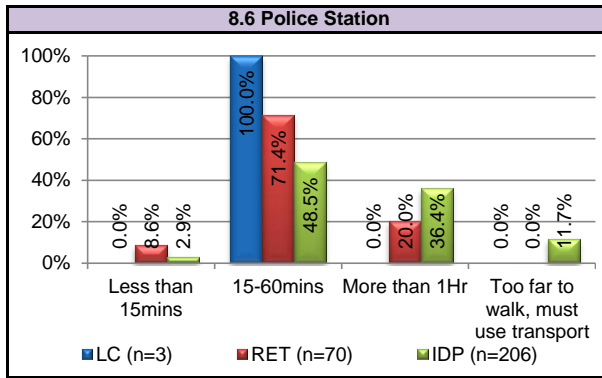
8.1 Average time taken to walk one-way to Provincial Centre



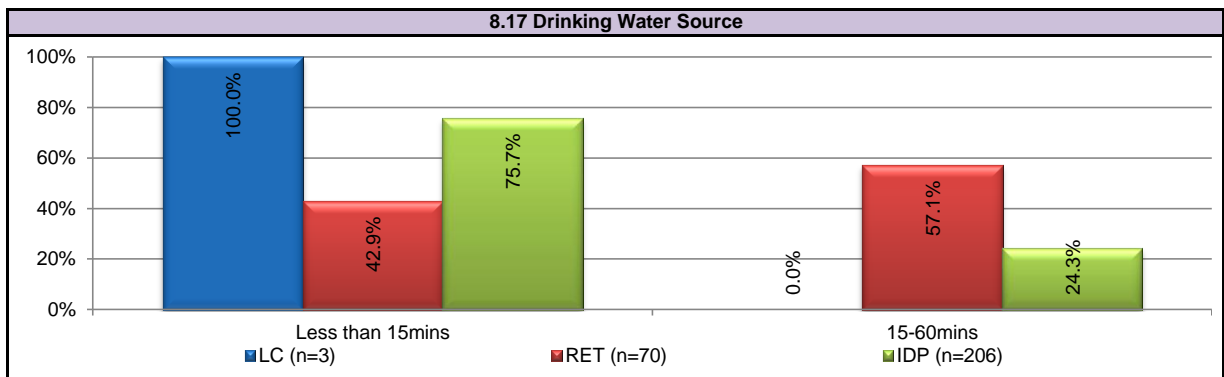
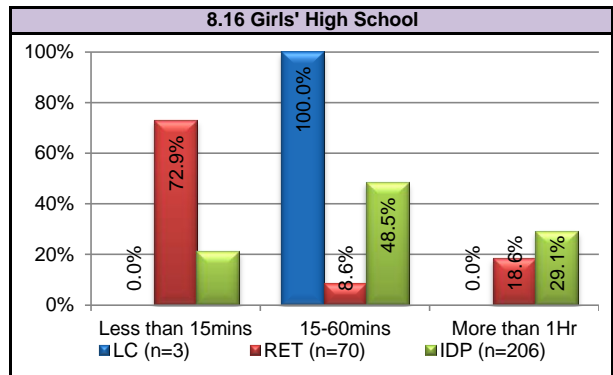
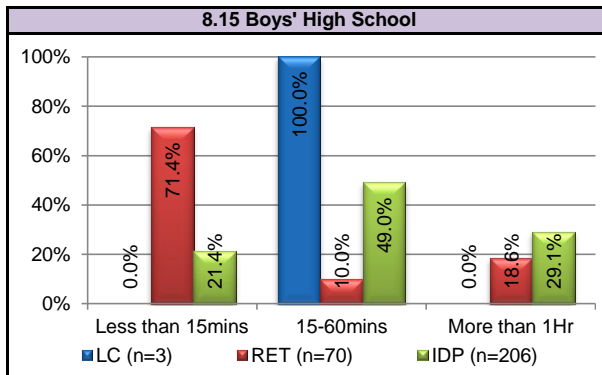
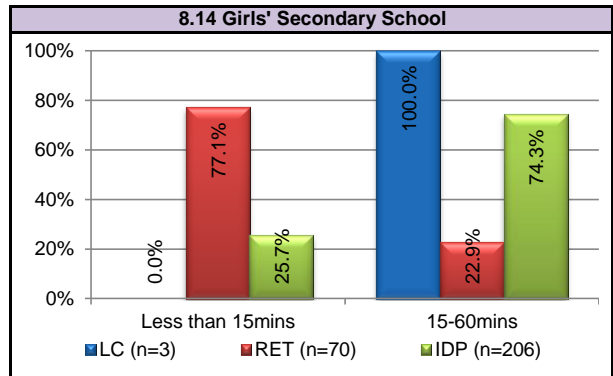
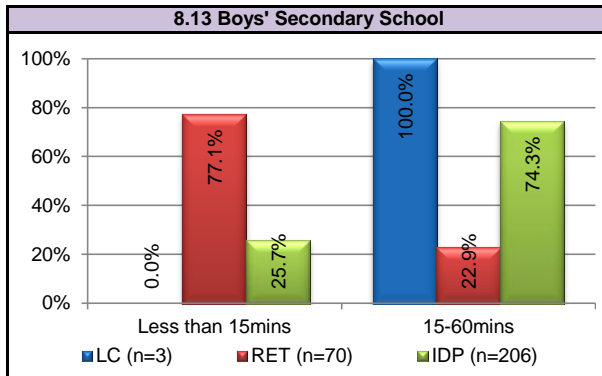

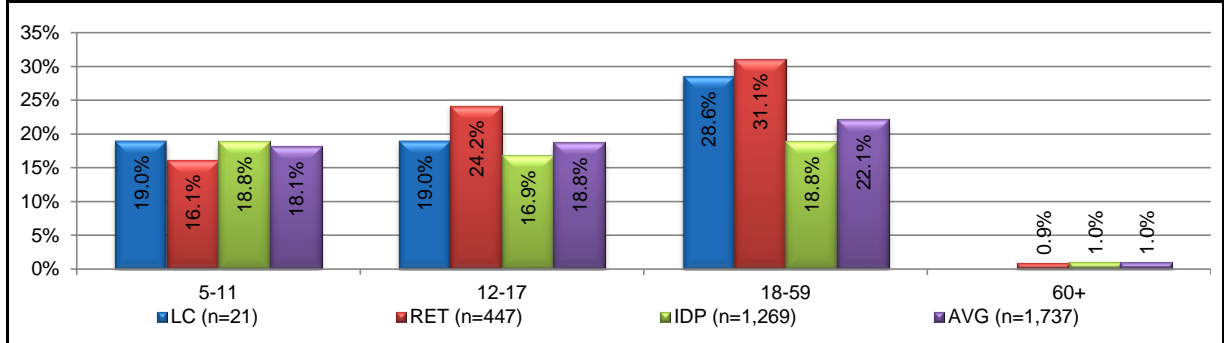
Among those aged five years and over, 72.3% of returnees, 66.7% of the local community and 55.6% of IDPs reported to be literate. Of these, 88.9% of local community males, 81.6% of returnee males and 68.8% of IDP males reported to be literate. Similarly, 62.6% of returnee females, 50.0% of local community females and 42.5% of IDP females reported to be literate.

Among adults aged eighteen years and over, 79.5% of returnee males, 75.3% of IDP males and 33.3% of local community males did not achieve any school grade. Similarly, all local community females, 94.6% of IDP females and 92.2% of returnee females had not achieved any school grade.

