
In August/September **Disaster Assessment Response Team** recognized needs in different locations in southern Poland, such as:




School That Connects project and the challenges in education


Taras: 12-years-old, arrived in May 2022, 2 younger siblings, causes problems in Polish school (aggression)




Marina: Taras's mom, was a clerk in Ukraine, works in a shop, on weekends extra job, often away fo 11-12 hours a day






