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### OVERVIEW

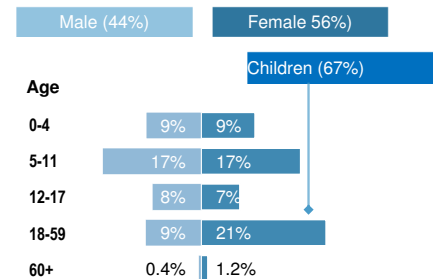
Pugnido 2 was opened on 25 August 2015. It was established to host South Sudanese refugees who arrived in Ethiopia during the second quarter of 2015 and were residing in transit centers at Matar, Burbiey and Pagak entry points. The relocation from Matar took place from August 2015 to February 2016.

### RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

- The camp is at care and maintenance phase. The last time refugees were received and settled in the camp was early 2016. The Comprehensive level 3 registration was launched in December 2018.
- Although refugee in the camp received humanitarian assistance programs smoothly, access to livelihood opportunity is very limited. It's worth noting the WFP CWW livelihood projects are ongoing with target assistance for 200 HHs.
- The tribal conflict in the Gambella areas continues to have a trigger down effect in the Pugnido refugee's camps and host community.

### WORKING WITH PARTNERS

UNHCR provides protection and services to refugees in **Pugnido II** in collaboration with:

- **Administration for Refugee and Returnee Affairs (ARRA)** - In representation of Ethiopian government - Camp Management and Security; Primary Health Care; Primary Education; Food and CRIs Distribution; Logistics.
- International Rescue Committee (IRC)- WASH-Water, Sanitation and Hygiene
- Action Against Hunger (AAH) – Nutrition
- **International Medical Corps (IMC)** – Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV)
- **Plan International** – Child Protection; emergency education, youth programs
- **World Food Programme (WFP)** – Food supply and transportation
- **Rehabilitation and Development Organization (RaDO)**- Support to Persons with Specific Needs and Community-based HIV/AIDS services
- Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) – Shelter
- National Natural Resources Development And Environmental Protection (NRDEP) – Protection of the environment

# MAIN ACTIVITIES

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## HEALTH

Health clinics are available for refugees and host communities wherein receive medical care, including:

- Health services, including vaccination and anti-malaria campaigning activities
- Reproductive health and HIV/AIDS services
- Support to health centers with drugs and medical equipment.



## NUTRITION

Refugees have access to infrastructure and receive nutritional support, including:

- Provision of supplementary and therapeutic feeding as well as promotion of child and maternal feeding practice (includes plumpy nuts)



## WASH

- Refugees have access to 19.95 liters of potable water per person per day
- Management and monitoring of existing water systems, and borehole drilling
- Sanitation and Hygiene promotion
- Construction and maintenance of family latrines and refuse pits
- WASH-related capacity building. A permanent water supply system and sanitation program in place



## PROTECTION & COMMUNITY SERVICES & REGISTRATION

UNHCR and its partners provide protection to refugees and promote durable solutions to their plight through:

- Camp management and security
- Support for persons with disability and other vulnerable groups
- Child Protection
- SGBV prevention, response services and capacity building
- Education and livelihood for more self-reliance
- Capacity Building on Refugee Protection to Partners, Local Authorities and Refugee Structures.



## SHELTER

- 35% of the households have received transitional shelter support. Combined efforts are ongoing to provide more households with adequate shelter.



## CORE RELIEF ITEMS

- Sanitary Materials of 6 pieces of sanitary pad, 3 pieces of soap, 1 metre of sanitary cloth and 1 underwear - are distributed to female refugees aged 13-49.



## LOGISTICS & SITE PLANNING

- Refugees are transported and relocated from border areas and to the camps. In addition, the camp layout is conducted. Pugnido II camp is comprised of six zones (A, B, C, D, F and H).



## EDUCATION

- Currently, three ECCDs, three CFS and a Youth center are run by Plan International. A total of 1,185 kids of 3-6 years of age attend classes in these centres. Primary School from Grade 1-8 run by ARRA is functional, and a total of 2,783 students (1,717 boys, 1,166 girls) attend classes. There is no high school but it is under construction, 215 students from this camp attend high school classes at DICAC coordinated high school in Pugnido town – a distance of 12 kilometers.
- Functional Adult Literacy education is coordinated by DICAC facilitated by volunteer incentives teachers and a total of 258 (252 women, 6 males) of adult learners attended the program in 3 centers.



## ENVIRONMENT

UNHCR and its partners seek to reduce the environmental the negative impact in areas hosting refugees through:

- Forest and environmental protection and capacity building on environmental protection.



## FOOD

- General Food Distribution – Monthly food basket per person was composed of cereals (13.5 kg), pulse (1.5 kg), CSB+ (1 kg), and vegetable oil (0.9 kg).