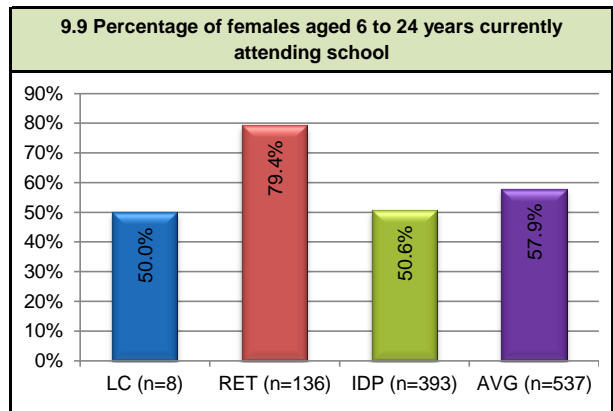
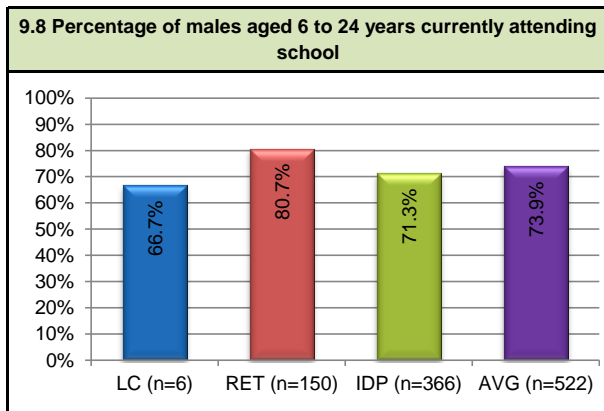
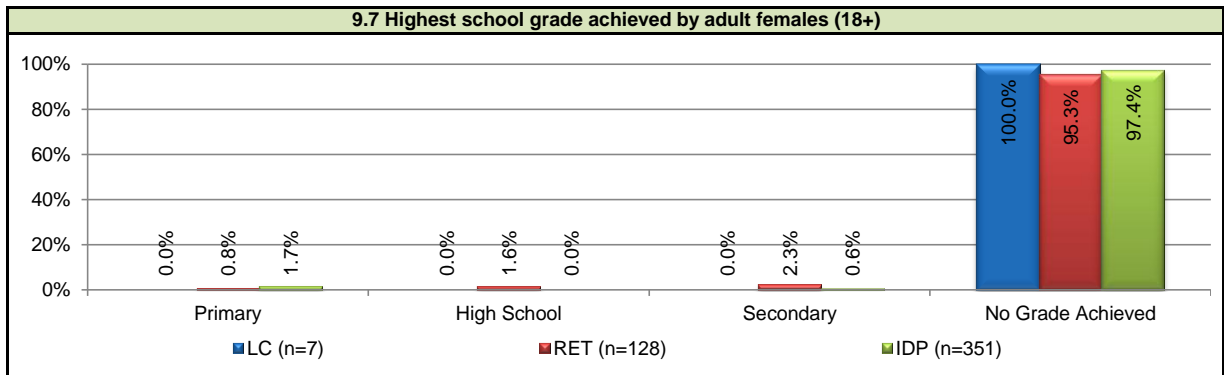
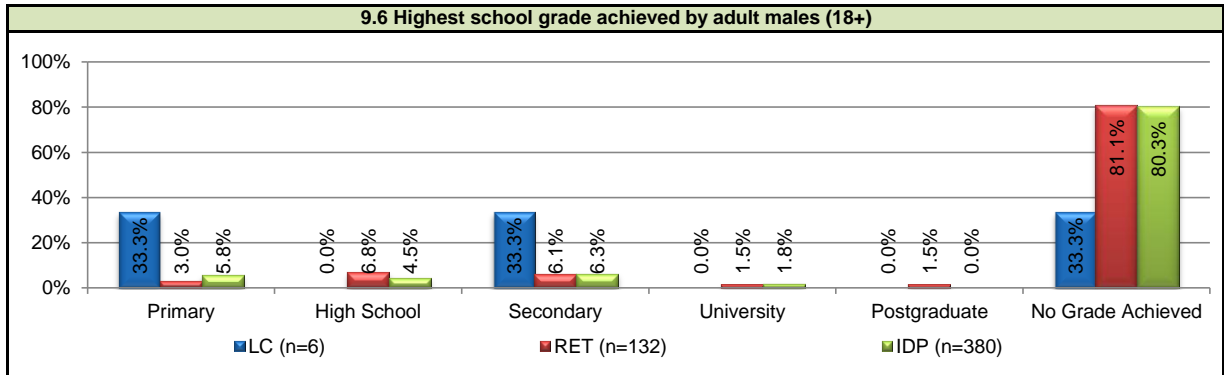
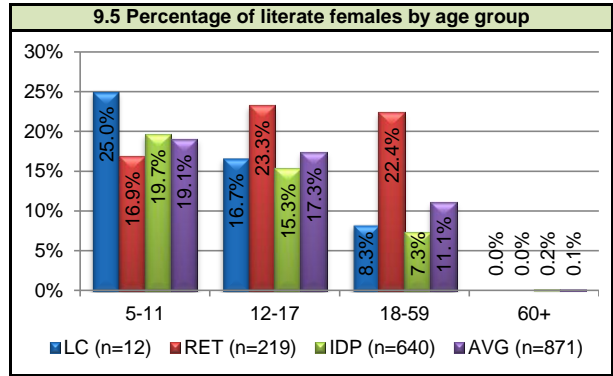
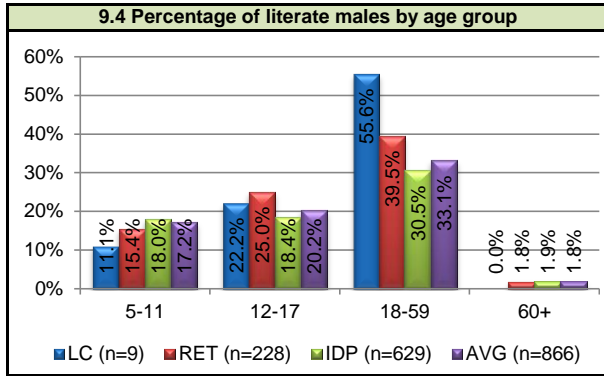
Among males aged 6 to 24 years, 80.7% of returnees, 71.3% of IDPs and 66.7% of local community males reported to be currently attending school. Among females aged 6 to 24 years, 79.4% of returnees, 50.6% of IDP females and 50.0% of local community females reported to be currently attending school. The main reason for not attending school given by those aged 6 to 24 years across all three groups was because the family did not permit them to. A further one-fifth (20.4%) of returnees in this age group were not attending school because they needed to work for the family. Among the local community, one-fifth (20.0%) was not attending because they did not like school and a further one-fifth (20.0%) was not attending because the school did not permit them to.

9.3 Age distribution of literate household members

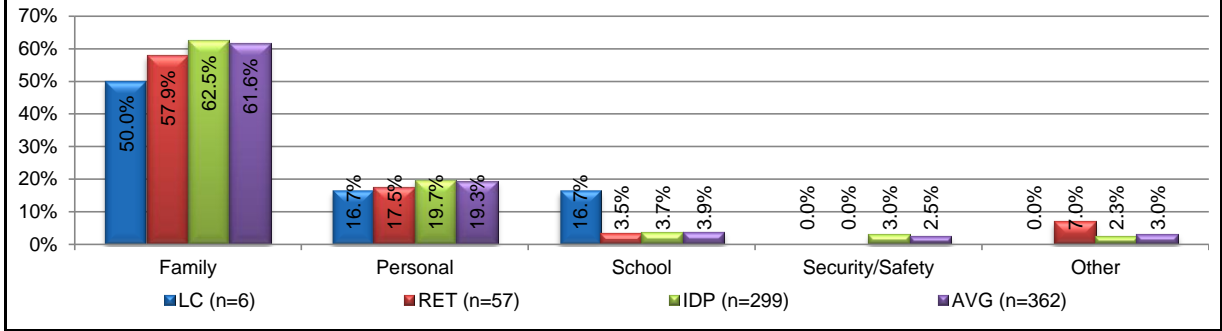

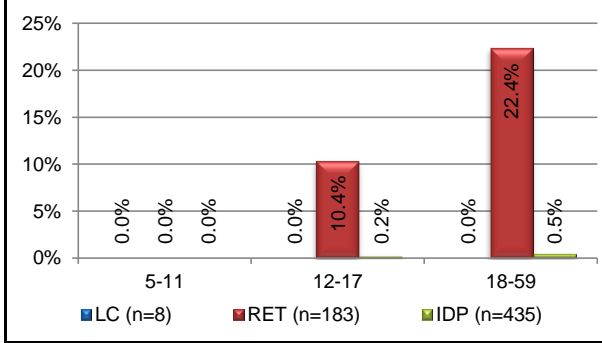
9.11 Age distribution of males who received education in another province



