

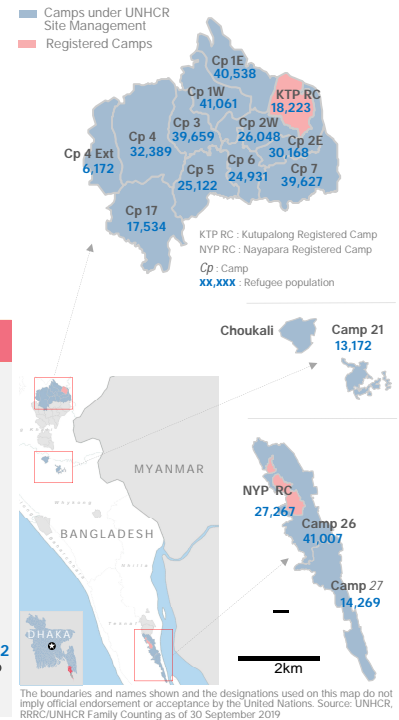
## SITUATION OVERVIEW

Over 744,000 Rohingya refugees have fled violence from Myanmar's Rakhine state since August 2017 and are hosted in Bangladesh. Most of the refugees rely on humanitarian assistance, having left with few possessions and exhausted their financial resources during the journey.

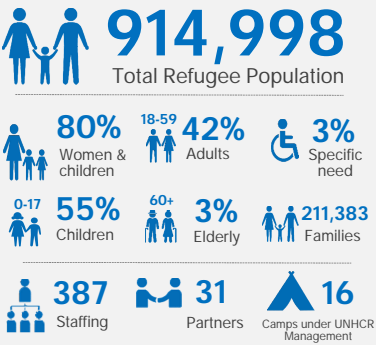
More than 914,000 Rohingya refugee women, men, girls and boys are hosted in Cox's Bazar District, including 34,917 registered refugees who arrived in the 1990s (4%); and other unregistered Rohingya refugees who had settled in host communities prior to August 2017. Children make up 55% of the total refugee population and women and girls make up 52%. One in three refugee families have at least one easily identifiable protection vulnerability. Whilst the pace of arrivals has decreased, refugees continue to arrive in Bangladesh, as of end of August 2019.

The dashboard monitor the monthly achievements of selected indicators from the 2019 country operation plan for each strategic area of activity with cumulative key figures and monthly highlights.

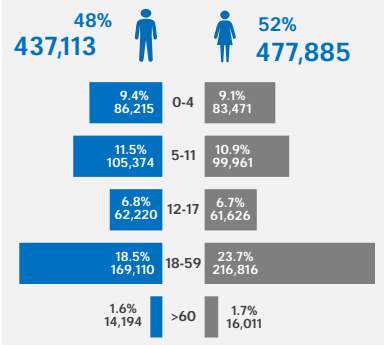
## GEOGRAPHIC SITUATION



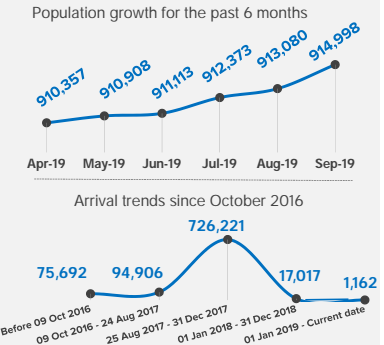
### POPULATION KEY FIGURES

### KEY FIGURES

### ACHIEVEMENT (SEPTEMBER 2019)

- 115,068 refugees participated in the joint Government of Bangladesh-UNHCR registration exercise in this reporting month.
- 1,573 refugees and 774 community leaders attended awareness raising sessions while 22 monitoring visits to detention centres were conducted in this reporting month.
- 5,106 complaints received under the community-based complaints mechanism and 6 new community groups were supported in this reporting month.
- 1,147 adolescents and youth received services while 74 UASCs were identified and documented in this reporting month.
- 243 partners, government and UNHCR staff trained on SGBV prevention and response while 463 survivors of SGBV incidents received psychosocial counselling in this reporting month.

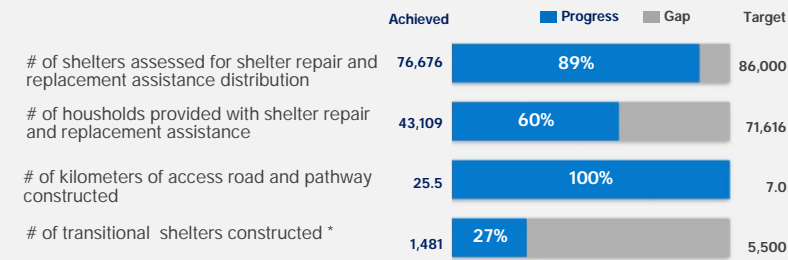

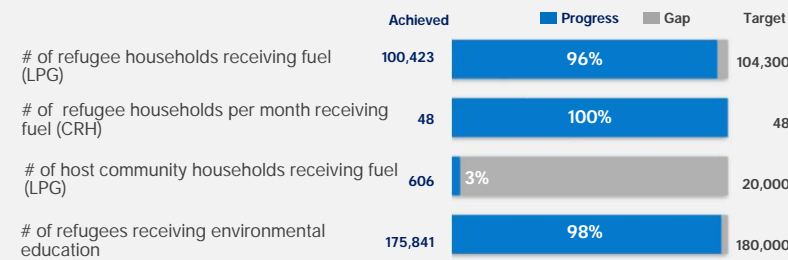
**PROGRESS AGAINST 2019 TARGETS**
