

SOUTH SUDAN REGIONAL REFUGEE RESPONSE PLAN

Uganda: 2017 Key Response Figures

PROTECTION

355,000+
new South Sudanese refugee arrivals **granted refugee status** in 2017

19,587
South Sudanese refugee children with specific needs received **individual case management** and follow up

1,500
people trained on **SGBV prevention & response**, incl. partner staff, government officials & police

EDUCATION

223,400
South Sudanese refugee children were enrolled in **primary education** in 2017

Insufficient number of primary & secondary teachers with more than **60 pupils per teacher**

43% of primary-aged children were not enrolled in education in 2017. **88%** of secondary-aged children were not enrolled in education in 2017

FOOD

904,951 refugees received food assistance in 2017

141,751 via cash transfer. **763,200** via in-kind food

600,000 refugees received an **emergency cash transfer** in Sep 2017 in response to a shortage of cereal

30% of planned food commodities could not be purchased due to funding shortfalls

HEALTH AND NUTRITION

1,557,987 consultations made in 2017, **20%** for the host community

113,860 South Sudanese refugees children vaccinated against **measles**

Crude Mortality Rate: 0.1/1,000/month (within the acceptable standard)

50,434 mothers & children reached with the **Mother-and-Child Health & Nutrition Programme**

LIVELIHOODS AND ENVIRONMENT

71% of refugee households had **access to arable land** in 2017

In 2017, **only 50%** of youth were engaged in **skills development training**

Trees planted in northern Uganda: **1,231,106**

SHELTER AND NFIs

354,556 newly arrived South Sudanese refugees received non-food items in 2017

1,226km of in-settlement & access roads constructed, repaired or rehabilitated in 2017

Only **37%** of South Sudanese refugees with specific needs received **semi-permanent shelter** in 2017

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

70% of water supplied through **sustainable water supply systems** by the end of 2017

1,900 hygiene promoters engaged for community sensitization

66% of refugee families lacked access to **decent household latrines** in 2017