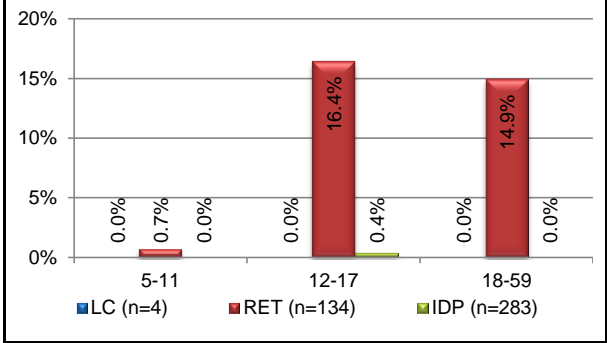
9.12 Age distribution of females who received education in another province

10. HEALTH PROFILE

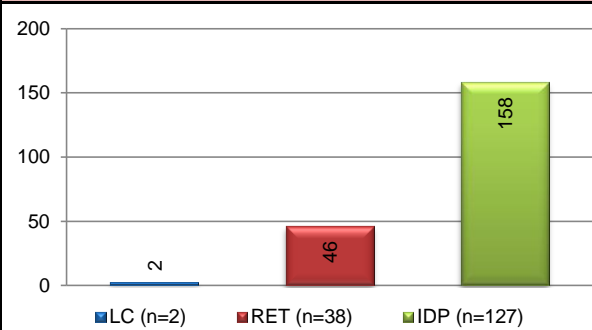
Summary

Two-thirds (66.7%) of local community households, 61.7% of IDP households and 54.3% of returnee households had between one and three household members admitted to a health facility as an inpatient over the course of the previous month. Over two-thirds of returnee and IDP households and one-third of local community households also had at least one member receive care from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without having to stay overnight. The Comprehensive Health Centre was visited most by both returnee and IDP households, followed closely by the Regional Hospital and private healthcare facilities. The most common reasons for seeking medical treatment by returnee households were respiratory problems (16.7%), other communicable diseases (16.7%), other non-communicable diseases (16.7%) and digestive problems (15.4%). For IDP households, the most common reasons were respiratory problems (22.6%), digestive problems (18.4%) and treatment of infections (15.2%).

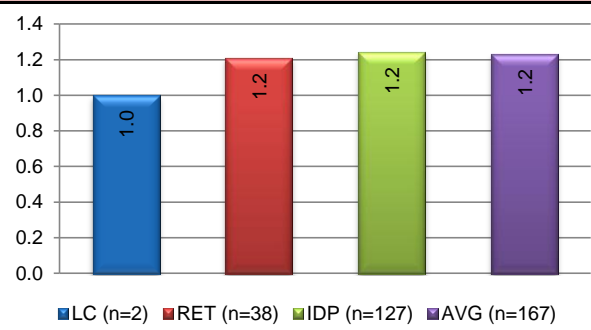
Of the 543 females aged 13-49 years that were included in the survey, a total of 156 were reported to be married among returnee households (n=37) and IDP households (n=119). Based on this data, the average number of births stands at 4.6 for returnee females and 4.5 for IDP females. Correspondingly, the average number of infant/child deaths is 0.6 for returnee females and 1.0 for IDP females. Of the 146 females aged 13-49 years that have given birth, approximately 74.0% of both returnee and IDP females received antenatal care during their last pregnancy with an average of 4.5 antenatal care visits per mother, and over 70.0% had the assistance of a midwife during delivery.

With regard to children under the age of five, 84.2% of returnee children and 79.3% of IDP children have been registered with the civil authorities. Over the course of the previous month, 89.5% of returnee under-fives and 88.7% of IDP under-fives have received a Vitamin A capsule, and in the region of one quarter has suffered from both diarrhoea and a persistent cough.

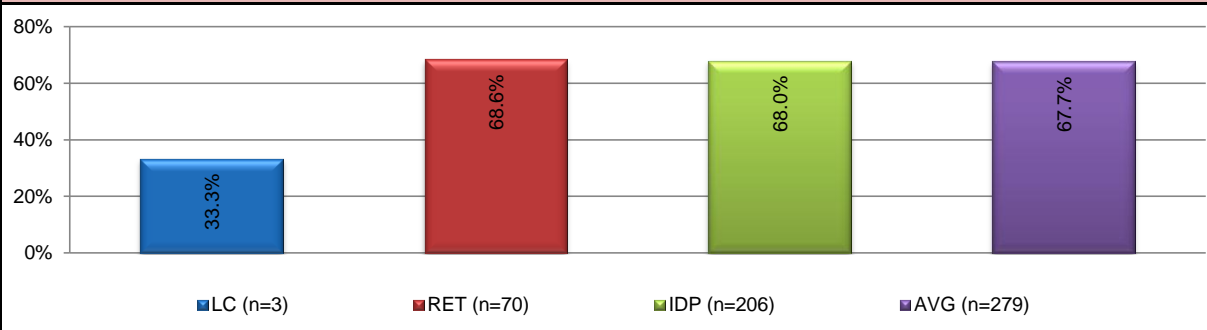
10.1.1 Number of HH members admitted to stay at a health facility overnight in previous month



