



# **Highlights and Operational Context**

- UNHCR has not observed major movements from Burundi to the countries in the region due to the referendum held on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2018. The overall trend of new arrivals is going down with monthly variations by country. Refugees continue to arrive in neighbouring countries in 2018, with a potential increase in movement between the countries of asylum with some refugees leaving the United Republic of Tanzania and Rwanda to go to Uganda and other countries in the region.
- UNHCR's Regional Refugee Coordinators (RRCs) for the Burundi and South Sudan situations were invited by the United States Ambassador, H.E. Robert F. Godec, to jointly brief Ambassadors and Heads of delegations on the needs of South Sudanese and Burundian refugees, on the 4<sup>th</sup> May 2018. The briefing focused on recent developments of the forced displacement situation and provided information on some of the most significant challenges and opportunities faced by UNHCR operations in the region.
- On 8th May the High Representative, Federica Mogherini, on behalf of the European Union declared that the regional organization remains deeply concerned by the human rights situation in Burundi, which undermines any initiative for reconciliation, peace and justice. As a guarantor, the EU calls on the Burundian authorities to respect the spirit and the letter of the Arusha Peace Agreement, which formed the basis for the peaceful transfer of power in Burundi and promoted peace and stability in the region. As part of its efforts in support of an inclusive dialogue as the only viable process for a sustainable political solution in Burundi, the EU will continue to work closely with its main international partners, in particular with the Eastern African Community, the African Union, the United Nations and its Special Envoy, and with the OHCHR in Burundi.
- The Special Envoy of the Secretary-General for Burundi, Michel Kafando, urged 'inclusive' talks to resolve crisis in Burundi during a briefing to the Security Council. Kafando added that "inclusive dialogue, including regional actors, is crucial to reinforce the mutual trust and prompt a lasting solution to the political, socio-economic and humanitarian crisis in Burundi".



# Update on voluntary repatriation of Burundian Refugees from the United Republic of Tanzania

#### **Background**

- UNHCR continues not promoting voluntary return to Burundi, however it is supporting the exercise to ensure that returns are based on the principles of voluntariness and informed decisions, and take place in safety and dignity.
- While undertaken the returns, the Tripartite Commission also acknowledged that while some refugees may opt to return now, others may still have well-founded reasons not to return at the present time and will continue to be in need of international protection.

## **Update**

- Some 6,198 Burundian refugees have been repatriated in May to their areas of origin, bringing to 30,088 the number of refugees returned since the beginning of the voluntary repatriation in September 2017.
- Both UNHCR Burundi and the United Republic of Tanzania operations are in need of additional resources due to the need to accommodate the 8,000 returnees per month requirement from the tripartite agreement as well as to continue attending to the lifesaving needs of refugees within the country.

#### **Partners**

- In the United Republic of Tanzania, UNHCR is collaborating closely with the following partners: Government of the United Republic of Tanzania, Danish Refugee Council (DRC), HelpAge International, International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), Tanzanian Red Cross Society (TRCS), International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC), International Organization for Migration (IOM), Plan International, and the World Food Programme (WFP).
- In Burundi, UNHCR is collaborating with the Department of Repatriation under the Government of Burundi, World Food Programme (WFP), International Rescue Committee (IRC), Caritas and the Civil Volunteer Group (GVC).



## Achievements during the Reporting Period

## TANZANIA

#### **Latest Developments**

- Regional Commissioner for Kigoma in collaboration with the Regional Medical Officers carried out an Ebola Preparedness and Response roundtable in Kigoma. Participants at the meeting included all districts and twin Medical Officers within Kigoma region, UNHCR and partners in the refugee response. The main objective was to review Kigoma Regional Ebola and Marburg preparedness and response contingency plan, identify Ebola Treatment Centres (per council), review the strategies in place for all key intervention area, and conduct mapping or high risk areas and available resources.
- Across the three camps of Nduta, Mtendeli and Nyarugusu, out of 289 GBV survivors supported in May 2018, 256 were Burundian refugees. While all survivors received quality case management services and psychosocial support, sexual and gender based violence raising awareness sessions are also ongoing in the camps.

#### Achievements and Challenges

- Refugees have reported improvements in their life style and social coexistence with the community and family members due to the participation in economic and social empowerment activities. However, there have been also reports of people departing with outstanding loans, and of abandonment of families formed whilst in the camps as a result of the voluntary repatriation exercise.
- Good Neighbours Tanzania conducted a monitoring assessment on vocational training graduates from Nduta and Mtendeli. Initial findings revealed that 379 out of 490 graduates who completed their vocational training in 2017 started their own tailoring, hairdressing, bread making and soap making businesses, underlining the potential positive impact livelihoods interventions may have on refugees.



## **RWANDA**

#### **Latest Developments**

- A 24 per cent reduction in the Burundian population in Rwanda was observed due to the verification exercise. The total population of concern in Rwanda at the end of May 2018 was 152,428 individuals, with a 13 per cent reduction due to the inactivation of 22,500 individuals absent in the urban verification exercise.
- In Mahama II, the health facility managed by Save the Children has been accredited by the Rwanda Biomedical Center and the Ministry of Health (RBC/MoH) for starting the HIV programme. However, there is a need to enlarge the waiting areas for all health post to accommodate all HIV and Mental Health program in Mahama II.

#### **Achievements and Challenges**

- In view to enhance awareness and prevent Sexual Transmitted Diseases (STDs) and unwanted pregnancies, 36,315 male condoms were distributed to 10,541 people including the youth. In addition, films about the Youth Reproductive Health were projected twice at the Youth Friendly Services (YFS).
- UNHCR is not able to support the education of children in urban settings due to lack of funding. Furthermore, there is also an urgent need for libraries, computer and sciences laboratories in order to ensure quality education to schoolaged refugee children.

#### DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO

#### **Latest Developments**

- Refugees constructed 220 family shelters, bringing the total number of shelters built at Mulongwe site to 488. Refugees in Mulongwe are given an individual shelter kit, cash and a plot of land to build their own homes as shelter responses took in account the local skills and available construction materials.
- In May, a food fair was carried out in collaboration with the World Food Programme and refugees were able to buy food supplies of their choice in the pre-determined shops. The monthly cash assistance (\$ 12 per person) was transferred to refugees in Lusenda and Mulongwe, who used electronic cards to buy the food supplies.



#### **Achievements and Challenges**

- As of May, over 5,000 refugees were transferred to the new site of Mulongwe. However, over 700 families are still waiting to be transferred as current funding only permits for the construction of 100 additional shelters.
- In Lusenda camp, 99 plastic tarpaulins were distributed to families whose houses were damaged by heavy rains in April. Overall 1,125 shelters still are in need of repair.

## **UGANDA**

#### **Latest Developments**

UNHCR has been engaging with National Water and Sewerage Corporation (NWSC) with regards to taking over the management of water supply services in Rwamwanja settlement. Hence, the inclusion into national systems and sustainable approaches will be enhanced as it is envisaged by the Comprehensive Refugee Response Framework (CRRF).

#### **Achievements and Challenges**


- In Nakivale, enrolment for Early Childhood Development Programmes (ECDs) dropped from 40 per cent to 19 per cent while primary school attendance also dropped from 82 per cent to 34 per cent due to parents engaging children in the harvest season. Windle International Uganda (WIU) is conducting sensitization for parents to enrol their children at the nearest ECDs and allow their children to attend school regularly.
- In the effort to support feeding programming and generate income for Nakivale Vocational Training Centre, 2.5 acres of Banana plantation and five acres of maize were cultivated for the institution's sustainability.



## **Financial Information**
