

# Sea Arrivals Dashboard

## Overview

So far in 2019, a total of **1,851** refugees and migrants arrived in Greece by sea. The majority are from Afghanistan (42%), the State of Palestine (18%) and Syria (9%). More than half of the population are women (22%) and children (35%), while 43% are men.

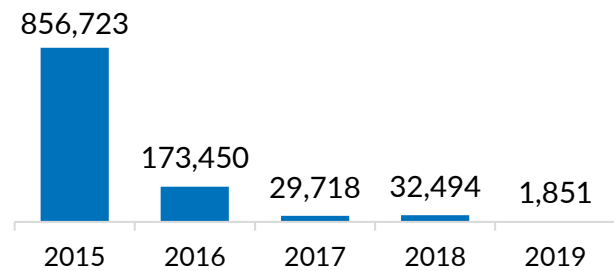
Arrivals in January 2019, at 1,851 decreased in comparison to December, when 2,927 people had arrived on the islands. Arrivals during 2019 are 13% higher than those in 2018.

Lesvos received the majority (36%) of all new arrivals, during January 2019, followed by the Dodecanese islands (27%), Samos (19%) and Chios (17%).

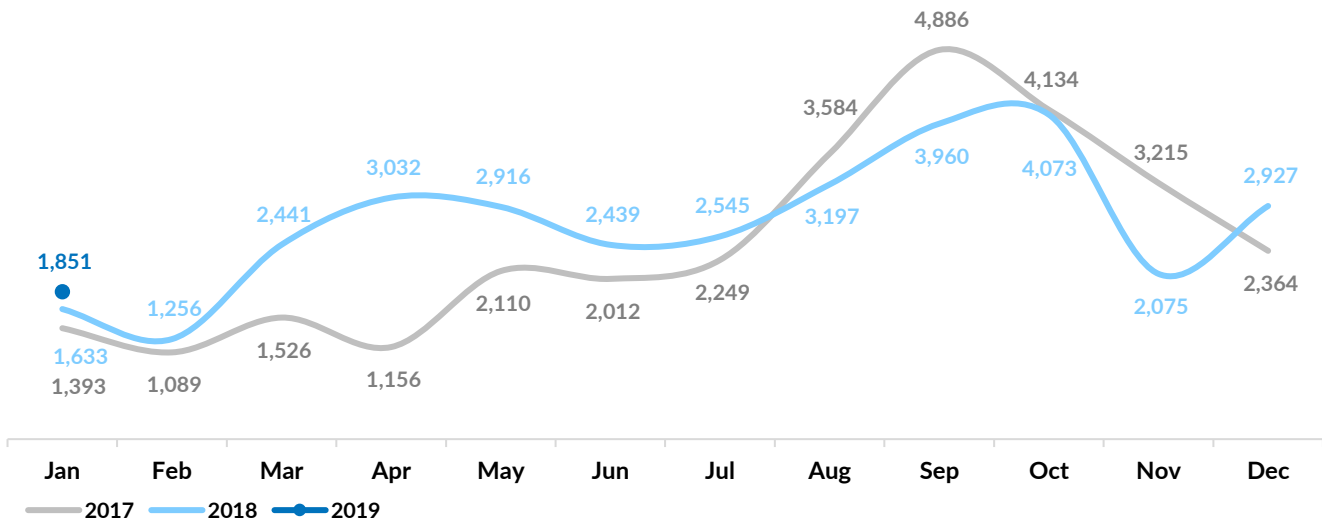

## Arrivals from 2015 to 2019

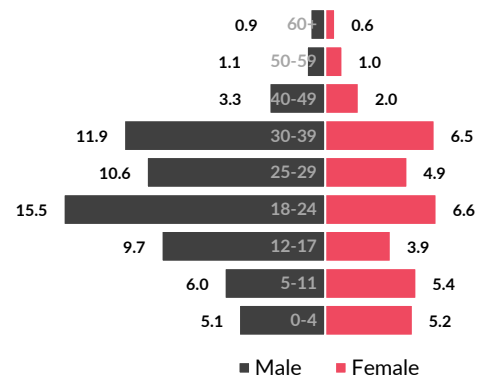


## Monthly Arrivals 2017 to 2019



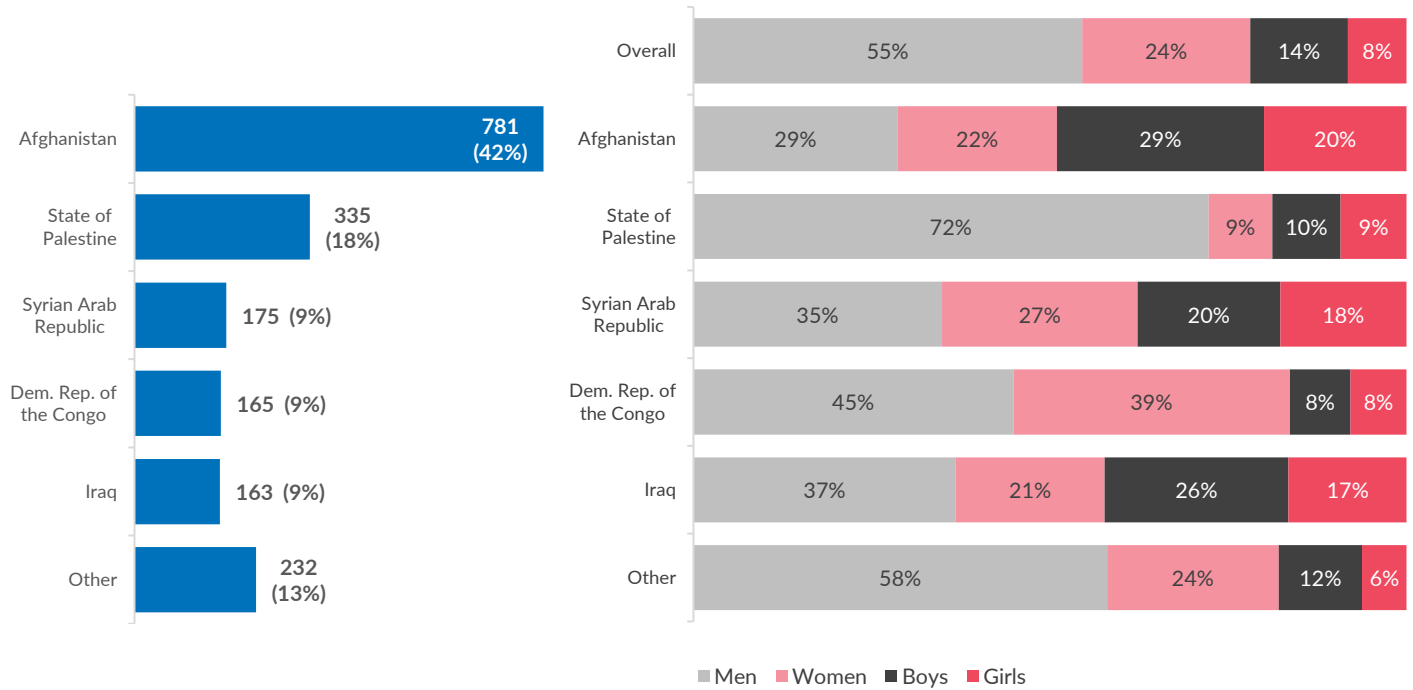
## Demographics

Similar to last year, over one-third of arrivals in 2019 are children. Of those, more than 6 out of 10 are below the age of 12. Additionally, 19% of all children were registered upon arrival as unaccompanied or separated, mainly from Afghanistan and Egypt. Some 38% of arrivals are men between 18 and 39 years old. Only 4% of arrivals are 50 years old or older.



## Demographics (continued)

The majority of new arrivals in 2019 are from Afghanistan (781), the State of Palestine (335) and Syria (175). Similar to last year, the majority of arrivals from Afghanistan, Syria and Iraq arrived in family groups.



## Entry points

During January 2019, the majority of refugees and migrants in Greece arrived on Lesbos (670), the Dodecanese islands (504) and Samos (354). In January, refugees and migrants arrived on six islands. Lesbos received the highest number of people from Afghanistan comparing to the overall number of sea arrivals in Greece in 2019, whilst Chios and the Dodecanese islands received the majority of people originating from Iraq.