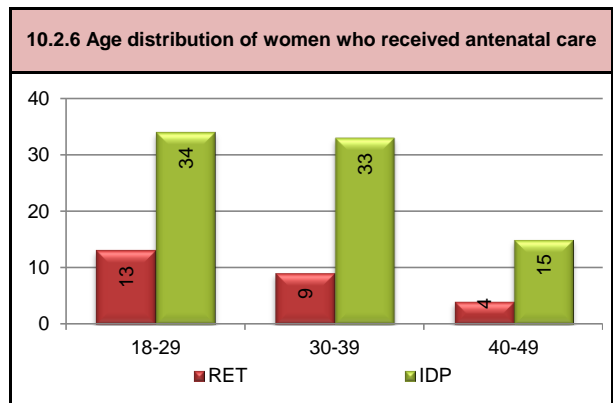
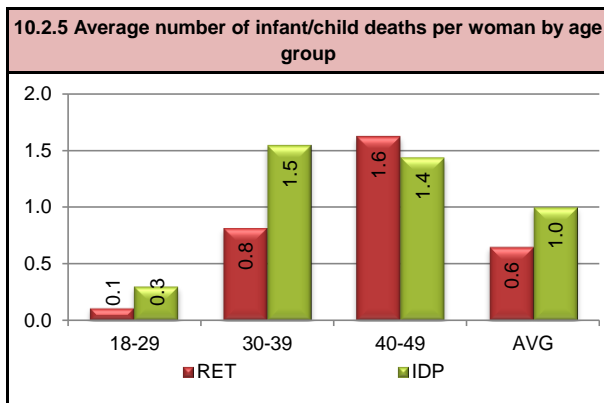
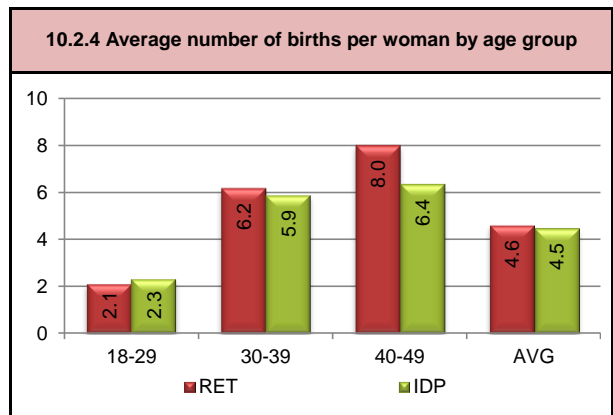
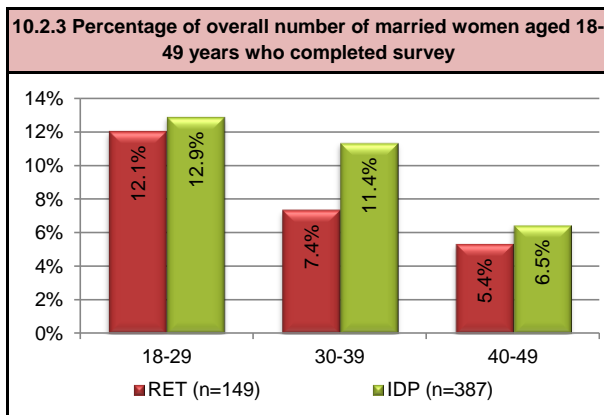
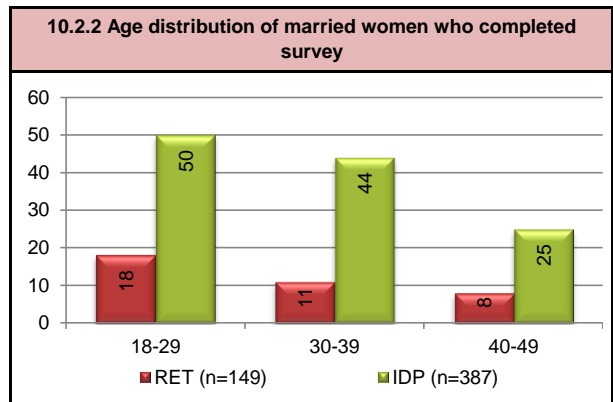
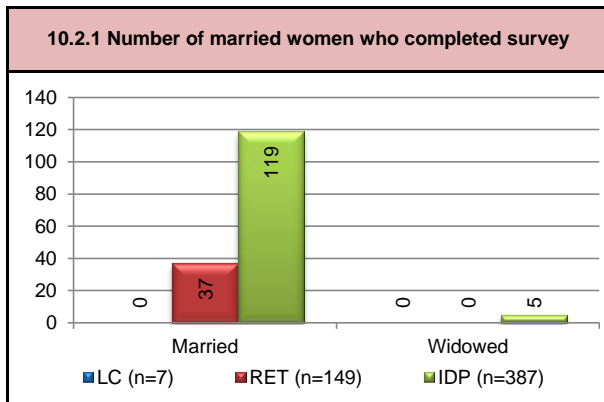
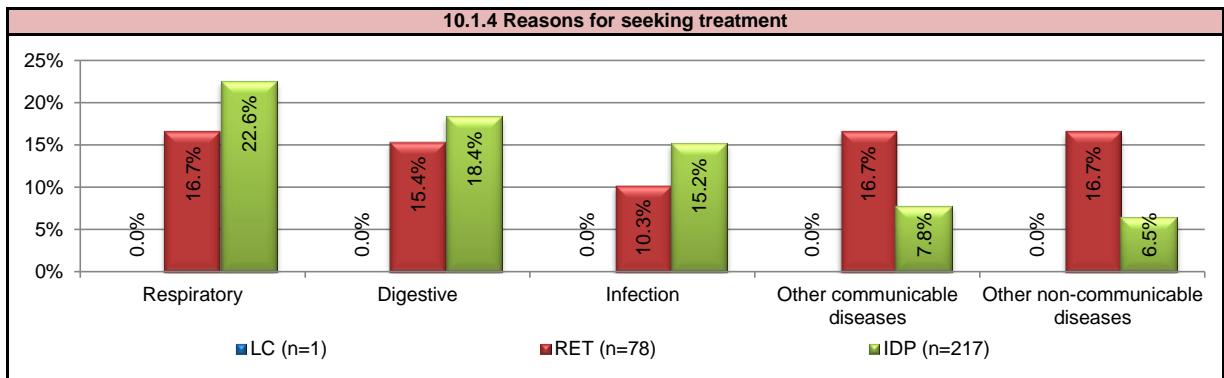
10.1.2 Average number of HH members admitted to stay at a health facility overnight in previous month



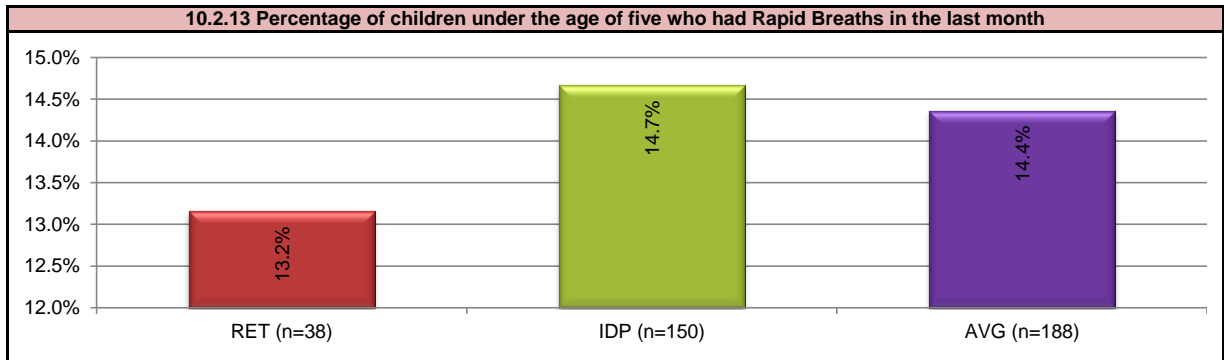
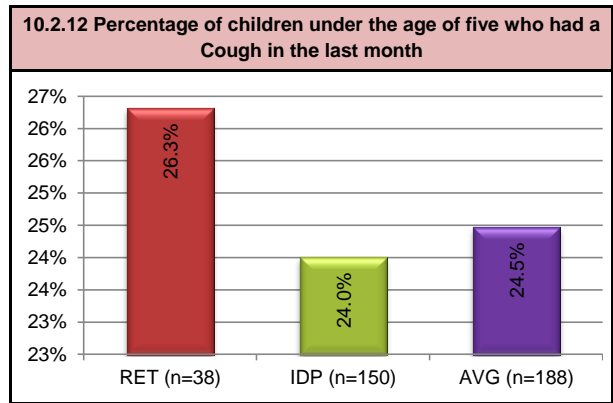
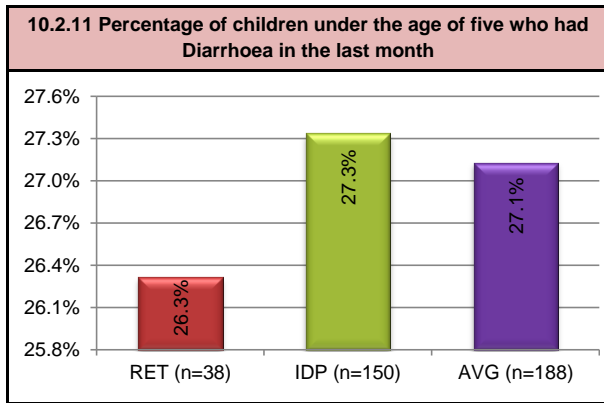
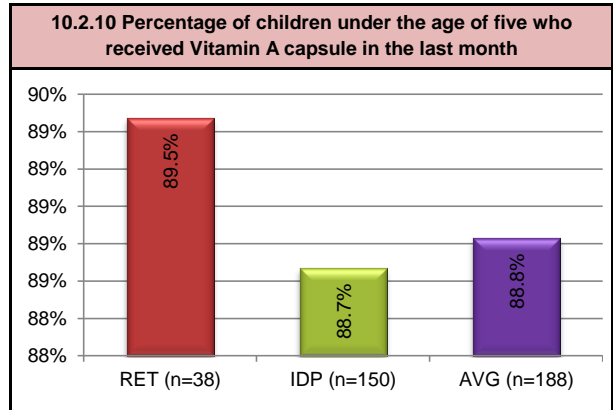
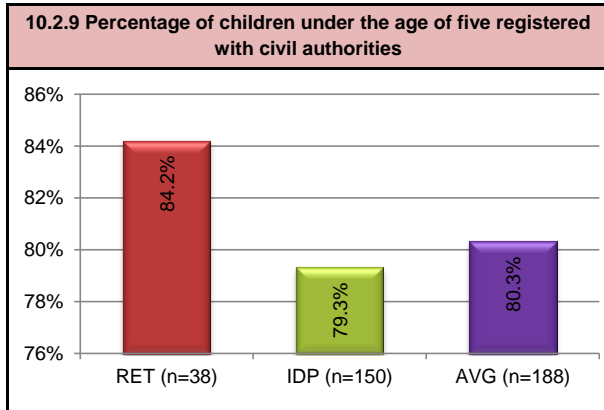
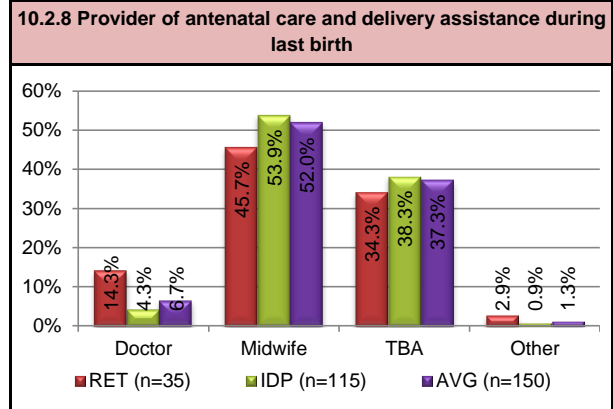
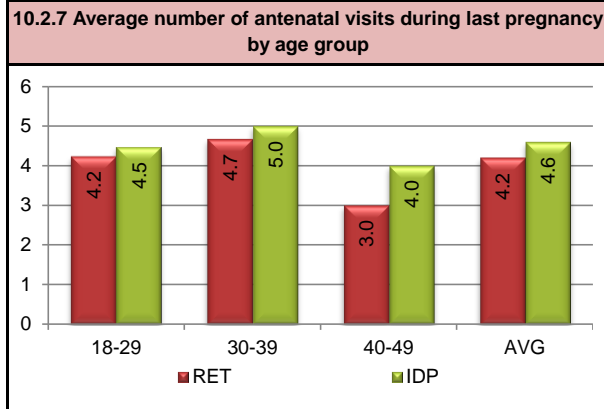
10.1.3 Percentage of HHs with at least one member who sought treatment from a health provider, a pharmacy or traditional healer without staying overnight

