The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees was established on December 14, 1950 by the United Nations General Assembly. The agency is mandated to lead and co-ordinate international action to protect refugees and resolve refugee problems worldwide. Its primary purpose is to safeguard the rights and well-being of refugees. It strives to ensure that everyone can exercise the right to seek asylum and find safe refuge in another State, with the option to return home voluntarily, integrate locally or to resettle in a third country. It also has a mandate to help stateless people.

Since 1950, the agency has helped tens of millions of people restart their lives. Today, a staff of more than 9,300 people in 123 countries continues to help and protect millions of refugees, returnees, internally displaced and stateless people. Important Information:

- The interested NGOs, Umbrella NGOs, Consortium of NGOs and Foundations registered in the country wishing to apply in reply to this Call for Expression of Interest are required to submit only a Concept Note along with set of supporting documents including Partner Declaration
- The Concept Note is primarily for the partner to express its unique advantage and added value for the Project objectives.
- The Concept Note is intended to allow the partner to:
 - a) Articulate its objectives in undertaking the Project;
 - b) Briefly describe the implementation approach for realizing the desired outcome of the Project;
 - c) Demonstrate the unique advantage it brings to the partnership for realizing the desired outcome of the Project; and
- d) Demonstrate its complementariness to UNHCR's capacities and resources for the Project.
- The Concept Note should not be a fully developed project proposal and should be concise, contain clear information and <u>not exceed three pages</u> because the selected partner will



- participate in the design and detailed budgeting of the Project and enter a Project Partnership Agreement in accordance with the rules and procedures of UNHCR.

Brief Background of the Project:

The Republic of North Macedonia has a long history of hosting refugees from the wars in the former Yugoslavia, and recently, the country has received refugees from outside the region, fleeing war and persecution in their homelands in the Middle East and around the world. In 2019, refugees from Kosovo¹ make up the vast majority of the refugee population in the country, while a considerably smaller number are from the countries outside the region.

The national legislation guarantees specific rights to refugees, such as the right to employment, social protection, healthcare, education, and housing. To enable a coordinated approach in the implementation of the legislation, the Government adopted the Strategy for Integration of Refugees and Foreigners in 2008, covering the period until 2015; the new Strategy, initially planned for the period from 2017 - 2027, is still pending adoption. In addition, the Resolution on Migration Policy of North Macedonia 2015-2020 foresees integration measures and access to key services for refugees/migrants.

The leading institution for refugee integration is the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy.

Despite the efforts of the Government to support refugees to integrate, there are significant challenges that prevent refugees to maximize their potentials, rebuild their lives and contribute to the society. The main challenges for local integration refer to: (a) access to national schools and kindergartens, mainly due to absence of adequate language trainings and other relevant support programs that will support enrolment and adaptation of refugee and asylum seeking children in state run schools; (b) finding employment, coupled with lack of training/qualification and prequalification programs and job search mentoring and advice; (c) access to comprehensive information and advice on integration opportunities and their future in the country, in particular for those living outside Skopje; (d) targeted support services for vulnerable refugees and asylum seekers, with emphasis on unaccompanied and separated children. A number of children traveling alone that have been received in the country, reported the need of child centered system that will support their integration form the first day of their arrival.

Goal/Objective, Expected Outcome and Main Activities:

To address the specific challenges related to local integration, a two-fold approach is suggested:

• Direct support to refugees and complement the work of national authorities.

Providing educational and occupational activities for refugees and asylum seekers, developing and delivering services that will enhance refugee's capacities for self-reliance, building their personal and professional skills in order to be able to actively participate and contribute to the society. The proposed activities should be complementary to the national program for inclusion of asylum seekers and refugees and Resolution on Migration Policy of North Macedonia 2015-2020.

• Strengthening the cooperation at municipal level - Involvement of local municipalities and local civil society organizations in development of integration policies and services

Involvement of targeted local municipalities, civil society organizations and other stakeholders at local level, should result in better identification and addressing of the specific needs of asylum seekers and refugees, including obstacles which vulnerable groups are faced with; fostering better refugee reception by promoting acceptance and fighting discrimination and xenophobia; informing refugees about their rights and responsibilities in the host community, including service provision. The intervention should be based on the comprehensive mapping exercise, which would identify available local integration options and related gaps, map the stakeholders and inform decision on local communities to be targeted for the specific intervention.

Proposed approach should be implemented under the following two UNHCR objectives:

Objective: Potential for integration realized

Output 1: Advocacy conducted

Output 2: Coexistence projects promoted with development actors, government, private sector and other stakeholders

Activities:

• The applicants have the freedom to propose the method and activities, to produce expected outcomes. The methods may include, but are not limited to: support to social inclusion, employment support (support for active participation and contribution to the labor market through training, orientation, counseling or inclusion into the existing national programs), language training, targeted support for vulnerable refugees and asylum seekers, advocacy interventions for local integration, conducting comprehensive research on availability and access to services, strengthening the capacities on local level for local integration of refugees (including direct support to pre-selected municipalities)...

Expected Outcome:

- Appropriate and accessible activities for asylum seekers and refugees to assist their local integration through information provision, counseling, education and training introduced;
- Mapping of relevant stakeholders and available local integration services on local level completed based on previously developed matrix of indicators to record needs, services, challenges, responses.
- Potentials for intervention on short, medium and long term on local level identified;
- Capacities of local authorities to work with refugees and asylum seekers strengthened.
- Any other outcome that may be relevant for achieving the objective



Objective: Protection of children strengthened

Output: Best interest determination process established and operational

Activities:

 The applicants have the freedom to propose the method, activities, to produce expected outcomes. The methods may include, but are not limited to targeted activities to support social inclusion of vulnerable individuals with special emphasis of unaccompanied and/or separated children.

Expected Outcome:

• Vulnerable asylum seekers and refugees with emphasis on unaccompanied and separated children have access to services that are child centered and informed by their best interest.
