As indicated by MOPIC, projects targeting more than 50% refugees should be included under refugee part of JRP, while projects targeting more than 50% Jordanians should be included under Host community (former resilience). <p>Community Based Approach</p>	<p>community based protection mechanism, linking prevention, response and mitigation initiatives at national and international level and empowering communities to identify protection problems and strengthen protection strategies.</p> <p>The practise responds to range of protection threats facing women and girls in emergencies by supporting them in identifying and analysing to threats such as threats existed before the emergency, threats that are emergency induced and those that are created by humanitarian themselves.</p> <p>The practice links emergency response to resilience-building and longer term sustainable change by focusing on three main points: Accountability to affected communities, shifting the power for local leaders to enable them in programme design and response by supporting their access to national funding and advocacy opportunities, and women’s leadership focusing on shifting power to women leaders and women’s rights programming, including protection programming.</p>	
<p>GBV interagency minimum standards presentation</p>	<p>The resource was developed at global level by 18 organization for GBV prevention and response programming and for GBV specialized actors and partners. In Jordan we carried out a consultation on the minimum standards last year. It presents 16 Minimum Standards for the prevention of and response to gender-based violence in emergencies. As a whole, the 16 Minimum Standards define what agencies working on specialized gender-based violence programming need to achieve to prevent and respond to gender-based violence, and deliver multisectoral services.</p> <p>The objective of the Minimum Standards is to establish a common understanding of what constitutes minimum prevention and response programming in emergencies.</p> <p>Each Standard in this resource represents common agreement on what needs to be achieved for that specific programmatic element to be</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Co-chairs to send link in this minutes: https://www.unfpa.org/sites/default/files/pub-pdf/19-200_Minimun_Standards_Report_ENGLISH-Nov.FINAL.pdf

<p>16 Days Campaign Debriefing</p>	<p>A quick update on the SGBV SWG work on the 16 days of activism, which included:</p> <p>1) <u>Development of Key Messages</u> The SGBV SWG in consultation with Syrian refugees developed 7 key messages under 4 main topics: Economic Abuse, Denial of Education opportunities for adolescent girls, Sexual Harassment in the workplace and Access to services which were used during the 16 days campaign period.</p> <p>2) <u>Joint Calendar collecting all activities at different field locations</u> The SGBV SWG developed a calendar with all the activities happening around Jordan during the 16 days campaign. More than 200 activities conducted by 24 organization covering all 12 Jordanian governorates and 4 refugee camps (Zaatari, Azraq, EJC and KAP).</p> <p>3) <u>Arrangements of Joint Events</u> The SGBV SWG organized 5 joint events:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. 	<p>In collaboration with the Greater Amman Municipality, the SGBV SWG organized a joint event on 5th of December at Al-Hussein Cultural Center, which included 22 artistic activities such as a graffiti, art exhibition displaying 50 paintings and photographs, rap song, video screening and more, in addition to opening remarks by the UN RC, Swedish Ambassador, GAM representative, UNHCR and UNFPA representatives. The event was attended by 400 participants from donor agencies, humanitarian and development actors, refugee volunteers, beneficiaries to the general public.</p> <p>2. SGBV SWG joint event in Mafraq: In collaboration with Al Al-Bayt University, the SGBV SWG organized an event on 27th of Nov at Al Al-Bayt University which included a bazaar, a play and a movie.</p> <p>3. SGBV SWG joint event in Irbid: The SGBV SWG organized an event on 3rd and 4th of Dec in Irbid's Municipality Hall which included self-defense sessions, debate, games for minors, traditional dance, sketch, products, a video displaying success stories on women's economic empowerment, lawyers providing awareness sessions on national laws related to domestic violence and economic violence.</p> <p>4. SGBV SWG joint events in Azraq Camp: In Azraq, two joint events were conducted; one in the open area on 25th of Nov and second in the closed area on 26th of Nov.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. 25th of Nov: In collaboration with JNCW, the SGBV SWG organized an opening event which included a shadow theater, a freeze mob, mural painting and a poem, in addition to the opening remarks. Around 200 participants attended the event. b. 26th of Nov: the joint event included a shadow theater, caravan painting by adolescent girls and storytelling.