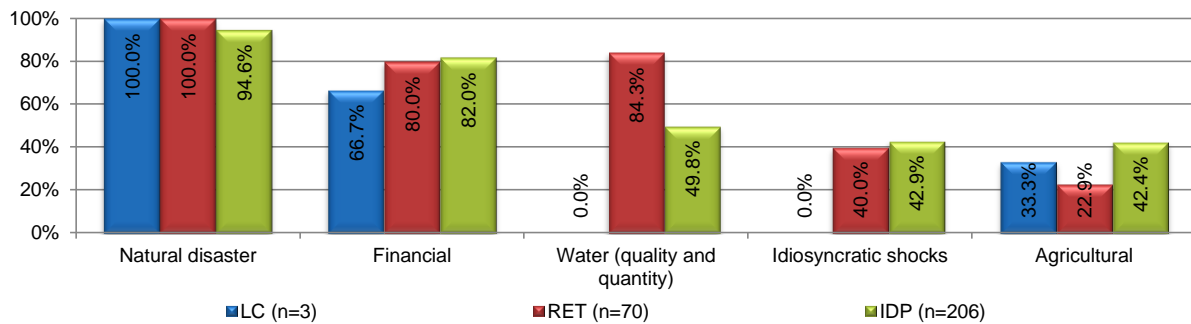
Summary

All local community households were affected by severe winter conditions and two-thirds (66.7%) by unusually high increases in food prices. Two-thirds (66.7%) of households responded to these shocks by reducing expenditure and taking loans, credits or mortgages. One-third (33.3%) of households also reduced the quantity and/or quality of food consumption.

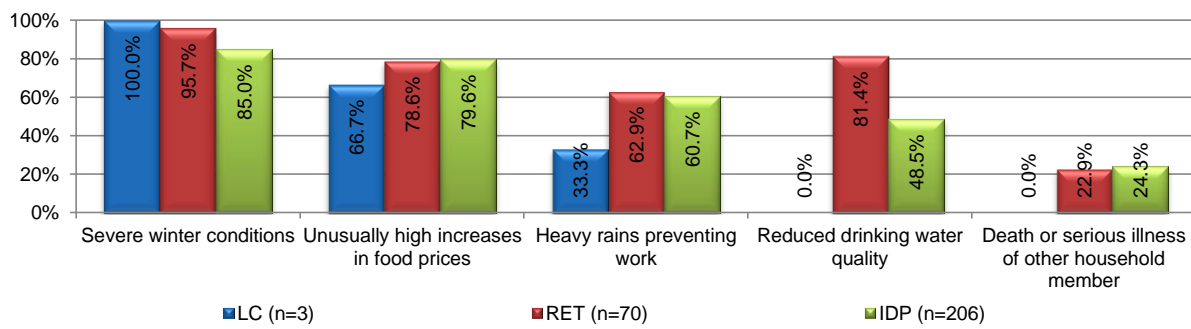
Severe winter conditions affected 95.6% of returnee households. A further 81.4% were affected by reduced drinking water quality, 78.6% by unusually high increases in food prices and 62.9% by heavy rains that prevented work. Over four-fifths (81.4%) of returnee households responded to these shocks by reducing expenditure and taking loans, credits or mortgages. A further 47.1% of households reduced the quantity and/or quality of food consumption, 30.0% worked on aid/relief programmes and 17.1% increased child labour.

Among IDP households, 85.0% were affected by severe winter conditions. A further 79.6% were affected by unusually high increases in food prices, 60.7% by heavy rains that prevented work and 48.5% by reduced drinking water quality. Approximately four-fifths (79.6%) of IDP households responded to these shocks by reducing expenditure, 77.7% responded by taking loans, credits or mortgages, 31.1% reduced the quantity and/or quality of food consumption, 11.2% increased child labour and 9.7% worked on aid/relief programmes.

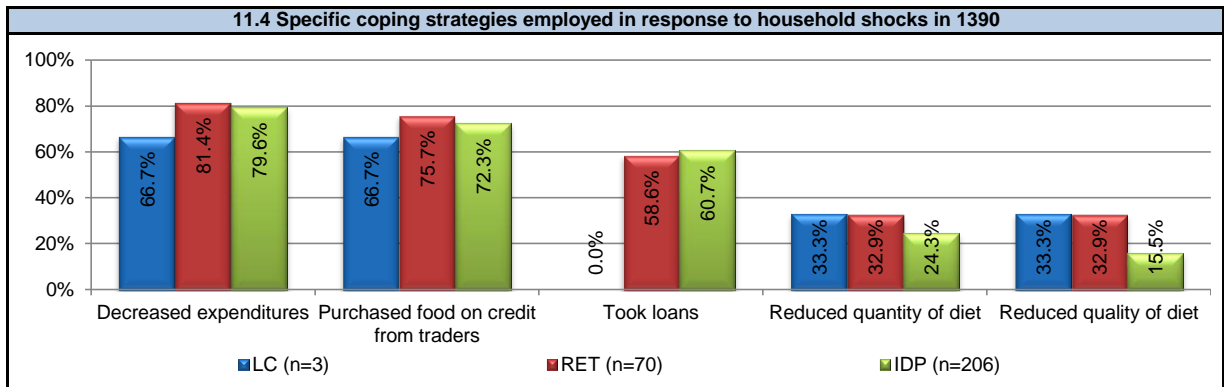
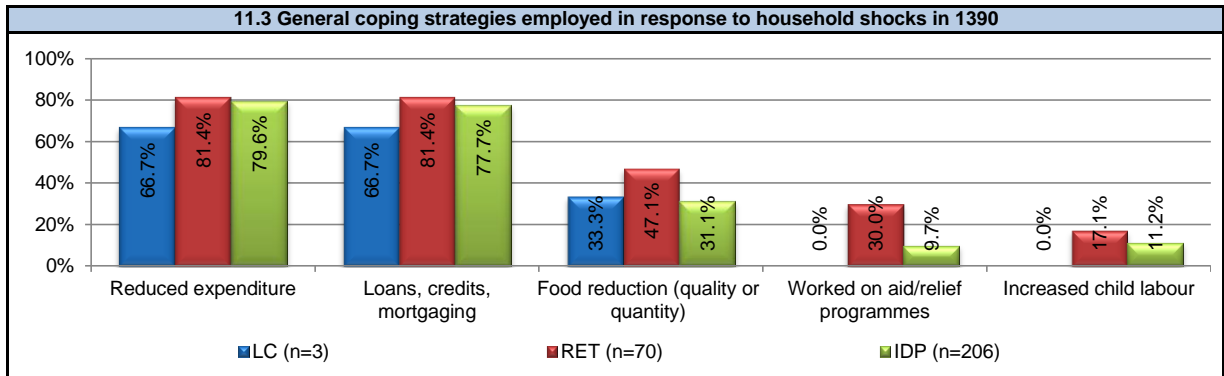
11.1 General household shocks in 1390

