Uganda Refugee Response Plan (RRP) 2020-2021

January - December 2021

Overview

By the end of fourth quarter, the latrine household coverage for south Sudanese refugees' population and Burundian refugees' population exceeded the set target (76%/75% and 85%/80% respectively). The Congolese refugee's population remains below the target with a coverage of 68% against the target of 75%. Efforts to improve on the coverage have been factored in the 2022 strategy. Institutional sanitation facilities constructed in the Congolese and other case load is 259 exceeding the set target of 200 while the South Sudanese and Burundian refugees are below the target (166 against a target of 200 and 4 against a target of 7 respectively).

Water supplied during the quarter met minimum quality standards for all the population groups. There is minimal variation regarding water supply access levels for all the refugee caseloads for this quarter in relation to the previous quarter. Water supply levels per day for Congolese refugees remains low (13.5lpd) while South Sudanese and Burundian refugees have an average daily water access of 18.7lpd and 17.3lpd respectively. Concerted efforts towards optimizing the available sources are being implemented to improve on the water supply access level. The utility approach implementation is progressing fairly well in both Congolese and south Sudanese refugees with an achievement of 66% against 100% target and extra efforts are being taken up by UNHCR in collaboration with Ministry of Water and Environment in gazetting the systems for utility entities.


Challenges


There is a reduction in funding to WASH interventions, despite the increasing needs across the settlement. Anticipated influx from the DRC has diverted resources that could have been used to improve WASH access in the settlements. The country contingency preparedness plan will be developed to facilitate timely emergency response.

Key priorities

For 2022, key priorities remain the operation and maintenance of existing water facilities, inclusion into national systems through utility approach, and improvement in household latrine coverage using dome shaped slabs.

There will be a shift to the utility approach in an effort to ensure sustainable operation and maintenance which requires preparation of the water users including concerted efforts by the stakeholders.


