## Child Protection Sub Working Group Work plan 2022

Objective: strengthen and harmonize Child Protection (CP) interventions for refugee children of all nationalities, with a particular focus on unaccompanied and separated children (UASC), children exposed to violence or neglect, children exposed to the worst forms of child labor, children under danger of early marriage, children with disabilities and children in conflict with the law.

The child protection sectoral working group underlines key child protection issues in Jordan, including the prevalence of violence against children in different settings (schools, family, community, institutions, and online), the worst forms of child labor including children begging in the street, children deprived of parental care, online sexual exploitation, and abuse, Gender-Based Violence, Bullying, child marriage, sexual exploitation, and children in contact with the law. Refugee children living in camps and host communities are faced with levels of vulnerability, of child protection issues, including child marriage, child labor, physical violence, psychological violence including discrimination and harassment, sexual violence, and mental health and psychosocial distress.