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12. PROTECTION PROFILE

Summary

Of the 279 households surveyed, 75.2% had an adult male aged 18-59 years as head of household. The head of household of one returnee household was a male aged 12-17 years, and three IDP households were headed by females aged 18-59 years. A total of 72 households had an elderly (aged 60+) head of household of whom 8.3% were female. Two returnee households and 13 IDP households were headed by a widow or widower.

Two IDP females, one IDP male and one returnee male aged 16-17 years were reported to be married. Among married adults, a total of 56 IDP females and 16 returnee females reported to have been under-18 years of age at the time of marriage and had married at an average age of 15.7 years and 15.5 years respectively.

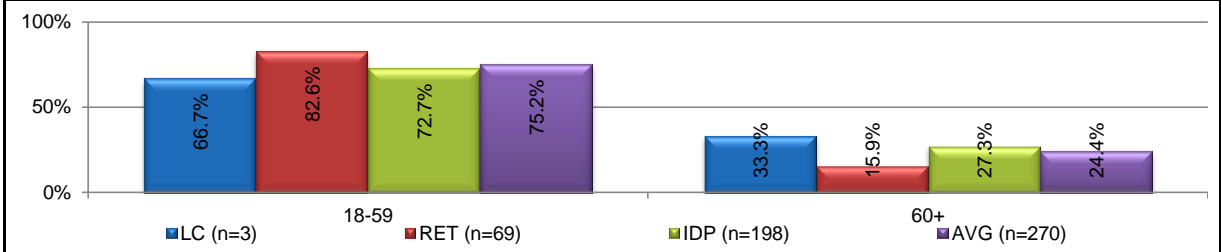
In the region of 8.0% of both returnee and IDP households contained more than one wife.

The survey found 137 persons living with a disability of which 63.5% were male. The most common disabilities were reported to be either physical (40.8%) or sensory (32.8%) in nature. Approximately 64.5% of disabled returnees and 46.7% of disabled IDPs were adults aged 18-59 years. In the region of one quarter of disabled persons in both groups were aged 60 years and over.

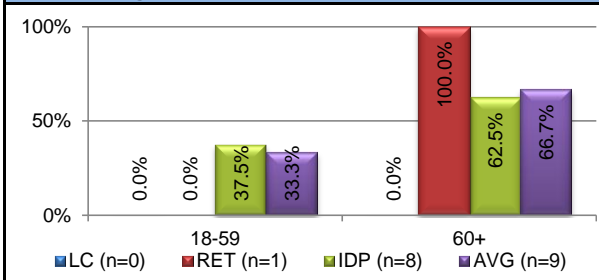
Of the 402 females aged 6-17 years, 31.8% of IDP females, 20.0% of local community females and 3.2% of returnee females are currently not attending school.

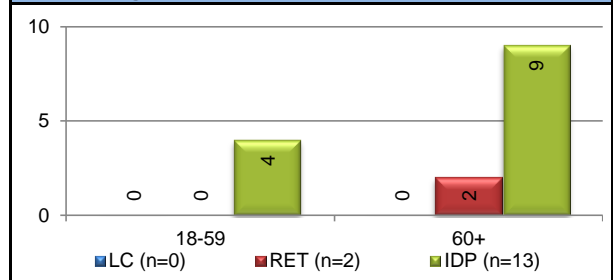
12.1.1 Age distribution of male heads of household



