


SITUATION OVERVIEW

Over 738,000 Rohingya refugees have fled violence from Myanmar's Rakhine state since August 2017 and are hosted in Bangladesh. Most of the refugees rely on humanitarian assistance, having left with few possessions and exhausted their financial resources during the journey.


More than 906,000 Rohingya refugee women, men, girls and boys are hosted in Cox's Bazar District, including 34,172 registered refugees who arrived in the 1990s (4%); and other unregistered Rohingya refugees who had settled in host communities prior to August 2017. Children make up 55% of the total refugee population and women and girls make up 52%. One in three refugee families have at least one easily identifiable protection vulnerability. Whilst the pace of arrivals has decreased, refugees continue to arrive in Bangladesh, as of end of December 2018.

The dashboard monitor the monthly achievements of selected indicators from the 2018 country operation plan for each strategic area of activity with cumulative key figures and monthly highlights.


GEOGRAPHIC SITUATION




POPULATION KEY FIGURES



AGE & GENDER BREAKDOWN



PROGRESS AGAINST 2018 TARGETS



HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 5,785 refugees have participated in the joint Government of Bangladesh-UNHCR verification exercise in this reporting month
- 2,810 refugees received legal capacity building and awareness while 188 refugees received legal counselling in this reporting month
- 196 refugees with disabilities received specific support, 63 refugees with psychosocial needs received psychosocial support and 803 PSN* have been referred in this reporting month
- 85 persons trained in community leadership and decision-making, 19 new community groups have been supported while 1 participatory assessment has been conducted in this reporting month
- 80,463 children have benefited from psychosocial activities and 171 UASCS have been identified in this reporting month
- 199 partners, government and UNHCR staff have been trained on SGBV prevention and response, while 378 survivors of SGBV incidents received psychosocial counselling in this reporting month






HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 34,944 children attending primary education in this reporting month
- 2,996 students attending lower secondary education in this reporting month
- 45,118 students have received educational materials in this reporting month




HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 33,679 primary health care consultations and 406 patients admitted and treated in UNHCR supported facilities in this reporting month
- 680 new admissions to community management of acute malnutrition programmes have been reported in this month
- 181 children 6-59 months and 127 pregnant and lactating women have been admitted in the blanket supplementary feeding in this reporting month


WASH
KEY FIGURES

-  **30,516** WASH facilities assessed during a sweep survey
-  **56,787** WASH hygiene kits distributed
-  **39,911** tube well and latrine maintenance conducted (repair, renovate, decommission and desludge)

PROGRESS AGAINST 2018 TARGETS

HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 15,552** WASH facilities have been assessed during the sweep survey in the month of November, including **3,367** water points, **6,018** latrine blocs, and **6,167** bathing blocs
- 19,423** individuals reached by hygiene promotion during this reporting month
- 4,966** WASH facilities have been maintained in this reporting month, including, **1,382** tube wells and **3,584** latrines.


SHELTER

-  **351*** kilometers of roads, bridges, steps, retaining structures and drainage constructed
-  **90,325** pre-monsoon shelter tie-down kits distributed
-  **85,415** shelter padlocks provided


HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 34** kilometers of infrastructures constructed during this reporting month, including **11** km of road, **0.36** km of bridges, **7** km of steps, **7** km of retaining structures and **9** km of drainage.
- 2,535** upgraded shelter provided during this reporting month.
- 4,461** pre-monsoon shelter tie-down kits and **9,323** shelter padlocks distributed during this reporting month.

-  **1,138,201** tree sapling, shrub & vetiver grass seedling planted
-  **33** conflicts with elephants successfully mitigated by trained ERT* members
-  **700** street lights installed

PROGRESS AGAINST 2018 TARGETS

HIGHLIGHTS (DECEMBER 2018)

- 33** hectares has been covered by seedling planting including **14** ha of tree saplings, **3** ha of shrubs and **26** ha of vetiver grass planting
- The total number of seedling planting included **35,201** tree saplings, **30,000** shrubs and **1,073,000** of vetiver grass
- 25,941** households have received LPG cylinder while refill of LPG have been distributed to **12,020** others families in this reporting month.

-  **16** camps managed by site management support agency partners
-  **53,051** female/menstrual hygiene kits distributed
-  **1,022** post disaster kits distributed from June to September
