Some asylum seekers and refugees express discontent when they arrive	
in certain sites as the conditions are not always up to standards or

location or security situation are not always met; there is a dilemma	
surrounding how much information can be provided about the	
problematic conditions on certain sites; the information about sites is	
mainly extracted from the 'site profiles', which do not offer extensive	
detail and are not consistently updated. The allocation to sites is carried	
out by the ministry, which leaves PoC with little choice as to their	
housing.	

Site profiles and any other material providing information on the mainland/destination sites (e.g. welcome kits, leaflets etc.) need to be regularly updated as the RIS/UNHCR Joint teams rely on these tools for information provision to the PoC. In addition, UNHCR also requested additional information sources that can be distributed prior to the transfer regarding services in Athens and Thessaloniki, or other urban centers in the mainland, e.g. the 'survival guide'. Such material can be coordinated through the CwC WG and be channeled to the islands via UNHCR and/or local CwC WGs. Any hardcopy material distributed, must ensure that the information contained is not subject to frequent change and is up to date.

Growing UAM issue in urban area Grassroots organizations have reported an increasing number of homeless UAM in the Athens urban area; the burden is growing on	
grassroots to accommodate people.	
Presentation of Lexicon	
The <b>Mini Lexicon</b> , an initiative of EADAP supported by UNHCR and funded by the Swiss Embassy, created as a peaceful co-existence tool with the purpose of facilitating the communication between communities of concern and actors/ service providers as well as native Greek speakers, has been re-printed in 6 different languages (Arabic, Farsi, Kurmanji, Sorani, French, Urdu). The priority distribution points	
are Community Centers and new accommodation structures (e.g. run by Municipalities) since mainland sites and accommodation was targeted during the first round of distribution.	
During the 2 <sup>nd</sup> round 15,000 copies of the Mini Lexicon were printed and 1,000 copies of the service provider folders. At the time being,	
approximately <b>7,000 copies are still available</b> (no Urdu copies, French copies are low in stock). The lexicon is also developed into an app, which should be available for download in both Android and iOs devices.

<u>New projects on mental health/disabilities and service mapping</u> UNHCR will continue to work with the National Confederation of Disabled People and Kinoniko Ekav (KOINΩNIKO EKAB) in 2018 (disability program). NCDP will continue to work with the established disability committee, maintain a hotline and will carry out several trainings. Kinoniko Ekav will continue to work on a carer system (accommodation) as well as on individual cases. Kinoniko Ekav will also set up referral pathways for persons with disabilities in Athens/Thessaloniki and islands. Also, a new partner (Epapsy) will start	
working on mental health projects. These will include trainings and direct support to persons with severe mental health conditions.	
The list of service providers of persons with disabilities (NCDP compilation) was shared with CwC members and added to the drop box folder.

A platform mapping different service providers, community centers and other reference points for asylum seekers and refugees is being carried out by the ACCMR.