12.1.2 Age distribution of female heads of household

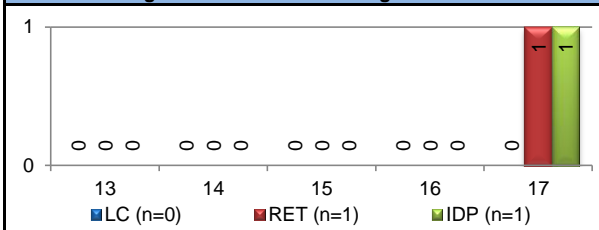


12.1.3 Age distribution of widowed heads of household

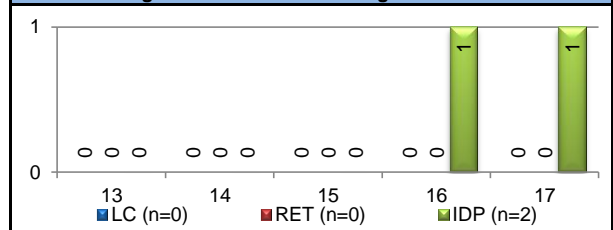

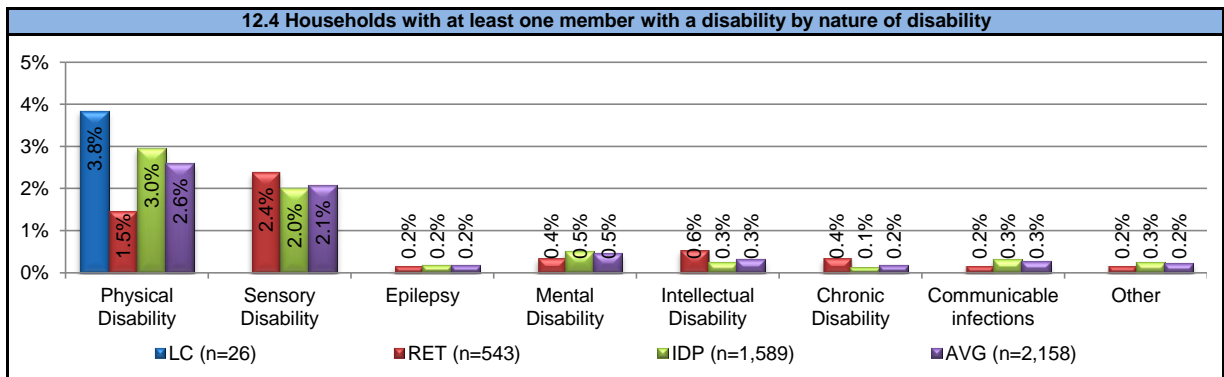
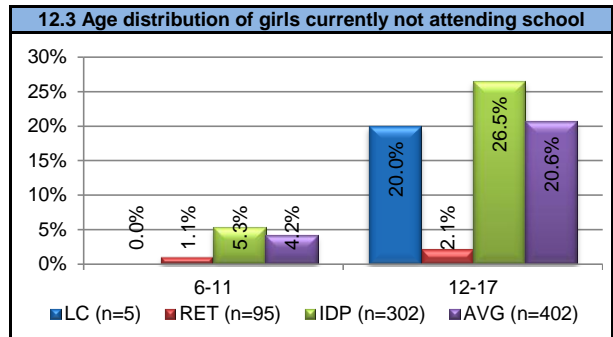
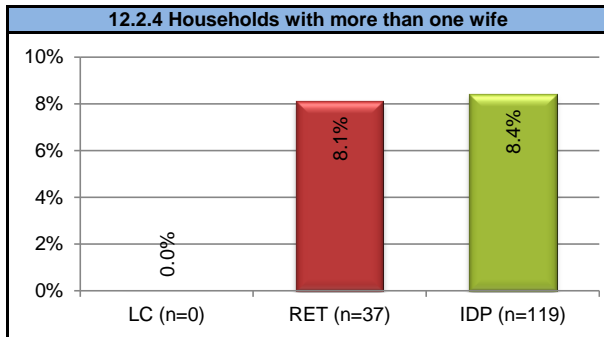
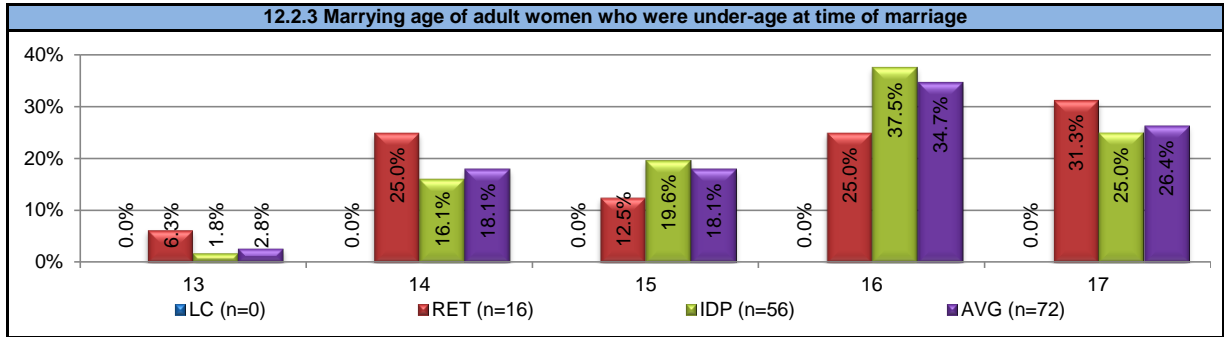
12.2.1 Age distribution of under-age married males



12.2.2 Age distribution of under-age married females



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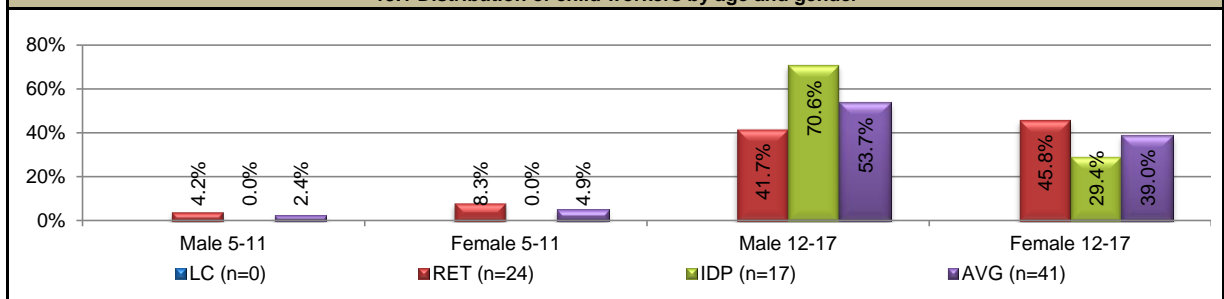

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13. CHILD LABOUR

Summary

Among households surveyed in Sashpol, a total of 41 children were reported to be working and include three children aged 5-11 years and 21 children aged 12-17 years among returnee families, and 17 children aged 12-17 years among IDP families. Child workers belonging to returnee households were reported to be working an average of 4.8 hours per day with 79.2% of returnee child workers reported to be self-employed. Child workers of IDP families work an average of eight hours per day and 41.2% were reported to be salaried workers and 35.3% were day labourers. Returnee child workers were found to be typically engaged in the service sector while IDP child workers were mostly engaged in industry.

13.1 Distribution of child workers by age and gender



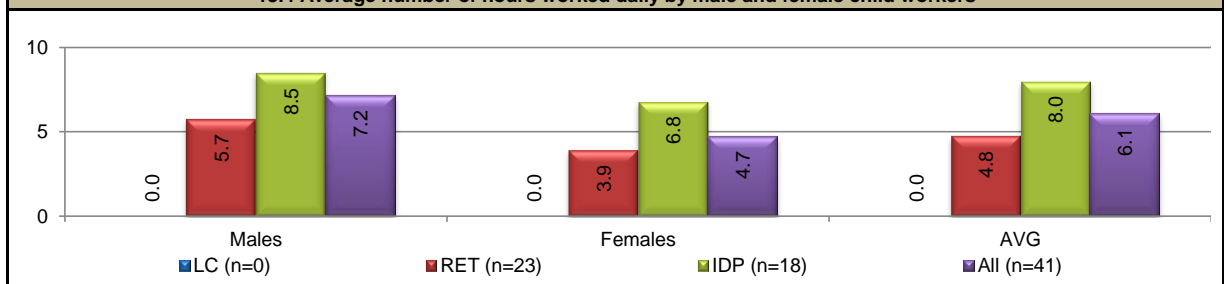

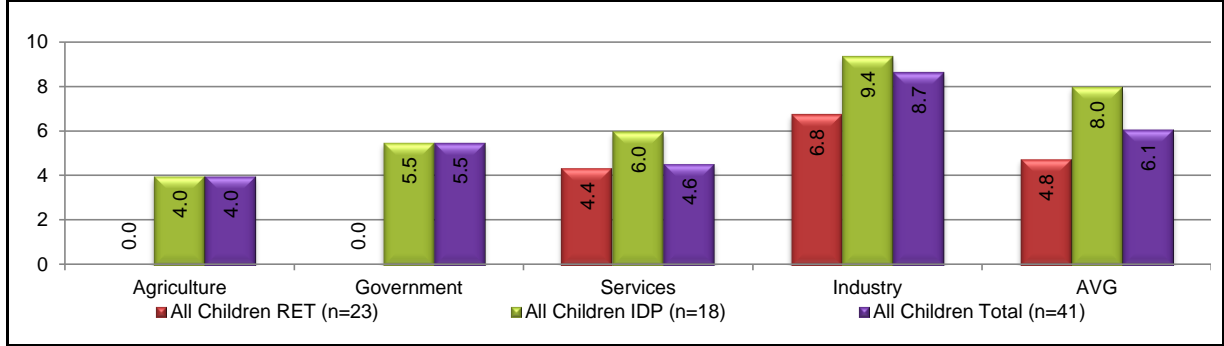

13.4 Average number of hours worked daily by male and female child workers

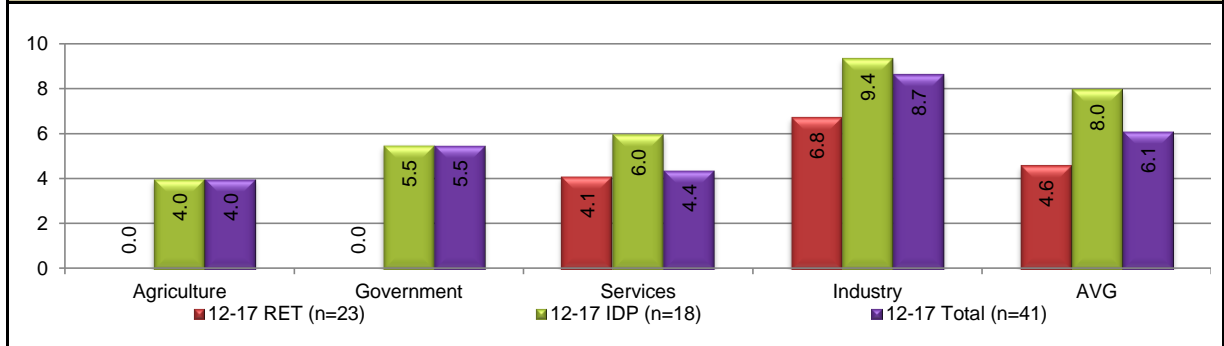


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13.5 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers by economic sector

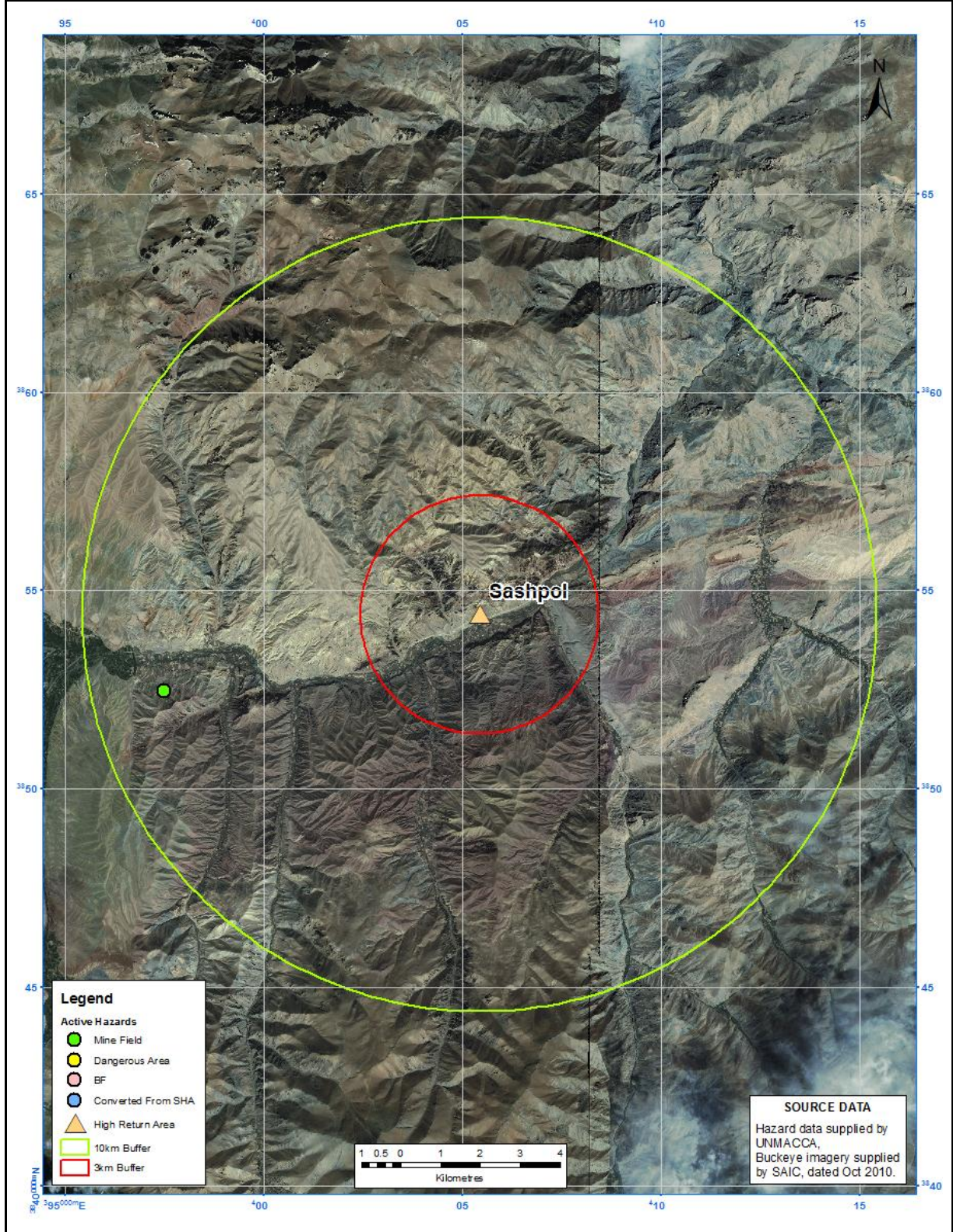


13.6 Average number of hours worked daily by child workers aged 12-17 years by economic sector

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14. SAFETY AND SECURITY

Summary

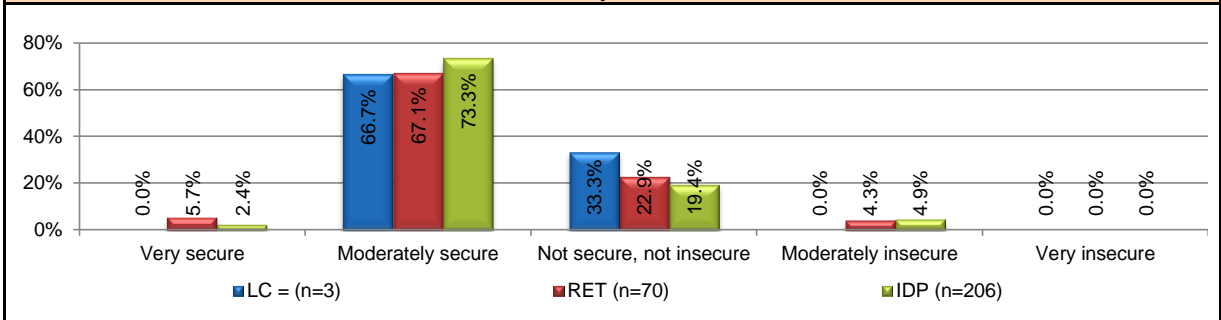
The security situation in the district was described as “moderately secure” by 73.3% of IDP households, 67.1% of returnee households and 66.7% of local community households. Remaining local community households all rated security in the area to be “not secure, not insecure”, as did 22.9% of returnee households and 19.4% of IDP households. Small proportions (2.0%-6.0%) of both returnee and IDP households described the district as being either “very secure” or “moderately insecure.”

All local community households, 61.4% of returnee households and 60.7% of IDP households “sometimes” fear for their personal safety and security or that of their family. Of remaining households, in the region of one quarter of both returnee and IDP households “rarely” do so. A further 8.7% of IDP households and 5.7% of returnee households reported to “mostly” fear for their safety.

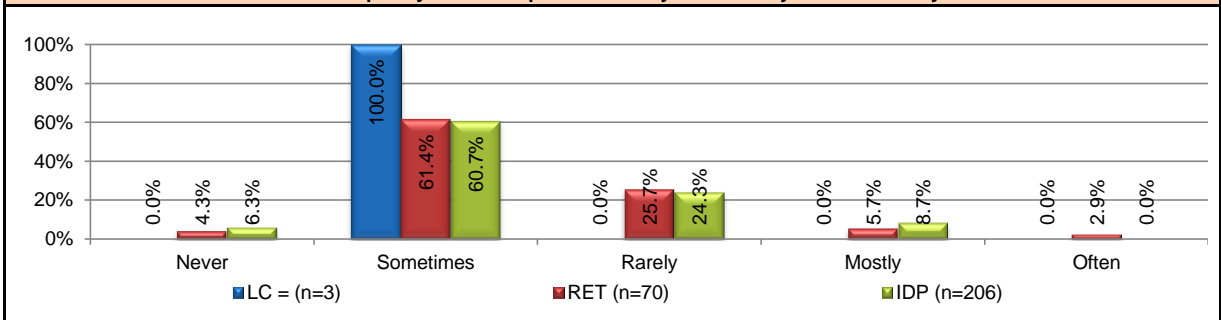
Over 60.0% of households in all three groups reported to be “moderately satisfied” with policing in the district. All remaining local community households are “very satisfied” while the vast majority of remaining returnee and IDP households reported being “not satisfied, not dissatisfied” with the police.

Six IDP households and four returnee households had experienced some form of violence in the three months prior to being surveyed.
